## Guitar Suggested As Mass Background

Vatican City —(UPI)—Recorded guitar music in some instances provides a fine background for the mass, a group of United States priests here for the Vatican Ecumenical council told a news conference Saturday.

Their comments came as the council ended its third week of discussion with a debate on sacred music and the instruments which may be used in church.

The music and instruments — come under the broad topic of the liturgy, or public worship. The present rules governing the music are almost a half-century old.

The U. S. priests, taking their key from the wider council debate, said organ music most often found in western churches can be impractical for missions and outposts in jungles and other places where even a compact "camp" organ is hard to carry.

## Distinguished Group Pays Final Tribute At Roosevelt Rites

Hyde Park, N.Y. —(UPI)—Anna Eleanor Roosevelt, the shy and self-described "ugly duckling" orphan who in womanhood found true beauty through service to humanity, rests in death beside her husband in the rose garden they had tended together in life.

Under a heavy November sky, with a light rain that started with the Lord's Prayer and continued through the lowering of the casket, the "First Lady of the World" was buried Saturday afternoon alongside the grave of Franklin Delano Roosevelt, 32nd president of the United States. They had been parted, until now, by Franklin Roosevelt's wartime death in office in 1945.

### Distinguished Mourners

President Kennedy and former Presidents Eisenhower and Truman headed a group of distinguished mourners who came through the autumn-scented mid-Hudson hills to the Roosevelt estate, country home of the late President's family since 1819.

The 78-year-old Mrs. Roosevelt, niece of President Theodore Roosevelt, died Wednesday in New York after a battle of more than two years with anemia and tuberculosis.

After a heavy early morning rain, the sky began clearing — blue with floating patches of clouds — shortly before the funeral service started at 2:10 p.m. in the quaint 115-year-old stucco St. James Episcopal church.

A gentle breeze ruffled the huge pine trees overlooking the grave and fluttered the bright flowers in the 40 wreaths set on stands behind a great white oblong headstone bearing the names of both Franklin Delano and Anna Eleanor Roosevelt.

The stone was still wet and glistening when the Rev. Dr. Gordon L. Kidd, for 16 years Mrs. Roosevelt's rector at St. James, delivered a graveside eulogy saying that the world had suffered an irreparable loss.

Shortly before 2 p.m., the President escorted Mrs. Kennedy up the short walk to the church. She was wearing a black suit and black mink hat and he wore a dark blue suit.

## 16 Persons Injured In Train Collision

Belleville, Ill. —(UPI)—The Louisville and Nashville line's "Hummingbird" passenger train, running on the Illinois Central tracks because of a previous crackup on the rails, smashed into the side of a freight train Saturday. Sixteen persons were injured but no one was killed.

The engine of the 16-car passenger train was flipped almost upside down and a total of 15 cars were knocked off the tracks when the Hummingbird hit a switching area too early and smashed into the Illinois Central freight.

## Reds' Sabotage Efforts In India Said Increasing

Indian Troops Stop 2 Chinese Attacks

New Delhi —(UPI)—Pro-Peiping Communists are increasing their sabotage and subversive efforts in the threatened northeastern area of India while Peiping keeps up steady military pressure on the gateway to the rich Assam plains, it was reported here Saturday.

No major fighting was reported anywhere along the 1,500-mile border but an Indian defense ministry spokesman said Indian troops repulsed two Chinese Communist attacks near Walong, at the extreme eastern end of the line near Burma. He said the Indians suffered no casualties.

The spokesman reported enemy shelling near Walong and in the Towang area at the intersection of the borders of India, Bhutan and Tibet — scene of a major assault Oct. 20. Indian and Chinese troops now hold positions around Jang village, five miles to the east.

The spokesman said the situation was unchanged in the Ladakh area where Friday he said the Chinese were moving tanks toward the vital supply air base of Chushul. Chushul is one of India's most important defensive points in the Ladakh area of Kashmir.

