County Court Okays Liquor Licenses

The county court has recommended approval of draft beer and packaged beer liquor licenses for Harlin Seiler, Shady Cove, operating Six Cove Tavern in Shady Cove. Seiler said he had leased the tavern, but now needs a license applying to his own operation since it is no longer leased.

County Judge Earl M. Miller noted that the county court had inspected the tavern a year ago.

Forest Reports Less Fires During Months of 1962

Portland — Fires in the National forests of the Pacific Northwest Region burned more than 3,500 acres this year by Nov. 1 compared to more than 20,000 acres last year, according to J. Herbert Stone, regional forester, U.S. Forest service.

A total of 1,200 fires have been recorded this year in the region (Oregon and most of Washington) compared to a record 2,900 in 1961.

In 1957, 926 fires burned 1,145 acres, an all-time record low. Most severe year since 1939 was 1960 when 2,000 fires burned 79,000 acres of USFS protected land.

This year there were fewer lightning fires (633) and fewer man-caused fires (568) than average for the past five years.

Weather, of course, was an important factor in keeping fire losses at a low level this year, Stone said, but he emphasized that other factors played an important part.

Among the factors cited were: More personnel, both in prevention and suppression work; greater emphasis on training of supervisory personnel; improved use of aircraft; fire prevention programs such as the Smokey Bear program and the excellent work done by the Keep Oregon Green and Keep Washington Green associations; cooperation of news media in stressing fire prevention; and cooperation of all users of the National forests.

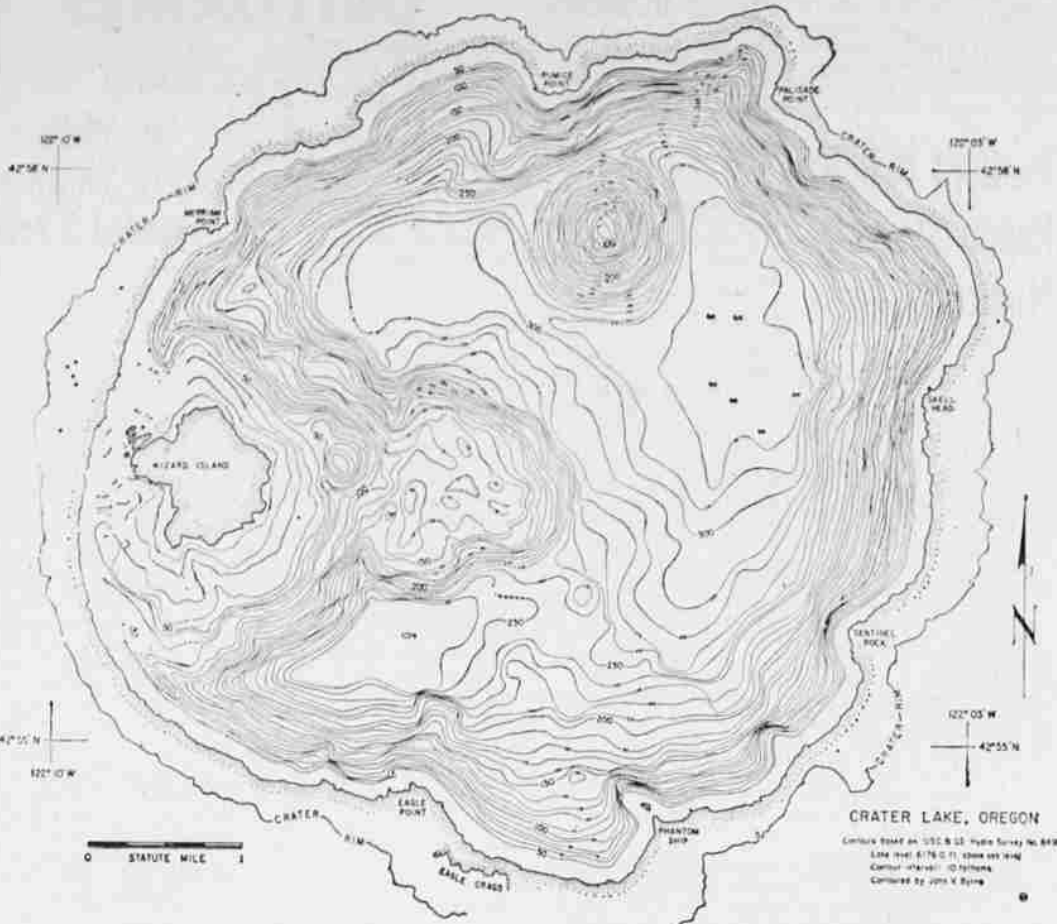
Stone said he believes that the below-average number of hunter-caused fires, for example, was due to increased awareness on the part of hunters as well as favorable weather conditions early in the hunting season.

