

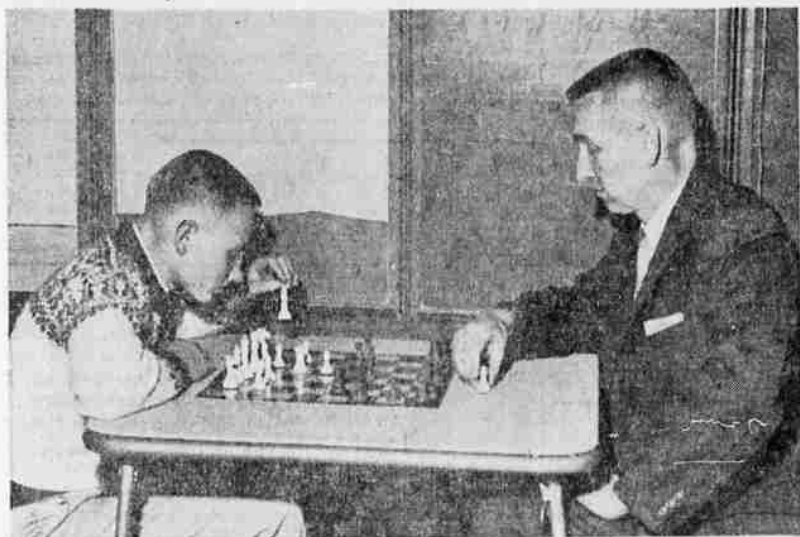

WORK SMARTER — NOT HARDER

Who spends the most money in your family? Chances are, it's you, the homemaker. As buyer for the whole family you have lots of weighty decisions to make.

To speak for you, a Consumer Advisory council has recently been set up by President Kennedy. It will study consumer problems and advise government officials. Some people feel more should be done to give consumers the kind of information we need to be better buyers.

If you want tips on wise buying of children's clothing, canned goods, carpets, vacuum cleaners, dishwashers, ranges, foam rubber upholstery, and

many other items, let us know — or call your county Extension office. Our specialists at OSU have prepared up-to-date consumer education booklets on these and many other topics. They are free to you Oregonians.

Electric fry pans with brown stains on the bottom have baffled many of you. When you pour fat from the pan, a little of it probably dribbles down the side. Grease from dishwasher gets on the bottom too. If you dunk the pan last after you've washed the dishes, the invisible grease film on the bottom of your fry pan turns brown the next time you heat the pan.

The stain is practically impossible to scour off, but it's easy to prevent. Always wash the pan in clean, hot, sudsy water, rinse well and dry thoroughly. Then there'll be no grease film on the outside.