## Police Question Slaying Suspect

Arlington —(UPI)—A lesser charge filed against Edward W. Sheekler of Portland has been continued here while state police attempt to determine if he had any connection with the gunshot slaying of rookie policeman Ralph Bates of Medford Thursday night.

Bates was shot in the chest and left lying alongside his patrol car on U. S. Highway 30 about 7 1/2 miles east of here.

Sheekler was arrested less than five hours later near Condon, 41 miles to the south. Patrolmen William Harris and James Forney said Sheekler was driving a car reported stolen in Seattle.

They said he reached for a .22 caliber pistol when they asked him for identification. \$20,000 Bail.

Sheekler was charged with attempting to use a dangerous weapon and his bail was set at \$20,000 Friday.

Later in the day he was arraigned before a justice of the peace here and his case was continued. He was being held at the Gilliam county jail in Condon.

Police Lt. N. W. Smith said questioning of Sheekler provided inconclusive. He was unable to account for his presence in the area, but denied any connection with the slaying. Lt. Smith said.

# All 42 Soviet Missiles Reported Aboard Vessels Leaving Cuba

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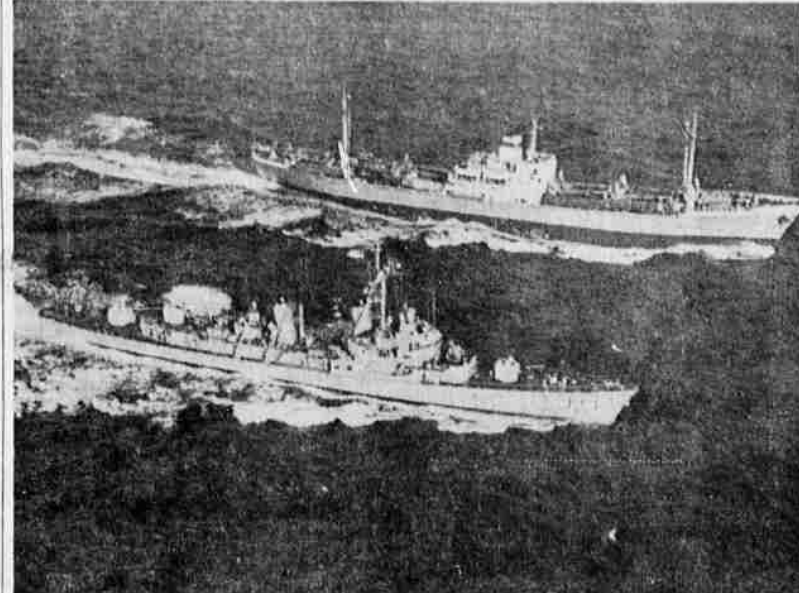

## Official Canvass Puts Redden Ahead Of Dumas By 221

The election of Democrat James Redden, Medford lawyer, as representative was confirmed Friday on completion of the official canvass for that particular position on the general election ballot.

Redden was declared officially 221 votes ahead of his Republican rival, A. A. Dumas, Medford businessman. Redden had 12,231 votes and Dumas 12,010.

The third man in the three-way race, Alva Bradford, Medford Democrat and businessman, had a final count of 11,870.

Dumas and Redden were separated by less than 400 votes prior to the counting of the absentee ballots. Bradford had received a total of 11,912 votes.

Hugh Jennings, chairman of the Jackson County Republican Central committee, said Friday morning the committee had "taken under advisement" the matter of asking for a recount.

Jennings spoke with state Republican officials in Portland later Friday. Indications were that the party had no plans to ask for a recount.

## FBI Nabs One Of Nation's Top 10 Wanted Criminals

Baltimore, Md. —(UPI)—Fast-moving FBI agents Saturday grabbed one of the nation's 10 most wanted men — one-eyed Bobby Dandell Wilcoxson — who was sought for questioning in a string of holdups ranging from banks to the Plymouth, Mass. mail robbery.

Caught at the same time was Wilcoxson's 19-year-old girl friend, Jacqueline Rose, who was wanted for aiding and abetting a bank robbery.

