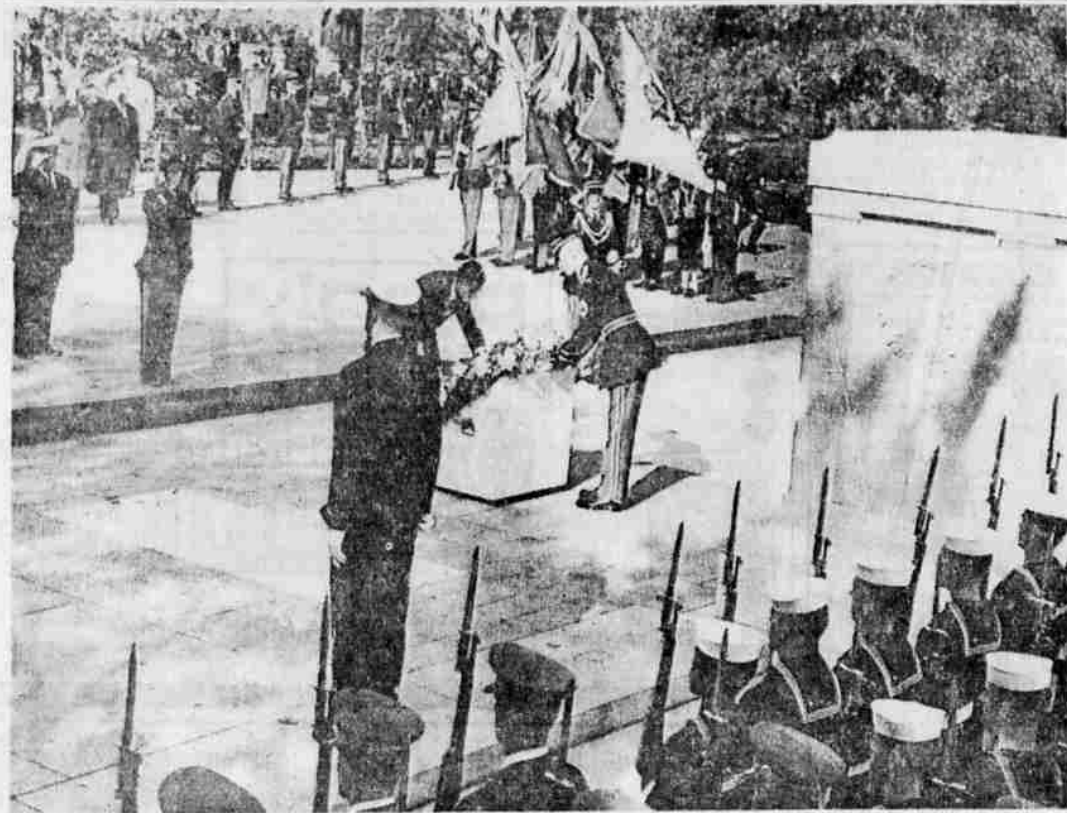

McNamara Lays Wreath at Tomb of Unknowns

Washington (UPI)—Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara laid a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknowns Sunday to mark Veterans Day observances throughout the nation.

The secretary, in a brief address, said that the nation must be prepared to risk thermonuclear war to preserve freedom.

Outlining the lessons of past conflicts, McNamara said they were the ingredients "which we have tried to apply over the past few weeks" during the Cuban crisis.

He said that a nuclear holocaust would be a disaster of unimaginable proportions, but we know also that unless we are prepared to place everything at risk, we cannot hope to save anything from disaster," he said.

In cities and towns across the land, a minute of silence was observed at 11 a.m. in memory of the men who died defending freedom in past wars—and in the cold war.

Parades, cemetery ceremonies and other observances were held in all parts of the nation—as well as overseas by Americans and their allies who fought side by side in the cause of liberty.

In Paris Americans joined in an annual ceremony at which President Charles de Gaulle placed a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

President Kennedy spent the day at the first family's Northern Virginia retreat. In a Veterans Day message, he expressed hope that "There will be no veterans of any future war—not because all have perished, but because all shall have learned to live in peace."

Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower issued a statement saying all Americans should "review in our hearts the determination to use all our energy, patience and understanding in the search for peace with justice."

