Amazing LA Blades Nab Fifth Victory In Row

The amazing Los Angeles Blades are skittering along four points in front of everybody in the Western Hockey League's Southern Division, and the turnaround from 1961 to 1962 in the league — for the moment at least — is complete. At the close of last season Los Angeles fretted in the cellar of the Southern Division and Vancouver occupied a similar stall in the Northern division. Now the Blades, during a five-game win streak, top the southern leg and Vancouver is four points in front in the north. The Blades chalked up number five Monday night, a 5-1 rout of Edmonton at the Los Angeles Sports Arena that was never in doubt. There was no other action in the league. Lloyd Haddon of the Blades rained in two goals in the second period and another in the third to register a hat trick and exceed by one his total point production for the season prior to Monday night. Bob Solinger added two goals for Los Angeles as the Blades coasted to their fourth win at home without a loss. It was Edmonton's fifth straight loss. In Seattle, league headquar-

ABL Plans Doubleheader As Experiment

Chicago — (UPI) — The Chicago Majors and the Philadelphia Tapers will play a "doubleheader" in Philadelphia Thursday night — two games of 30 minutes each. American Basketball League Commissioner Abe Saperstein said the teams will play two 15-minute halves, and after a break the second game will be played. Each game will count in the standings and the teams will switch home and road uniforms. In normal league games, each game has four 12-minute quarters for a total of 48 minutes. Saperstein said the league will experiment with the "doubleheaders" this season. League schedules start Wednesday night. The fans will get 12 additional minutes of basketball and, Saperstein said, "two exciting finishes instead of one."

Rams Refuse To Write Off 1962 Season

Los Angeles — (UPI) — The Los Angeles Rams refuse to write off the 1962 season as a total failure despite having won only one game, and will use their best players in an effort to win, according to coach Harland Svare. Svare, who took over as interim head coach on the resignation of Bob Waterfield, told the Southern California Football Writers Monday why he could not just forget about this season and concentrate on developing young talent for next year. "It's not fair to the players and the fans," he explained. "A football team can't just give up. We feel an obligation to go with our best players and not use men just to give them playing experience for the future." Svare disclosed some of his players felt the Baltimore Colts were responsible for some key penalties against the Rams in Sunday's game. "Some of our men complained somebody on the Baltimore side was calling out the 'set' signal while Zeke Bratkowski was giving his signals," he said. Baltimore won 14-2.

Phoenix-Elmira Playoff Date Still Up in Air

Phoenix — The date of this week end's A-2 playoff game between Phoenix and Elmira, at Phoenix, still had not been determined this morning. Team president Harry Wisner admitted he had been negotiating with two New York parties for the sale of the Titans. The Titans, who lost to the Dallas Texans, 52-31, Sunday, have one of the lowest attendance records in the AFL. The league has paid the player salaries for the past two weeks, a total of about \$90,000. Wisner will refund these monies to the league treasury upon sale of the club.

French Horse Wins International Race

Laurel, Md. — (UPI) — A close but clear victory by France's Match II in the \$175,000 Washington International left U.S. "Horse of the Year" honors unsettled today and smudged up the luster that usually goes with the American title.
Match II, under a masterful ride by jockey Yves Sain Martin came through in the stretch Monday to defeat Kelso by 1 1/2 lengths and outclass two other top U.S. rivals, Carry Back and Beau Purple.
What had been anticipated as a decisive meeting that would settle the Horse of the Year award in American racing wound up with a French thoroughbred winning for the third time in the 11th running of the International.
In the mile-and-a-half race on a grass track, Kelso made a game run for the \$70,050 first place purse, but midway down the stretch Match II slid inside on the rail and pulled ahead steadily to take the honors.
For Kelso, it was the gelding's second straight runner-up finish at the annual Veterans Day event at Laurel. It also prevented him from soaring above the \$1 million mark in earnings for his owner, Mrs. Richard C. DuPont.
Carry Back, finished third, 4 1/2 lengths back of Kelso, made a determined effort to recoup the international prestige lost abroad earlier this year when he came in 10th in the Arc de Triomphe in Paris. The 1961 Kentucky Derby winner stayed close to Kelso until the stretch but couldn't quite match the pace.
Beau Purple, a co-favorite before the event, set a blazing pace and was running up front with Kelso and Carry Back for the first mile, then slipped badly to a poor 11th.
Kelso's jockey, Ismael Valenzuela, blamed the fast early pace set by Beau Purple for the ultimate loss of the race in the stretch. He said he knew Match II was coming strong behind him for the finish "but couldn't do anything about it."
Sain Martin said that he

didn't try to match the pace of the leaders at the outset. "But when I asked him to run, he answered," the veteran French jockey said.
Netter Match II's owner, Francois Dupre, nor his trainer, Francois Mathel, came to this country to watch their entry at the Laurel event.
However, a crowd of 32,800 turned out in crisp, sunny weather to see the race, including Soviet Ambassador Anatoly Dobrynin. He saw one of Russia's government-bred horses, Zabez, finish fourth, which was worth 11,000 capitalist dollars.
After that came France's Kistine; England's Pardoo; Germany's Opponent; another Soviet entry, Livan; Italy's Delvin; Japan's Takamagahara; Beau Purple; Canada's Lebon M. L.; and Peru's Porfido, who was eased up midway in the race. The winning time was 2:28 1/5 off the record set last year by T.V. Lark.

Quarterback Quits Los Angeles State

Los Angeles — (UPI) — Some quarterbacks like to have their coach call the plays, but Los Angeles State's Dean Bond obviously doesn't — and he quit the team at halftime during Saturday's game to prove his point.
At odds with coach Bud Adams during the season, the senior quarterback ignored a play sent in by the coach against Long Beach State and called his own pattern. Adams quickly pulled Bond out of the game.
Bond went into the locker room with the team at halftime, but as the rest of the club rested he got dressed and left the stadium.
Long Beach State won the game 23-22.

Beavers May Break Records In Colorado

Corvallis — (UPI) — The Oregon State Beavers drilled for one and one-half hours Monday on blocking, defense line plays, and dummy offense.
There were no serious injuries from last week's 32-0 win over Idaho. Only center John Farrell, injured two weeks ago, was still likely to be sidelined with a bad shoulder when Oregon State hosts Colorado State this week end.
More than one record could be broken this week end. The Beavers are approaching their total season mark, and end Vern Burke is about to pass the NCAA yardage record for passes received.
