Two Invited to Lecture at World Hypnosis Congress This Week in Las Vegas

Mrs. Helen Hedge Reimer, practicing psychologist, and Dr. Cleatis D. Lemley, osteopathic physician and surgeon of the Valley Medical Clinic, 3850 North Pacific highway, will lecture at the symposium of the World Congress of Medical and Dental Hypnosis Nov. 11 to 13 at the Flamingo hotel in Las Vegas.

Dr. Lemley, the only endocrinologist among the lecturers, will speak on endocrinology and problems of weight and hormone deficiencies. He is on a special panel to discuss the conditions of endocrinology and therapy of the autonomic nervous system with aid of hypnosis.

Mrs. Reimer will teach prayer therapy, the power of words, and the patient and art creations under hypnography.

Mrs. Reimer moved to the Medford area from Monrovia, Calif., after her husband, Dr. Arden R. Hedge died last year. Dr. Hedge was president of the American Institute of Hypnosis. Both were proponents of the use of hypnosis for practical diagnostic and therapeutic purposes and have taken degrees in its use.

Mrs. Reimer recently moved her office to the clinic where she will be a practicing psychologist. She is also on the faculty of the American Institute of Hypnosis and teaches doctors and dentists the use and purpose of medical hypnosis. She has taught in London, France and South America and throughout the United States.

Dr. and Mrs. S. J. Van Pelt will be guests of Mrs. Reimer at her Shangri-la ranch following the congress. Dr. Van Pelt is president of the British Society of Medical Hypnotists.

Mason, Dana H. Collins, Russell A. Johnson, and Charles H. Hurst in the northwest administrative area; to Hugh R. Shera and William A. Cowan in the northeast.

New responsibilities as resource managers have been assigned to Mark E. Lawrence, Wilson E. Edinger, and Ernest D. Black in their respective administrative areas.

Schofield said the rearrangement of duties will streamline operations and will be especially helpful to the bureau in meeting the timber salvage and rehabilitation requirements resulting from the Columbus day wind storm.

Griffin Creek Elementary school will observe a "Lights on For Education" and open house on Tuesday, Nov. 13 between the hours of 7 and 9 p.m.

Every room in the building will be open for parent's inspection. The children's desks will be marked and folios of their work will be available. Parents will register in every room in which they have a child enrolled. The room that has the most parents registered will be awarded a prize. Parent Teacher association room mothers will be present to assist.

Classrooms will be open from 7 to 9 p.m. Refreshments will be served in the cafeteria from 7:30 to 9 p.m. by the PTA.

Thursday, Nov. 15, the Howard school and Howard PTA will sponsor an open house. Students will accompany their parents to individual rooms by 7:40 p.m. where a short program for the students will be given by the teachers.

Parents will meet in the multi-purpose room at 7:45 p.m. for a short PTA meeting, and an opportunity to see the bulletin boards on "Lights on For Education" and "Book Week". At the conclusion of the meeting, parents will return to their child's room for a short program. Refreshments will be served by the PTA room mothers in each individual room.

Child care for pre-school children will be provided in the school gym.

The evening's activities will be over by 9 p.m.

The Phoenix-Talent schools will observe American Education week with separate functions scheduled for the various buildings on successive evenings.

The Phoenix and Talent elementary schools will hold open house on the evening of Thursday, Nov. 15 from 7:30 to 9 p.m.

The Talent Junior High school will be open Tuesday, Nov. 13, and the Phoenix High school on Wednesday, Nov. 14.

General theme of these functions will be to acquaint visitors with material to be covered in the various subjects of the curriculum during the school year.

All teachers will be present in their rooms or departments to meet the parents. Refreshments will be served at all schools during the visitations.

Since nearly all of the schools have scheduled activities parents may check with their child's school as to the day and times of the open house.

Women Attend TB Portland Meeting

Mrs. Fred Brennan, Jackson county Christmas seal chairman, and Mrs. Virginia Kyer, executive secretary of the Jackson County Tuberculosis and Health association, attended a two-day conference on respiratory diseases recently in Portland.

A health information program aimed at wiping out tuberculosis and a study of other respiratory diseases such as pleurisy, pneumonia, asthma, chronic bronchitis, influenza and emphysema was discussed.

A campaign will be conducted in the spring through leaflets, pamphlets, newspaper articles and other media to inform the public of respiratory diseases such as emphysema.

Rarely heard of a few years ago emphysema is on the increase it was reported. Like many other diseases of the throat and lungs it is accompanied by a cough and shortness of breath. Essentially it is the same condition in man as exists in a wind-broken horse.

Mrs. Brennan and Mrs. Kyer toured the tuberculosis hospital in Salem and visited patients from Josephine, Jackson and Klamath counties.

Continued Hearing Set on Bus Fares

A continued hearing on the application of Evergreen Bus Lines Inc., Medford, to establish school fares will be heard at 10 a.m., Tuesday, Nov. 27, in the Ashland city hall, Jonel C. Hill, public utility commissioner has announced.

The school tickets would be sold only to students attending bona fide public or parochial educational institutions up to and including the high school level or to college or university, for transportation to and from school.

The regular adult one-way fare for college students would be reduced by five cents; round-trip and commutation fares would be computed on 180 per cent of the one-way college fare and commutation fares would be 10 cents for the price of eight college fares.

The fare revision was heard by the PUC in Portland on Sept. 17.

Fugitive Wanted Here Is Arrested

Kenneth Dailey, wanted in Jackson county for burglary and parole violation, has been arrested on Ore Island, near Ketchikan, Alaska, according to the federal bureau of investigation.

The arrest was made Nov. 7 by federal officers and Alaska State police.

The arrest waived extradition and Jackson county sheriff's deputies will leave for Alaska in the next day or two to return him to the county for prosecution.

Dailey was apprehended about two years ago when he was attempting to burglarize the Oskoda market. After a term in Oregon state prison, he was released on parole.

A bench warrant was issued for Dailey after he subsequently broke parole. He was sought by federal officers on a charge of unlawful flight to avoid prosecution.

District Court Jury Finds Wade Guilty

Glenn M. Wade, route 2, box 395, Central Point, will be sentenced Tuesday in district court for interfering with and opening a coin operated telephone in Ashland.

A district court jury Friday found him guilty of the charge. He did not have an attorney.

Wade was arrested by Ashland city police who testified they watched as he tampered with the telephone in the glass booth on the Plaza, directly across from the police office.
