Phoenix — Phoenix High school's Pirates, molded into a strong unit by their toughest game of the year, Friday night captured their fourth successive District 6 A-2 football championship.

The Buccaneers fought by Riddle's Irish 21 to 7 in the district playoff tilt to gain the state quarterfinal round.

Phoenix, sticking almost entirely to its old reliable single wing attack, touchdowns twice in the first period and once again in the fourth. The Irish got their touchdown in the third quarter.

Victory sends the Pirates against Elmira next week end at Phoenix. Game arrangements likely will be completed Monday. Elmira defeated McKenzie 13 to 12 yesterday for the crown of District 5.

**Three D Scoring**  
Jim Construk, Dave Johnson and Dennis Grennan scored for Phoenix and Mike Markham passed to Keith Hanson for 16 yards and the Irish marker.

Construk crossed the goal on the fourth scrimmage play of the game, going from the 12-yard line. Grennan ran the bonus. The strike followed the kickoff return to the Riddle 40. Johnson went 33 yards on a reverse with Jon Granby converting.

A pass interception by Granby set up the final Phoenix TD. Grennan went over from the three and Granby again carried for the bonus. Tom Morrison packed for the Riddle extra point.

The teams were close in net yardage with Phoenix having a 295 to 252 edge. First downs favored the Buccaneers 16 to 14.

Coach Jack Woodward of the Pirates cited Tim O'Mara for his all-around hustle, good centering and good blocking. Paul Dietrich, newcomer to the starting lineup for his line-backing, Ron Patterson for his defensive line work and end and back; Granby for his all-around performance.

For Riddle Tom Roberts, 210-pound tackle, and Larry Ruckel, 195-pound wingback got the special praise of Coach Bill Baxter.

Phoenix coaches and players said that they felt that the game molded the team into a strong unit.

Richard F. Traylor, Eagle Point high principal and chairman of District 6 A-2, presented the title trophy to Phoenix following the game.

Phoenix is from the Rogue league and Riddle from the Umpqua Valley circuit.

## Falcons Tip UCLA 17-11

Los Angeles — (UPI) — Brilliant junior quarterback Terry Isaacson displayed the field generalship of a future officer Saturday by guiding the Air Force Academy to a 17-11 upset football victory over the UCLA Bruins.

While a UCLA homecoming crowd of 25,588 looked on in astonishment, the 20-year-old Isaacson took the Falcons on an 83-yard march from the opening kickoff for a touchdown. The Bruins never could catch up.

Halfback Darryl Bloodworth skirted right end for the first touchdown. The Falcons picked up three more points in the third period on John Gavin's 25-yard field goal and Isaacson set up their second touchdown in the final quarter with his second pass interception.

The Air Force quarterback ran the intercepted pass 37 yards to the UCLA 18, and halfback Dick Arshinkoff turned left end on fourth down for one yard and the score.

UCLA could not make even a first down until six minutes into the second quarter, and got on the scoreboard on quarterback Larry Zeno's 48-yard field goal.

UCLA remained scoreless again until five minutes to go in the fourth quarter. A drive of 49 yards found Zeno running the final four yards to score.

Zeno also threw a two-point conversion pass to Bill Houck in an effort to keep the Bruins in the game, but UCLA's desperation effort in the final minutes failed to get them into scoring position.

## Coffey Perks As Huskies Smash Bears

Seattle — (UPI) — Junior (instant) Coffey galloped down the field like a runaway locomotive for 57 yards to score one touchdown and punched California's line like a rivet hammer for two more Saturday as he led Washington to a 27-0 victory over the Bears.

A delighted homecoming crowd of 54,800 watched the performance.

The 205-pound Husky fullback bludgeoned California's defense into a stupor as he stormed up and down the field for a total of 135 yards.

Coffey scored his first touchdown eight minutes and 21 seconds into the third period when he smashed into the end zone from one yard out to cap a 48-yard drive.

Coffey scored again a few minutes later on a two-yard plunge which ended a 39-yard drive that began when reserve left end Robbie Heinz intercepted Cal quarterback Craig Morton's pass.

The other top Washington fullback, Bob Monroe, scored the third Husky touchdown on a one-yard plunge.

Washington then forced Cal to punt in the next series of downs and Coffey took a pitchout from quarterback Bill Douglas and set out on his 57-yard jaunt to end the scoring.

Until Coffey took personal charge of things, the Washington attack was sputtering like an antique car on a cold winter morning. In fact, it was a cold, miserable day for football, with the temperature down to 30 degrees and a pelting rain soaking the field during most of the game.

## Linfield Drops Portland State

Portland, Ore. — (UPI) — Unbeaten Linfield powered past Portland State 39-0 in a non-conference football game on a muddy field here Saturday.

