Weakness in Tobaccos Pace Easier Stock Market Report

New York—(UPI)—Weakness in tobaccos paced an easier stock market today.

Softness in the tobaccos followed news of a damage suit against Liggett & Meyers linking smoking to lung cancer. L&M dropped 2 followed by Philip Morris and Reynolds, trading ex-dividend, off at least 1 apiece.

Steels and motors were narrowly mixed and Du Pont rose about 1 1/2 in a scrambled chemical section. Oils were lower with Texas Gulf Producing and Sun Oil off around 1 each.

Electronics were higher with IBM up roughly 3 and Lattin about 1. Some rails, foods and drugs weakened. In the blue chips, Westinghouse

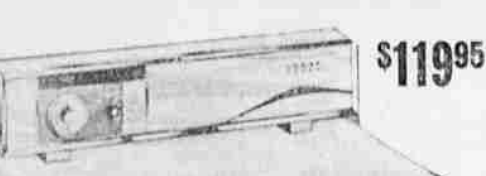
and Owens-Illinois Glass managed point-sized gains.

Pillsbury, Norfolk & Western, and Baxter Labs were among the losers while Electric Storage Battery and Pacific Telephone & Telegraph countered with gains of 1 or more.

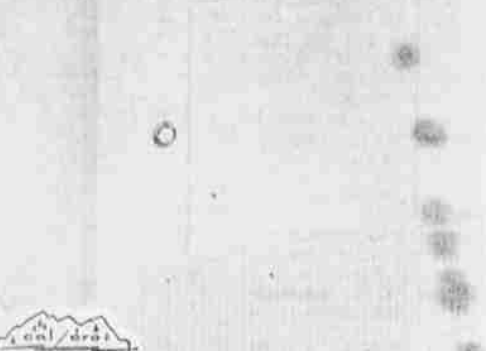

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U.S. Envoy Meets With Nehru; May Expand Aide Team

New Delhi—(UPI)—Embattled Indian forces were believed holding fast today against Communist Chinese attacks near Walong in the extreme eastern section of the North-east Frontier Agency near Burma.

A government spokesman reported Thursday night that there had been extremely heavy fighting in the area Tuesday and Wednesday, with the Indians turning back three Chinese attacks.

In one counter-attack on an attempted flanking action, 15 Chinese soldiers were reported killed or wounded and the rest of the attacking force driven off.

Walong is situated 16 miles south of the McMahon Line which India claims as its northern border. It commands the Lohit river valley leading to the Assam Plains about 80 miles away.

The spokesman reported a total of five armed clashes near Walong and another in the Towang area in Nefas's western region near the Bhutan border.

U.S. Ambassador John Kenneth Galbraith had a half hour talk with Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru Thursday night and today the embassy announced that the U.S. military aide team here probably would be expanded somewhat.

So far there are four U.S. field grade officers working closely with the Indian military in an effort to determine what they need in the way of arms help.

Nehru's government easily defeated a tiny parliamentary bid today to censure his foreign policy. Only seven of the more than 500 members of the lower house rose to support the motion.

Nehru received a roaring ovation from the house Thursday when he declared India would never give in to Communist Chinese aggression.

Nehru announced to parliament today the final step in severing former Defense Minister V. K. Krishna Menon from the cabinet. He said he had received a message from President Servapalli Radhakrishnan saying he had accepted Menon's resignation "with regrets."

University's Books Reach New Record

Eugene—The total holdings of the University of Oregon library has reached a record high of 780,992 volumes during the 1960-62 biennium.

Following withdrawals due to obsolescence and wear, the net gain over this period was 80,143.

Other categories of library materials such as maps, photographs, pictures and recordings showed significant gains now totaling more than one million. The number of periodicals regularly received increased by 350 during the biennium and now stands at 3,269.

Inter-library loan transactions continued to grow with 2,924 volumes borrowed for the use of University students and faculty, and 3,767 items loaned for use elsewhere.

Lebanon Father of Nine Electrocuted

Lebanon—(UPI)—Alvie Harold Jones, 58, Lebanon, was electrocuted here Thursday while working on power lines out because of storm damage. He was the father of nine children.

The accident occurred in the Spicer area, between Lebanon and Albany.

AIRS TERRORIST REPORT

Washington—(UPI)—The Organization of American States will meet today to hear a report by Venezuela on recent terrorism in that country. Evidence linking the terrorist acts in Venezuela to Communist direction outside the country, presumably in Cuba, could result in further OAS quarantine measures against the Fidel Castro regime.

CASTRO ORDERS 'PARTIAL DEMOBILIZATION'
Havana—(UPI)—Premier Fidel Castro's revolutionary regime ordered "partial mobilization" Thursday night and thousands of Cubans were reported returning home for the first time in nearly three weeks.

The militia was called to arms Oct. 22 when Castro proclaimed a "combat alert" shortly after President Kennedy announced the U. S. Decision to impose an arms blockade in Cuba.

Reports from the eastern provincial capital of Santiago said people turned out by the thousands with flags and banners to welcome militiamen "returning from the trenches."

