

Phoenix Entertains Elmira High In A-2 Quarterfinal on Saturday

Phoenix—Two teams with comparable records will be opponents here on Saturday night when the Phoenix high Pirates host the Elmira Falcons in an Oregon Class A-2 state quarterfinal football game.

The Falcons will come here with an undefeated record for 1962. They have played nine games, strictly within the confines of the Emerald League which corresponds to District 5. Elmira has dropped only one game over the past two seasons, giving the Williams Valley school a 17-1 standing for two years.

Phoenix, from the Rogue League and state co-champion in 1961, was unbeaten and undefeated last year. With a 7-1 campaign this fall, the Pirates are 18-1-2 for two seasons.

Stubborn Defense
Elmira will bring a Falcon aggregation with powerful ground offense and stubborn defensive might. The Emerald champs, headed by Dave Mooers and Tom Tanner, have rolled up 2,189 rushing yards in winning to their crown. Falcon defense, meanwhile, has held its opposition on only 289 ground scrimmage yards.

Mooers, fullback and at 185 pounds the biggest member of the team, has carried 197 times for 1,178 yards and Tanner, 140 fullback and fastest member of the team, has run



on 147 occasions for a net of 762.

The Falcons, who have scored 263 points to opponents 55, had their closest call in their final regular season game. They barely nosed McKenzie last Saturday 13 to 12. Their most lopsided victory was over Central Linn by 51 to 0.

Phoenix 252, Foes 68

Elmira's only loss last year was Drain which Phoenix eliminated in the quarterfinal round.

Phoenix this season has outscored its opposition 252 to 68 and has collected 99 first downs to rivals' 91.

Statistics completed for eight of nine games showed 2,215 net scrimmage yards for the Pirates to opponents 1,635. Phoenix topped its foes in rushing 1,900 yards to 1,024 but the opposition outpassed the Bucs 611 to 315. Immediately on a available were comparative yardage statistics for the game with Rogue River.

Jim Conabrock has scored 81 points for Phoenix, Dennis Grennan 62, Dave Johnson 45, Ron Williams 27 and Jon Granby 21.

Conabrock packed the ball 102 times for 837 yards for the Pirates, according to the eight game totals. Other rushing leaders have been Grennan 463 for 106, Johnson 411 for 35, Williams 106 for 24, Lloyd Campbell 93 for 12 and Granby 75 for 18.

Williams in the eight games completed 17 of 35 passes.

Nucleus of 10
Coach Don Swartz, in his second season at Elmira, has built this season's contingent around a nucleus of some 10

lettermen. Among them is Henry Drummond, a 180-pound, 6-2 tackle in his fourth season on the Falcon varsity. Quarterback Bob Stackhouse is a third year varsity man.

Phoenix began the season with an all-lettermen starting offensive crew but Coach Jack Woodward and players, alike, feel that only last week end did they shape into a strong unit.

At Phoenix today Woodward reported that guard Dave Westfall, whose duty has been limited by a hand fracture, probably will start on offense against the Falcons. He may not open on defense but nevertheless should see a lot of duty when Elmira has the ball. The mentor also said that Rick Dorman may start at a defensive halfback rather than Dennis Grennan.

Navy Coach Maintains USC Fudging

Los Angeles — UP — Charges by Navy coach Wayne Hardin have turned a budding football rivalry into a verbal cold war between the Middles and University of Southern California Trojans are fudging in their offensive maneuvers.

John McKay, coach of the No. 1 rated Trojans, was fuming after hearing reports Hardin accused the USC squad of "illegal motions, illegal formations and illegal procedures."

Hardin, who was on the receiving end of a few weeks back when a Navy end "limped" to the sideline in a sleeper play against Pittsburg, claimed USC linemen used a jerking motion to draw opponents offside.

After seven straight victories, McKay said, "I don't know what we're doing wrong, if anything." He was "very surprised and a little shocked," not to mention angry. He amplified his statement later by saying, "As far as I know, we operate within the rules of football."