The capture brought an end to a two-man robbery team that used antitank weapons, shotguns and hand grenades in a series of bank robberies on the east coast. Wilcoxson's alleged partner, Frederick Nussbaum, was seized in Buffalo, N. Y., a week ago.

Acting on a tip, some 30 FBI agents stalked out Wilcoxson's home Friday. Because Jacqueline Rose's 14-month-old son was inside, the agents decided not to move against the home itself for fear the boy might be hurt.

Their patience was rewarded Saturday when Wilcoxson and Jacqueline Rose emerged from the house and headed for their car.

Wilcoxson himself was in a hurry, but the FBI said he was not aware that the agents were nearby. He placed the boy in the car and was starting to get in himself when a car full of agents pulled up.

## Rain, Wind Storm Hits East Coast

## Confirmation By Defense Officials Expected Soon

U.S. Inspects Four Ships With Missiles

Washington —(UPI)—U. S. Surveillance operations have counted all 42 Soviet missiles listed by Russia on ships outward bound from Cuba, informed sources said Saturday.

A formal Defense department announcement of this was expected soon, possibly today.

The sources said the missiles were now aboard Soviet ships and at sea.

The Defense department has said that six Soviet vessels have been "inspected" by Navy warships and that four of them appeared to be carrying missiles.

In addition, newsmen flew over another Soviet ship Saturday afternoon—the freighter Ivan Polzunov — and counted five cigar-shaped rockets on board.

The destroyer Vesole intercepted the Ivan Polzunov at 2 p.m. EST and visually inspected the missiles in the second known encounter of the day. Another one took place early in the morning.

Vasily V. Kuznetsov, the special Soviet negotiator on Cuba now in New York, has informed the United States that all of the Russian missiles—which he put at 42—would be on their way out of the Caribbean by Monday.

The ship inspected at dawn Saturday was the Soviet freighter Anosov. An "alongside inspection" of its cargo was made by the destroyer Barry, which intercepted the vessel Friday night and talked it throughout the dark hours until daylight.

There was one complication with the Anosov. It bluntly refused the Barry's request that it uncover all of the missiles lashed to the deck. To do so, it said, would be against the instructions of the Soviet government.

But the Pentagon later indicated that the freighter had complied sufficiently to satisfy the terms of the limited inspection. It said the surveillance had been completed "without incident."

Final removal of all of the missiles would end the major part of the military threat posed by their placement in Cuba. It appeared the next steps in the Cuban crisis might turn into a political chess game that may take weeks to resolve.

There were some indications the next move would be Monday, the deadline promised by Kuznetsov for completion of the missile withdrawal.

In New York, Carlos Lechuga, Cuba's ambassador to the United Nations, told a reporter that despite a week of intensive diplomatic activity there, "nothing of importance probably will happen before next Monday." He did not elaborate.

Talks between Soviet First Deputy Premier Anastas Mikoyan and Prime Minister Fidel Castro on Russo-Cuban relations in the wake of the missile withdrawal have been temporarily recessed.

**SAN FRANCISCO SHIPYARD BURNS**  
San Francisco —(UPI)—Firemen last night were cleaning up the smoldering remnants of a fire which destroyed a huge wooden pier at Hunters Point Naval Shipyard, causing an estimated \$500,000 damage.

**YEMEN WAR PACT SIGNED**  
Cairo —(UPI)—The 45-day-old Yemen Arab Republic and the United Arab Republic signed a five-year mutual defense pact Saturday at the Yemeni capital of Sanaa.

**CHINA, JAPAN SIGN TRADE AGREEMENT**  
Tokyo —(UPI)—Communist China Saturday signed a trade memorandum with Japan calling for an exchange of some \$450 million dollars worth of goods between the two countries in the next five years, a Peiping broadcast said.

**ARABIAN GUNS HIT WITH PLANE**  
Damascus, Syria —(UPI)—Saudi Arabian anti-aircraft guns hit a United Arab Republic military plane flying over the Red Sea port of Jizan Saturday, the Saudi defense ministry said.
