

OSAA Committee Recommends Switch of Three To District 6

Portland (UPI)—The Oregon School Activities association (OSAA) redistricting committee recommended Wednesday

that Roseburg, Marshfield and North Bend be moved from District 5-A to District 6-A, or from the Midwestern League into the Southern Conference.

The recommendation suggested the move be effective Sept. 1, 1963.

Opposition from schools in both districts was received but the committee said this was the best solution to a tough problem.

Oden Hawes, OSAA executive secretary, planned to sample board reaction via the telephone today. He said official action on the recommendation may wait until Dec. 1. Added Expense, Travel

Guy Shellenburger, Marshfield, and Al Hoffman, Roseburg, both said the move would commit them to added expense and travel time. They got support from Don Miller of Crater and Bud Silver of Ashland.

The move would mean that the three schools would be in a league with Medford-area teams and Klamath Falls instead of one with Eugene area teams.

The redistricting committee

also recommended a plan starting in 1963-64 in which the Rogue and Umpqua Valley leagues consisting of 14 schools get two playoff berths in football and basketball in odd numbered years. The

Coast and Sunset Six leagues would get two berths in even-numbered years.

Putnam high school, expected to open in Milwaukie in 1963, was awarded a place in the Metro league.

Ashland Entertains Crater This Friday

A winless team ambitious to make the most of its last opportunity for a victory and an aggregation whose win-loss record belies its fine performance against larger schools collide Friday night in a season concluding Southern Oregon conference football game.

Ashland will be host to Crater high with kickoff at 8 p.m.

The Grizzlies of Ashland have gone without a victory in their eight games so far this year. Crater has a record of two wins, four setbacks and a tie. Ashland is 0-3 in the conference. The Comets of Central Point are 0-2-1.

Spirit is high in the Grizzly camp despite the dismal record. Said Coach Marsh Jones of the Ashlanders, "I don't think they're down and out. They seem to bounce back in there."

Jones said that his players in their Tuesday workout had much fire and hustle. He added, "It was the best workout all year."

At Central Point Coach Keith Johnson said that a good scrap from the Grizzlies is anticipated. He stated that he expects Ashland to be up high for its last chance.

"We've really had a good season despite the win-loss record," Johnson brought out, concerning his Comet team. The Central Point club yielded only 7 to 0 to top-ranked Medford and held Klamath Falls to a scoreless tie. The Comets gave Grants Pass a fierce battle before bowing 25 to 0.

"The kids have really competed," remarked Johnson. "We've felt the kids have done a good job."

Yet there is concern about the possibility of a let down. "I hope," said the Comet tutor, "that they realize and rise to the point to where they know they have to play a ball game."

Last Scrimmage

Whitworth College Pirates wind up their 1962 Evergreen Conference schedule this Saturday at 1:30 p.m. when they collide with the Savages of Eastern Washington State college in Cheney.

The Pirates are currently tied for first place in the Evergreen Conference and a victory over Eastern would insure them at least a tie for the championship.

The Bucs and EWSC met earlier this season with Whitworth coming out on the winning side of a 13-0 score. It was a hard fought game and the Savages, although they occupy the conference cellar, are expected to give the Whites a rugged battle.

Both Have 5-1 Marks

In action last Saturday, the Bucs gained a first place tie with the University of Puget Sound by defeating the Loggers 27-6. The Pirate victory left both squads with a 5-1 conference record with one contest remaining.

Consistent Soph

The Whitworth attack was once again led by the consistent sophomore halfback Charlie Reed. Reed amassed 164 net yards to increase his league leading total to 762 yards.

The Pirate defense once again made the task of victory much easier by limiting the Logger ground attack to a mere 36 net yards. The Bucs now lead the conference in every offensive and defensive department except pass defense.

The Comets are all healthy, the coach reported. They, of course are missing back Darryl Summerfield, who dislocated his elbow in the Medford game.

Crater held its last scrimmage of the season yesterday. Ashland Coach Jones reported that the Grizzlies appear to have their halfback situation straightened out. Ron Boyce likely will be at the left half and Mike Torrence at the right half. Torrence probably will get the call on his showing against Medford last week and Boyce on his work in practice.

The Grizzlies worked on their defense yesterday after Tuesday drill on offense.

OSU Looks For All-Out Opposition

Oregon State University, Corvallis - Oregon State goes after its fourth football victory in a row Saturday at Moscow, but as usual, the Beavers can expect an all-out battle from the Idaho Vandals.

Coach Tommy Prothro's determined squad held off a late Washington State rally to beat the Cougars, 18-12, at Pullman last week end as All-America candidate Terry Baker scored three touchdowns. OSU's record now stands at 5-2, with other wins over Iowa State, Stanford, Pacific and West Virginia and losses to Iowa and Washington.

Good as Baker was at Pullman, he had to share honors with plenty of other Beavers, among them little Dan Espalin, scrappy defensive halfback. Espalin intercepted three WSU passes, each time in a key situation, and played bang-up ball all afternoon.

Protection Poor

All three Oregon State fullbacks - Booker Washington, Bruce Williams and Dick Ruhl - ran well, especially in the closing minutes when OSU wanted to keep possession of the football.

The "Light Brigade," forward wall of the Beavers, again was outweighted, but at times opened good holes for the backs to run through. Oregon State's pass protection was poor at WSU, as the Cougars put on a mammoth rush.

In recent years, Oregon State usually has bumped into a lot of trouble at Moscow. Followers remember all too well the 1956 game there, with the Rose Bowl at stake.

In the worse kind of weather possible, the Beavers had to come from behind in the last few minutes to win, 14-10.

Elsewhere in the National basketball association the Los Angeles Lakers gained ground on both St. Louis and San Francisco by downing the Warriors 132-108, as they held Wilt Chamberlain to a modest 38 points. And the New York Knicks bumped St. Louis, 122-112.

The ailing San Francisco Warriors - Guy Rodgers, Tom Gola, George Lee and Howard Montgomery were all running fevers - turned in their weakest performance of the young season. Elgin Baylor tanked 30 points and Jerry West 28 as the Lakers chalked up their fifth straight win.