Quarterback Bill Mickle completed eight of 10 passes for 143 yards and three touchdowns, all in the first half. Halfback Dennis Vitale gained 108 yards in 21 carries.

Longview, Wash. — (UPI) — Eastern Oregon led Lower Columbia college all the way and took a 27-13 victory over the home team in football action here Saturday.

The Oregon team took a 6-0 lead in the first quarter, as Rich Barton scored from four yards out. The margin widened in the second quarter when Barton carried it across from the 44-yard line on a keeper play. It was Lower Columbia's turn, and quarterback Del Duney drove across from the nine to make the halftime score 13-7.

In the third period Don Fisher drove through the middle for 55 yards and a third Eastern Oregon tally. Barton kicked the extra point, making it 20-7. Duney scored on a quarterback sneak for Lower Columbia, but it was the home team's last successful attempt to get on the score board.

Eastern Oregon added some insurance in the fourth quarter, going 70 yards on 13 plays, with Quarterback Dick Stohauer diving across from the one-yard line.

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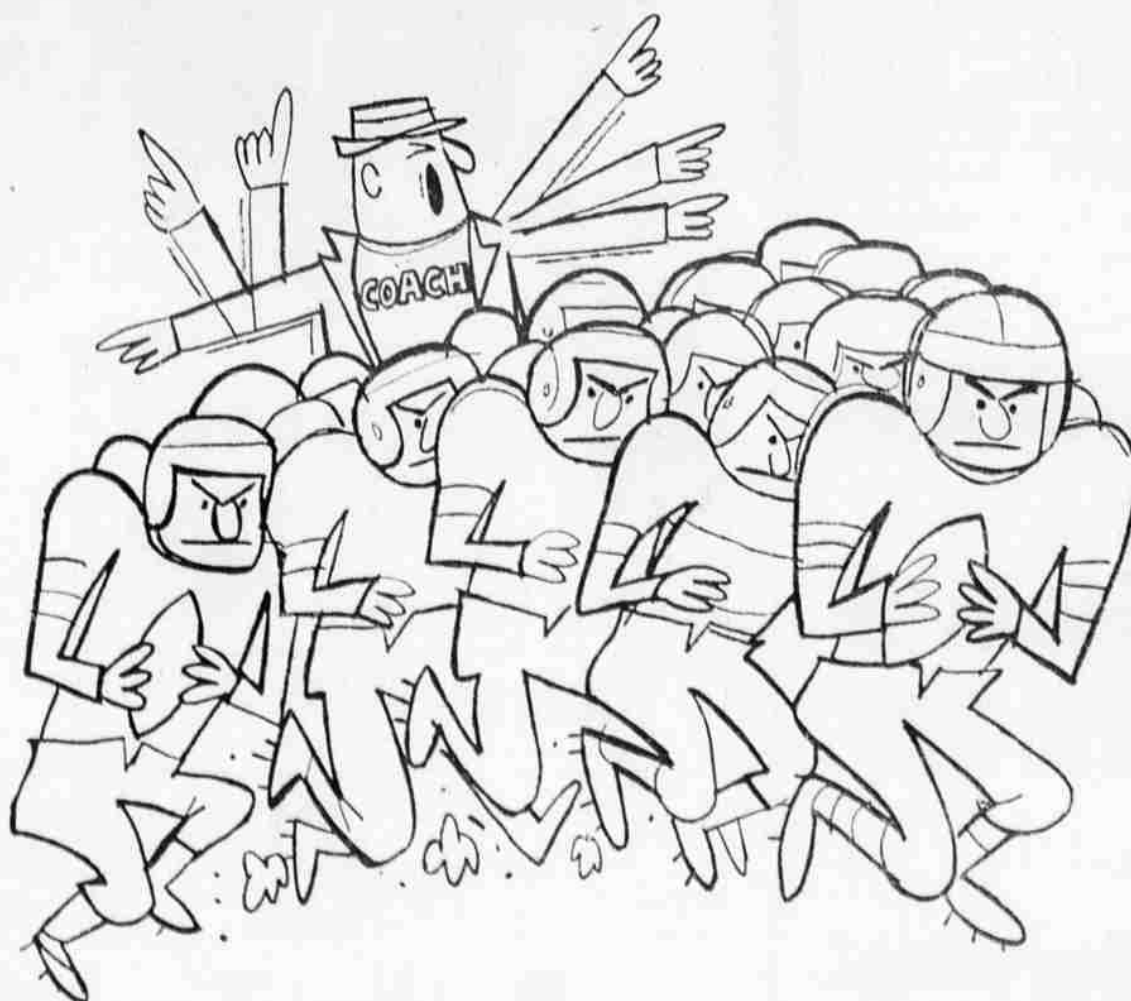
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
