1963 Legislature To Be Experienced, Survey Indicates

Salem — Sixty-nine of the 90 members of the 1963 legislature have legislative experience, a survey indicates today. This is a high number, and assures the session of basic legislative skills. Of the 90 members, 21 were in the 1961 legislature and 69 were new. The 1961 legislature was back in the Senate. They include Democrats Edward N. Padley, Eugene Tom Monahan, Milwaukee Glenn Stader, Ed. Don S. Willner, Portland, and Republicans Robert Elstrom, Salem, and Arthur Ireland, Forest Grove. This leaves only three persons in the Senate who have never been legislators before. They are Democrats Glenn Houston, Albany and Ted Hall, Astoria, and Republicans John J. Innes, Oregon City. Thirty-seven of the 60 members of the 1961 House were re-elected.

Additionally, five persons who were House members before the 1961 session are back. They include Democrats J. E. "Jack" Bennett and Berkeley Lent, and Republicans Shirley Field, Fred Meek and John Mosser, all of Portland. The upshot is that 42 men and women out of the new House crew of 60 have law making experience.

Douglas Fir Beetles May Be Used To Control Infestations

Corvallis — Douglas fir beetles that have caused millions of dollars damage to Northwest forests — and that pose a tremendous threat in the future because of the Oct. 12 storm — may be "used against themselves" in new control programs eyed by Oregon State University.

The OSU forest entomologists are hopeful that the female beetle can be used as a "bait" to draw other beetles to their destruction and thus help check the beetle build-up in years to come.

The idea for the unique control program stems from research done by Dr. Julius A. Rudinsky on the life cycle and behavior of the tiny beetle.

Education Specialist Now In South Korea

Delmar J. Dooley, a specialist in rural education, has been appointed area director of Near East Foundation's programs in South Korea, according to the foundation's New York office.

Dooley, whose wife is the former Miss Thalia Doty, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur E. Doty, route 2, Central Point, recently completed his master's degree in education at the University of Missouri.

Mr. and Mrs. Dooley, and their two children, Douglas and Alan, were to arrive Nov. 9 in Seoul.

Dooley will head a team of six technicians in administering a program of technical guidance to government and local officials in a nationwide rural improvement program.

Before his appointment in June, 1955, as community development specialist with the foundation in Iran, Dooley was an instructor in agriculture at Lakeview, Ore., for two years.

Surprise Fire Drills Said Best

New York — "Why 'fire drills' in schools are considered to be fireproof, fire resistant and seemingly indestructible."

And what is a "fire drill" anyway? Is it really necessary?

The International Association of Fire Chiefs reports that there are 12 major school fires a day on the average across the nation — including some in fireproof buildings.

The association said the best guard against fire occurring in a particular school involves sticking to a planned program of fire prevention activities.

Step two of the program includes frequent, well planned and intelligently coordinated fire drills.

Younger children, exposed to fire drills perhaps for the first time in their lives, require conditioning, not only to fire drill procedure but to the psychology of the drill itself.

The association suggested that drills be started during the early days of the school term and performed in an unhurried way so that all of the details can be explained to students.

The drills, to be most effective, occur the surprise way.

The odor-attractant approach to control has good possibilities for the future, Rudinsky believes, but techniques for widespread field use have to be developed.

Possible Control Programs

And all possible control programs — salvage logging, chemicals, use of predators that feed on the beetles, and anything else — will be needed during the next few years, Rudinsky predicts.

The timber losses during the 1949-52 when beetles ruined 1,949-52 when beetles ruined 3,000,000,000 board feet of timber — enough to build 300,000 homes.

Have Good Resistance

Healthy trees have good resistance to beetle attack but dead, down and seriously weakened trees become ideal breeding spots. And once populations build up to tremendous proportions, the beetles feed on any trees in sight. Even healthy trees are overcome by sheer numbers, it was explained.

Rudinsky's studies on the Douglas fir beetle — and other damaging bark beetles as well — are supported in part by a \$40,000 grant from the National Science Foundation.

Working on the project also is Dr. W. P. Naeff, who recently joined the OSU forest entomology staff.

Dr. J. P. Vite of Boyce Thompson Institute, Forest Research Laboratory, Grass Valley, Calif., is cooperating in the beetle control work along with two OSU graduate students, Cary B. Pitman and Robert L. Garz.

Two other graduate students, LeRoy N. Kline and Dan M. Harman, are working on the predator approach to control.

Principal Projects

Among principal projects fostered by Henderson and his staff, and considered by the OBA in making the award were direct financial support of the 4-H and FFA state-wide programs, financial backing to enable two rural Oregon youths to live for six months in a foreign country under sponsorship of the International Farm Youth Exchange program; designation of key bankers in each county to work closely with agricultural leaders; sponsorship of the annual Farmers' Day at 4-H summer school, providing entertainment; participation by OBA members at the Oregon State fair and elsewhere; and sponsoring an annual luncheon for 100 bankers and agricultural leaders.

Miss Horner said that while the greatest need continues to be for teachers, the Peace Corps provides service opportunities in nearly every skilled area.