CRATER LAKE DEEPEST IN U.S. — Crater Lake, with a maximum depth of 322 fathoms (1,932 feet) is the deepest lake in the United States, and second only to Great Slave Lake in northern Canada (2,014 feet) in North America. This fact, and other details of the underwater conformation of the lake, were revealed when in the summer of 1959 the U.S. Coast and Geodetic survey used echo-sounding methods to determine the contours of the lake's bottom. The bathymetric chart above, prepared by John V. Byrne,

department of oceanography, Oregon State University, was the result. The chart shows 10-fathom (60-foot) contour intervals, showing an apparent lava flow eastward from Wizard Island, and an almost perfect one, named Merriam Cone, in the north-central part of the lake. The deepest part of the lake is almost flat, believed to be a lava plain smoothed by later ashfalls. — (Chart and data from The Ore-Bin, publication of the Oregon department of geology and mineral industries.)

Butte Falls Firm Buys Winema Timber

Klamath Falls — The Winema National forest sold the first salvage timber sale Friday which were blowdown timber from the Oct. 12 wind-storm.

The Frieda blowdown sale for two million board feet of timber on the Klamath Ranger district was purchased by Duane Burton, Butte Falls. Burton paid \$18,310 for this timber, which was appraised at \$14,305. Other bidders were Steve Wilson Lumber company, and Modoc Lumber company.

The North Marsh blowdown sale of 500,000 board feet located on the Chemult Ranger district was purchased by Paul and Robert Wampler for \$3,375. Appraised price on this timber was \$3,325. Modoc Lumber company was the only other bidder for the North Marsh sale.

Research Institute Gets \$2,590 Grant

McMinnville — Linfield Research institute, the research arm of Linfield college, has received a \$2,590 grant from the Tektronix Foundation at Beaverton to be used to support faculty-student undergraduate research participation projects.

The grant will aid faculty-student projects in the chemistry department (low vapor pressure measurements) and in the biology department (electrical potentials associated with muscular activity of the reproductive tract as influenced by various hormones).

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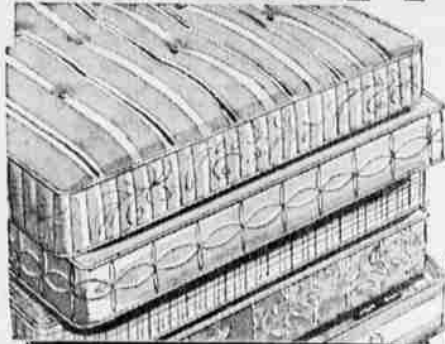
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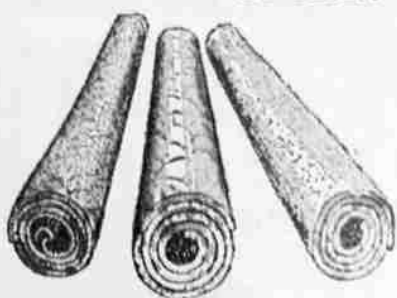


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