Education Representatives Return From Observation Trip

A group of area education representatives have returned from an observation trip to about 10 schools in Massachusetts, Connecticut and Illinois.

The trip was made as part of an in-service project of the Oregon Program, a \$3.5 million Ford Foundation financed program to help improve education and develop new patterns in teacher education.

Visited on the tour were new school buildings designed for specific programs, team teaching situations, cooperative teaching programs, non-graded elementary schools, utilization of a multi-media visual equipment in schools, individual student study and research programs, class scheduling procedures, and administrative organizations designed to help prevent the student from becoming lost in the large high school student body.

Schools Visited—Schools visited included McPherson High school, McPherson, Kans.; Estabrook elementary school and secondary schools in Lexington, Mass.; Wayland, Mass. High school; Newton South High school, Newton, Mass.; elementary and secondary schools in Norwalk, Conn.; Evanston Township High school, Evanston, Ill.; Highland Park High school, Highland Park, Ill.; Ridgewood High school, Norridge, Ill.; and Bloom Township High school, Chicago Heights, Ill.

Information and material gathered during the school and classroom visits will be used by area educators to help improve programs in this area.

Most of the ideas adaptable in this area will be used in the Medford district in cooperation with Southern Oregon college, Ashland. The Medford district is one of 22 school districts, and SOC is one of nine colleges and universities in the state participating in the Oregon Program to improve education.

Ideas Studied—Many of the ideas in construction, class scheduling and educational program offerings may be incorporated in a new school planned in Medford.

Some members of the group toured buildings with unusual designs constructed with a specific educational program in mind and conventional school buildings adapted to the needs of various programs.

Other members of the group attended classes in non-graded elementary schools, large group instruction sessions, lecture classes in team teaching situations, and regular-sized class discussion groups to learn in detail how these programs are presented and conducted. They also talked with teachers and students to learn how programs have been accepted.

Those interested in administration discussed financing, school district organization, construction and general educational information with superintendents, board of education members, teachers, and students.

Persons Making Trip—The group making the trip included Medford and Central Point school board members, superintendents from Medford, Central Point, and Ashland, Southern Oregon college representatives, Oregon state department of education representatives, architects retained by the Medford district to design a new high school, and elementary and secondary school supervisors from Medford.

The trip to schools in the east is one of two in-service research trips planned in conjunction with the Oregon Program. Another, less extensive trip, is planned in the San Francisco area later this year.

Findings from both of the trips will be coordinated in developing programs in this area to improve education. The eastern trip and the one planned to California for Medford school representatives are being financed by non-tax monies in connection with the Oregon Program.

Participation in Government Is Urged of Veterans—"It is now up to us veterans to answer an even higher call of duty—to participate actively in government, to help the government so there will not be another great war."

Speaking was Edward Branchfield, Medford lawyer and legislator-elect. He spoke to a handful of persons who attended the dedication of the speaker's platform in the Medford library park this morning.

The dedication ceremonies were followed by a Veterans day parade through downtown Medford.

"It is entirely possible that if we have another great war there will be no veterans," Branchfield added.

As rain clouds cleared away and sun filtered through the leaves, Branchfield noted that "it usually rains" on Veterans day which seems oddly appropriate, since soldiers during all wars find themselves engulfed in mud and rain.

Veterans Can Help—It is not what we can get from the government, but how the veterans can help the government to become strong and avoid another war," the Medford lawyer said.

Relating the background of the speaker's stand, Branchfield told how Mrs. T. W. Jessie W. Miles left money for Medford park development. Most of this was used for development of Hawthorne park with the remainder used for the speaker's stand.

It took the joint efforts of the Medford city council, local Veterans Council and Pat Graham, Disabled American Veterans official, to make the speaker's stand a reality, Branchfield noted.

Spanish American War Vet—Col. William H. Paine, 92, Medford, a veteran of the Spanish American War, was introduced by Branchfield. He commented that such ceremonies "are a very wholesome thing."

Nehru Asks United States for Planes

Ousted Yemen Leader Fighting To Regain Throne

Former President Meets Newsmen

Jeddah, Saudi Arabia (UPI)—Iman Mohammed El-Badr of Yemen, first reported dead and then wounded by the military junta which overthrew him, is very much alive and waging a hard fight for the restoration of his throne.

