Facilities For The Retarded Opened In Grants Pass Area

Grants Pass — Openings of two private facilities for the care and training of mentally retarded children were announced here recently.

One will be a training school for retarded children between the ages of 7 and 17 who have been diagnosed as "untrainable"; the other is a licensed foster home offering care and basic training from birth to six years. Both are located in the area west of Grants Pass.

"Untrainable"

The training school, to be known as Sunny Hours school, will be directed by Mrs. Frances Keener, who formerly operated similar facilities at Laguna Beach and Costa Mesa, Calif., working with children refused by other schools as "untrainable."

Holder of a masters degree in child psychology and therapy, Mrs. Keener is a pioneer advocate of home training rather than institutional care for the severely retarded. The school's purpose will be

to train the children so that they can, in time, take their place in their own homes.

Sunny Hours, Inc., will be administered by a six-man board, three from California, and three to be named locally.

Care and training for mentally retarded babies will be offered at a newly established foster home here by Mrs. Clarence Wilson, who for the past 20 years has been associated with similar facilities in Spokane, Wash., and in Idaho.

Both Mrs. Keener and Mrs. Wilson said they chose to locate in Oregon when they were informed of a need in this state for such facilities.

Both coincidentally settled on the Grants Pass area — Mrs. Wilson because of its "more favorable climatic conditions," and Mrs. Keener because she was able to secure property here that offered "the most ideal environment for the tranquility, harmony and emotional stability of the children."

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75 Show Up For Dedication of New Building in Yreka

Yreka — Sen. Randolph Collier, introduced by Capt. Charles McAllister of the Yreka patrol, acted as master of ceremonies at the dedication of the new officer building of the California Highway patrol and Bureau of Motor Vehicles.

The program was held between rain showers last Friday morning at 10 a.m. at the site of the building, which is located on the old highway south of Yreka.

Approximately 75 persons attended the dedication and heard speakers from the surrounding areas and officials from Sacramento.

Among those speaking were Bradford Crittenden, commissioner of the patrol, and Tom Bright, director of the bureau of motor vehicles.
