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Early Marriage Topic Of Extension Bulletin

Corvallis - What parents and educators can do to change the trend toward early marriage is discussed in a new Oregon State University extension circular.

In 1959, 58 per cent of Oregon's brides and 19 per cent of its bridegrooms were 19 years of age or less.

Mrs. Robert Frasier, author of the new circular, "Early Marriage," considers the why of these marriages and asks Oregonians if this is a matter for concern. Mrs. Frasier is extension family life specialist at OSU.

Although the number of youthful marriages seems to be increasing, studies indicate that marriages that are delayed until girls are at least 19 years of age are more likely to be successful than those of younger couples.

Some experts believe that our present-day culture pushes young people into early marriage, the circular notes. General prosperity, early dating, going steady, less supervision of youth, and stimulation from from advertisements, movies and television are some of the reasons behind these marriages.

Suggestions on what parents and communities can do are listed in the circular. Copies are available at county extension offices or from the OSU bulletin clerk.



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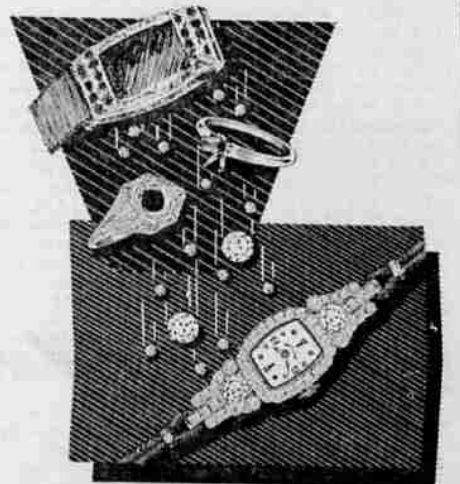
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