El-Badr discussed his plans over the week end with a group of newsmen who were flown to his Yemen headquarters from Saudi Arabia.

He said his royalist troops controlled much of Yemen and were driving toward Sanaa, the seat of the Republic capital under President Brig. Abdullah Sallal, Taiz and the Fort of Hodeida.

El-Badr first reported "destroyed" when the military junta shelled the royal palace at Taiz in the Sept. 26 coup. Later, he was reported by the Republicans as wounded and confined in a Saudi Arabian hospital.

First Appearance—His recorded voice has been broadcast since his reported death, but this was his first appearance before newsmen since the coup.

El-Badr bitterly attacked United Arab Republic President Gamal Abdel Nasser, who has supported the Republicans with arms. He said the "massacres and bloodshed in Yemen" were "caused by President Nasser's lust for power and expansion."

The Imam denied Saudi and Jordanian troops were involved in the civil war in Yemen.

While Soviet Russia and the Communist bloc has recognized the new regime, the West, with the exception of West Germany, has so far refused diplomatic recognition.

Guam Destruction Said 95 Per Cent—Washington (UPI)—The governor of Guam reported to President Kennedy today that the typhoon which swept the Pacific island Sunday night destroyed 95 per cent of the civilian communities, including commercial and residential establishments.

The President ordered an immediate survey of relief needs when he received the report from acting Gov. Manuel Guerrero.

Kennedy also proclaimed the existence of a major disaster area in Guam.

Director Edward McDermott of the Office of Emergency Planning dispatched a team of experts to the island to survey the damage prior to allocation of federal relief funds.

The American Red Cross also sent five disaster workers to Guam from its Washington headquarters, Tokyo and the Philippines.

AFL-CIO Council Seeks Solution To Meany-Reuther Tiff

Washington (UPI)—The AFL-CIO Executive Council sought today to find a compromise that would end a boiling feud between President George Meany and Vice President Walter Reuther.

The 29-member council was called into closed session to fill a vacancy in its membership. Meany and Reuther, long at odds on union policy, were in violent disagreement over a choice for the job.

Neutral members of the council have been disturbed for several months that the disagreement might split the giant labor organization.

But a spokesman for Reuther said he privately had denied reports that he was planning to resign or pull out of the federation because of this dispute.

Reuther, head of the United Auto Workers, has been insisting on a selection from the ranks of the industrial, or former CIO, unions. Meany has refused to go along.

There were indications, however, that neither Meany nor Reuther wanted to push for an unconditional show-down. A union source said someone from the CIO camp, other than Reuther's first choice, probably would be selected.

Meany has enough votes in the council to elect Reuther. But if he pushed for a show-down, the highly influential Reuther might resign or pull the 1,400,000-member UAW out of the federation.

The council vacancy was created by the resignation of Leland S. Burkmaster, former president of the United Rubber Workers. The former CIO group on the council chose United Packinghouse Workers President Ralph Helstein to succeed Burkmaster.

The Meany side balked Meany was said to contend that while the industrial unions had a right to nominate their own man for the council, the union side balked.

Fruit Worker Is Killed in Accident—Attempts were still being made today to contact the next of kin of a transient fruit worker who was killed when struck by a car near Talent Saturday night.

Larsen had been employed for several seasons as a fruit worker at Suncrest Orchards in the Talent area.

Another pedestrian, Richard Lange, 61, Beaverton, was killed when he was struck by a car near Beaverton Friday night, according to United Press International, to be the other traffic accident fatality during the week end in the state.

Craft Needed To Bolster Defenses In Border War

Machinery To Make Arms Also Requested

New Delhi (UPI)—Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru said today that India had asked the United States for military aircraft to bolster Indian defenses in the border war with Red China. He also asked for American machinery to produce arms in India.

The U.S. Embassy here confirmed that both requests were under consideration.

On the fighting fronts, India reported its troops had driven back two new Chinese Communist probing attacks in the Northeast Frontier area during the week end.

A Defense Ministry spokesman said the engagements took place a few miles northeast of Jang, in the region of the monastery town of Tawang, and in the far eastern stretch of the Northeast Frontier near Walong.