FLOOD IN SPAIN LEAVES 4,000 HOMELESS
Barcelona, Spain—(UPI)—The second flood disaster in six weeks left two persons dead, 4,000 homeless and more than \$1 million damage as skies cleared today in Barcelona Province.

Weather forecasters said they expected no more rain like the downpours which sent the area's rivers on an angry rampage earlier this week.

FRANCE, ALGERIA NEGOTIATE TRAVEL
Paris—(UPI)—Immigration and customs regulations covering persons traveling between France and its former possession of Algeria became the same as between any other foreign countries Thursday.

Mooncraft To Hold Landing Practice on New Mexico Desert

Washington—(UPI)—Some time in the next three or four years a couple of U.S. astronauts will brake their descending mooncraft, hover a while, and then ease down to a gentle landing.

The scene, however, will not be a crater or sea of the moon but the desert outside White Sands, N.M. The craft, a bulbous, glass-domed contraption resembling a giant bug, will be a test version of the vehicle which will deposit two Americans on the lunar surface a few years later.

On Wednesday the National Aeronautics and Space Administration announced it was negotiating a \$350 million contract with the Grumman Aircraft Engineering Corp. for the so-called Lunar Excursion Module (LEM) which will be used for moon landings in NASA's Apollo manned flight program.

Some time before 1970 a three-man Apollo spacecraft will be launched from earth into orbit around the moon. There, with two of the astronauts aboard, the moon bug known as LEM will detach itself from the mother ship.

It will spiral down toward the moon's surface and, with retro-rockets blazing, hover in space until its pilots have picked a suitable landing spot. Then it will settle down upon its skid-like legs and sit quietly until the explorers are ready to blast off.

Missions completed, the two-man team will rendezvous in lunar orbit with the mother craft and go back aboard. Leaving LEM in the moon's gravitational clutches, the explorers will then rocket home to earth.

But long before this can be undertaken, the Apollo spacecraft and its lunar landing bug must be put through exhaustive tests in the near neighborhood of earth.

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Bulgaria Congress Tells Displeasure

Belgrade—(UPI)—The official Yugoslav news agency Tanjug reported from Sofia today that a Chinese attack against East European party policies has been "received with uneasiness" at the eighth Bulgarian Communist Congress.

Simultaneously, the official Yugoslav weekly magazine International Politik accused Communists China of spreading "hypocrisy and lies" about Yugoslavia to divert attention from its own "vital inner problems."

Tanjung reported that Thursday's speech by Vu Su Chuan, chief of the Chinese delegation, terming Bulgarian treatment of outcast Albania as "one-sided" was "in contrast with the general atmosphere and spirit prevalent at the congress."

Approval Withheld
Tanjung said that Polish, Czech and Romanian delegates "did not approve of the Chinese comrade's criticism" believed to have been an attempt by China to improve Albania's position in Eastern Europe. Albania has not fallen in line with the Russian-sponsored de-Stalinization program.

The attack in International Politik was one of the strongest to date in the long ideological dispute between Beijing and Belgrade. It charged there was a lack of freedom in Communist China, and it refuted Beijing's criticism of President Tito's relatively liberal economic policies.

"This is merely a clumsy attempt to divert attention from their own vital inner problems," the magazine said.

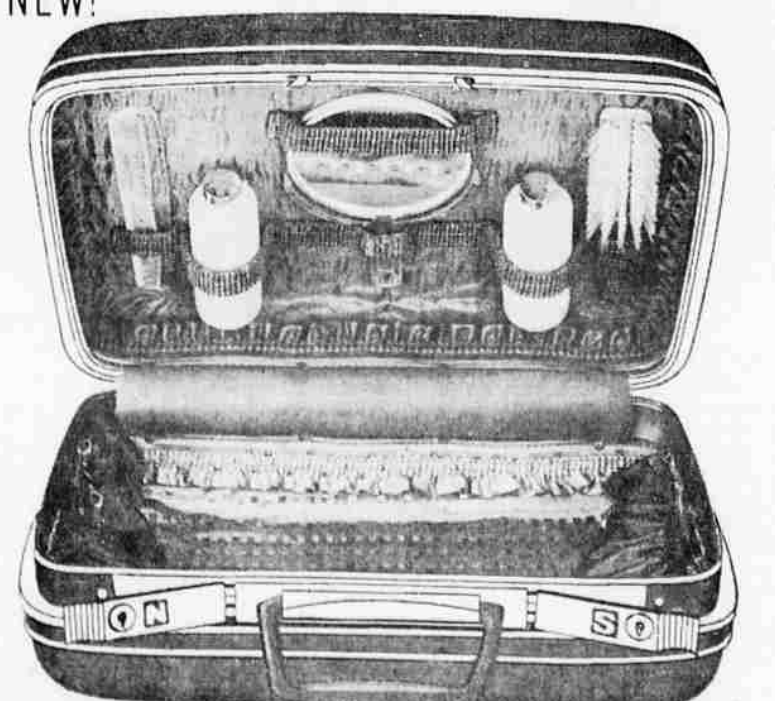