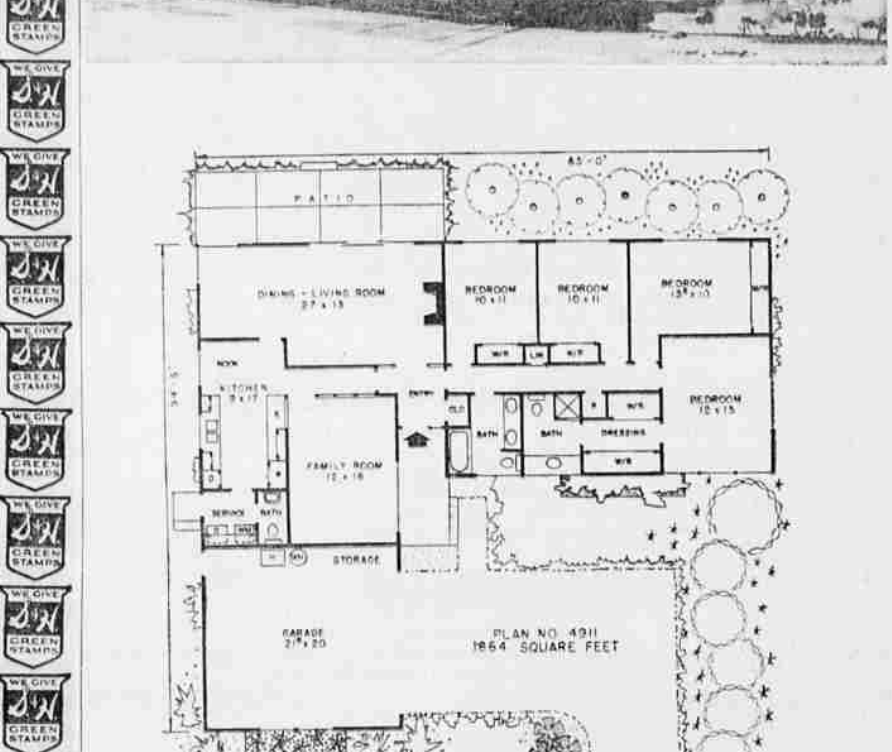
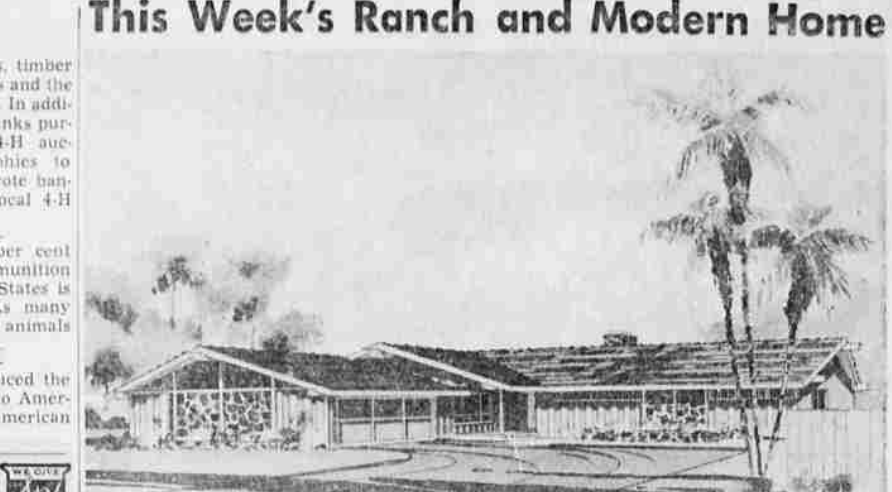
Also considered in the award was the conducting of an annual Agricultural clinic at Oregon State university, and conducting a one and a half day agricultural conference at Redmond.

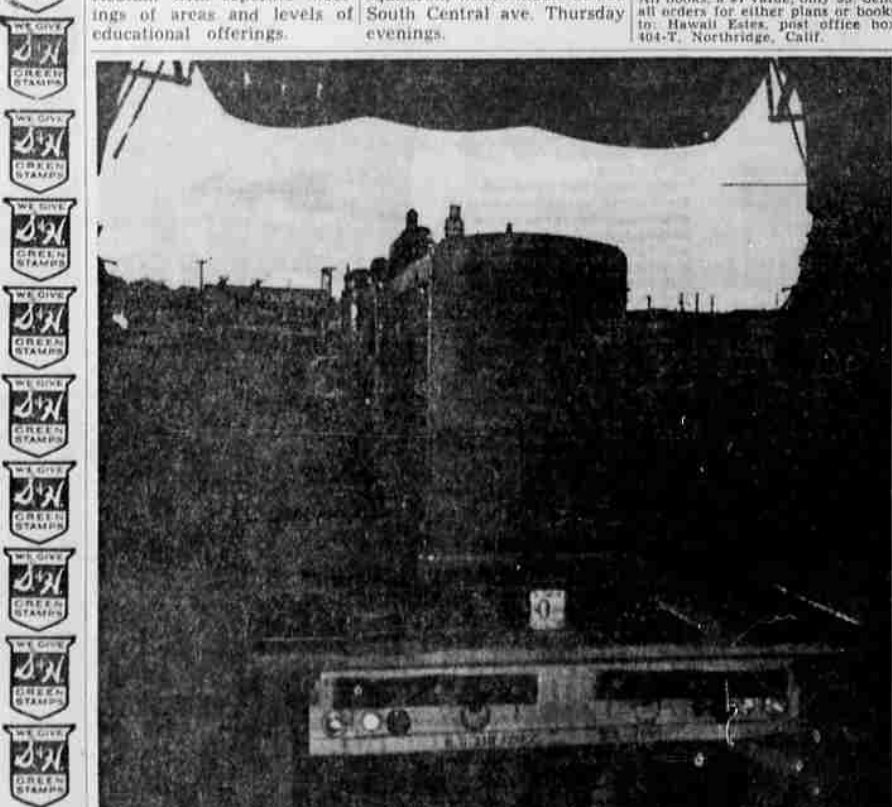
Making the visitation from the parent organization were Maj. W. M. Carrel and M. Sgt. U. S. Brown.