A Communist New China news agency broadcast said Indian troops shelled Communist forces heavily Saturday in both the Walong and Tawang areas. New China said Indian heavy artillery fired more than 100 rounds on Chinese positions.

The broadcast heard in London also said Indians have increased their air drops of supplies as well as flights over Communist positions.

The spokesman said two Indian patrols contacted Chinese Red troops near Walong and fire was exchanged. He said the Chinese troops "were forced to withdraw."

Norstad Declares NATO Deficiencies 'Serious'—Paris (UPI)—Supreme Allied Commander Gen. Lauris Norstad warned today that NATO forces in Europe are "critically short" and suffer from "deficiencies of serious proportions."

Norstad expressed confidence, however, that Europe can be defended. He disclosed he has ordered a move forward defense in most of Central Europe rather than holding rear positions.

Norstad addressed the eighth annual Conference of Parliamentarians of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization countries.

The supreme allied commander was to have retired from his post Oct. 31 but he was asked to stay a few months longer because of the Cuban crisis.

The fact is, and I have made no secret of it, that our forces are critically short in a number of ways—There are deficiencies of serious proportions," Norstad told the 13-nation conference.

French Foreign Minister Maurice Couve de Murville told the conference earlier that Europe would have been involved if a war had broken out over Cuba.

"Everyone here understood that if it had developed further all would have been involved quickly," Couve de Murville said.

The French foreign minister said it would have been difficult to keep a conflict over Cuba confined to just the United States and the Soviet Union.

Couve de Murville described the Soviet nuclear weapons in Cuba as "both offensive and provocative." He said the United States had the "perfectly justifiable feeling that its national security was directly menaced by the Soviet Union."

Island Declared Disaster Area In Wake of Storm

Damage Estimated At \$100 Million

Tokyo (UPI)—Typhoon Karen churned through the Pacific tonight toward the Philippine island of Luzon after raking Guam with winds of 175 miles an hour and causing \$100-million damage.

At least one Guam civilian was reported killed and hundreds injured. Thousands of persons were reported homeless in the wake of the storm that swept over the island Sunday night.

The U.S. Navy said there were no casualties among U.S. military forces or their dependents.

After striking Guam, the storm raced west-northwest toward heavily populated Luzon at 19 miles per hour. It was expected to be about 350 miles off Luzon's east coast within the next 24 hours.

Mightiest Blow—The Navy said it was the mightiest blow a typhoon ever has dealt Guam.

In San Francisco, federal officials declared the island a disaster area, making it eligible to receive low-interest loans for rebuilding.

U.S. Air Force officials at Fuchu weather station near Tokyo said damage was particularly heavy to structures at Anderson Air Force Base. Anderson is the only Strategic Air Command base in the vast western Pacific.

A Navy spokesman in Honolulu said every four out of five civilian homes lost their rooftops as the eye of the storm passed over the island, the westernmost United States possession.

The Navy said Guam's hospitals were being swamped with a steady stream of injured civilians.

The U.S. military newspaper Pacific Stars and Stripes quoted the U.S. Navy radio station at Agaña, the capital city, as saying that "many buildings at Agaña were totally destroyed and many others badly damaged."

The report said a powerful storm winds toppled at least 30 per cent of the utility poles in Agaña and at least half of Guam's natives were left homeless. The island has about 67,000 residents.

Typhoon Karen was described as slightly larger than the average typhoon in the Pacific. It was said to be moving west into the open sea at about 15 miles an hour and did not pose an immediate threat to any other land areas.

Discount Available On Property Taxes—Property taxes must be paid by Nov. 15 to receive the three per cent discount, Mrs. Marjorie Brooks, chief tax deputy, has reminded residents.

During October delinquent real and personal property taxes collected totaled \$108,192.75, Mrs. Brooks said. This compares to \$70,586.38 for the same period last year.

Of the total collected for the month, \$40,659.49 was delinquent personal property taxes. A portion of this was levied as far back as fiscal year 1960-61, she added.

Personal property taxes collected after they became delinquent total \$30,796.79 since Sept. 17, the date a tax deputy was assigned to the department, it was reported.
