Safari Salad

Virginia's safari salad was created originally for all-day outings because its cooked oriental vegetables remain crisp for hours. Combine 1 cup of cooked, drained kidney beans with 1 cup of cooked, drained bean sprouts. Marinate overnight in refrigerator. The next day, add 1 cup of cooked bamboo shoots or water chestnuts, drained, and ½ cup each of drained, chopped pimientos, olives, celery and green onions. Toss along mayonnaise thickened to taste with soy sauce to add before serving. Serves 6 to 8.

Vary your favorite waffle batter by adding to it one tablespoon of grated orange peel. Bake as usual. Serve with orange slices and plenty of honey.

Wines Listed for Serving With Thanksgiving Turkey

San Francisco - "Which wine shall I serve with turkey?" Every year the question puzzles people who often enjoy wine with their meals, but who want to be sure of the "right" one on a special occasion like Thanksgiving. They ask the Wine Institute of California by the hundreds, and receive this answer, either a red or white dinner wine is complementary with turkey.

For the reds, choose burgundy, claret or one of the varietals (a wine named for the grape from which it is made), pinot noir, cabernet sauvignon or zinfandel, among others. For the whites, choose sauternes, chablis or a Rhine wine type. Pinot chardonnay, dry semillon and chardonnay are some of the white varietals.

The red wines are usually served at cool room temperature, the whites well chilled. Allow about two hours in the refrigerator to bring them to a pleasant coolness.

Some hostesses offer both red and white wines, and let guests make their own choice. Others serve rose, the light, dry pink wine produced in California, because it goes well with all kinds of food.

On such a festive occasion as Thanksgiving, sparkling wines are sure to be before dinner beverage, and right on through the turkey course as well. Champagne, labeled "brut" to indicate its dryness, pink champagne or sparkling rose, or the slightly sweeter sparkling burgundy are other appropriate choices.

In fact, the same device holds true on Thanksgiving as any other day, serve the wine you like best. That's the word from the men who produce most of our own country's wine.

Wool Staging Comeback Because of New Processes

Corvallis - New wool fabrics with longer wear plus resistance to shrinking, wrinkling, and soiling appear to be staging a comeback for more of America's \$25 billion annual clothing sales.

New advances in wool processing were reported at Oregon State university's annual Sheep and Wool day by Dr. Harold P. Lundgren, director of the USDA's Wool and Mohair Laboratory at Albany, Calif.

As a textile fiber, wool has always been highly prized for its rich appearance, softness, and tailoring. These qualities, along with ease of cleaning and flame resistance, have helped wool maintain a market close to 13 per cent of all fabrics used annually in apparel goods in this country, Dr. Lundgren explained.

Market inroads by synthetic fabrics were made primarily through their resistance to shrinking, wrinkling of light weight fabrics, and moth damage - special advantages that are now being redressed by improvements in wool products, the researcher stated.

New Treatment

A new treatment developed at the California laboratories now permits laundering and machine-drying of wool fabrics that require only a light touchy ironing. Dr. Lundgren said several of this country's largest wool fabric manufacturers are now conducting mill trials on such specially-treated wools.

Treated wool fabrics are also more resistant to abrasive wear than untreated fabrics - wearing as much as 200 per cent better in some cases, it was noted. The new treatment involves use of an ultra-thin resin coating on the surface of the fibers. Dr. Lundgren and the laboratories are now exploring possibilities of incorporating chemicals with the resins to give such added advantages as permanent mothproofing, greater soil resistance, and water repellency.

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Today's Woman Really Weaker Sex Says Retired Dean Gildersleeve

New York - UPI - Virginia C. Gildersleeve, who spent 36 years as dean of a woman's college, holds the strong opinion that today's woman truly is the weaker sex.

This, she said, is true despite the "lip service paid to the equality of woman with man in education and careers."

Miss Gildersleeve deplors this weakness, from the standpoint of developing and using much-needed feminine brains, as well as masculine.

"When is today's woman going to have time to be a Madame Curie?" asked the internationally famous educator. She has just observed her 85th birthday.

"I think women are worse off now than they were 30 or 40 years ago," she said in a telephone interview from her home in Bedford Village, N.Y. "Professionally and educationally, women are not going onward and upward. I attribute this partly to the overemphasis on sex. Women think of getting married. If you remain single, as I did, you're something odd."

Pressure To Marry

"There is a great deal of pressure to get married," she continued. "Women now marry younger."

"We need the educated housewife certainly."

"But in our times, there aren't enough brains to go

around. Somewhere along the line, we've got to catch up and catch the best brains."

Miss Gildersleeve explores the nature of today's woman in her new book, "A Hoard For Winter" Columbia University Press, 13 essays she wrote between her 75th and 82nd years and dedicated to her "daughters" at Barnard College, New York.

She was graduated from Barnard in 1899 and was dean of the college, the woman's branch of Columbia, from 1911 until her retirement in 1947. Miss Gildersleeve first joined the college staff as English instructor in 1900.

Have More Work

In her essays, she observes that "the vast majority of American women today are by force of circumstances compelled to labor more continuously, in and out of the home, than any woman of the past in a society with a comparable standard of living."

Miss Gildersleeve is outspoken on subjects other than today's woman.

Education, for instance. "My impression is that it's flabby," she said. "Too easy. Parents and teachers don't want to make children work. Some of the professional educators have strange habits. They're more interested in adjusting us to society than in training minds. I have a belief about training minds."

On the world's future - "I'm an optimist." She reminded that she helped charter the United Nations 17 years ago and added that it is "man's best chance for peace and well-being" along with the world's "hope for survival."

Sense of Adventure

On having reached 85 years of age - "As I approach the tip end of life itself, I find that I can look out into the unknown reaches of eternity with something of my old eager sense of high adventure."

The dean emerita lives in a Bedford Village house built by John Jay, first chief justice of the United States. It is believed to have been designed by Thomas Jefferson. Miss Gildersleeve's father was a justice of the Supreme Court of New York state from 1894 to 1909.

On the telephone, she sounded many years younger than her 85 but confessed "I wobble a bit when I walk."

I told her I'd call her again to wish her a happy birthday when she reached 90.

"Oh, do!" she replied.
