Small Freighter Listing Badly In Stormy Ocean

Bodies of Greek Ship Crew Sighted

Hamilton, Bermuda —UPI—Thirteen crewmen of a Canadian ship en route home from Cuba were rescued in stormy seas Saturday night by a motor vessel that sped to aid the listing freighter.

Hamilton, Bermuda —UPI—A small freighter — possibly a Canadian ship en route home from Cuba — was sighted listing badly in still stormy seas Saturday night by an airplane looking for bodies of more crewmen from an abandoned Greek freighter.

The Coast Guard here, now directing the search for 18 crewmen lost at sea when they abandoned the burning Greek freighter SS Captain George, said the second ship in distress was listing almost 25 degrees.

Shortly before the plane saw flames from the small freighter, bodies of crewmen from the 422-foot Captain George were sighted in the water. The Coast Guard said its cutter Mendota had picked up three of the bodies in seas still running 30 feet high.

An airplane circling the smaller vessel radioed it had seen a small boat over its side but could not tell whether any crewmen were in it. The pilot estimated the length of the craft at between 150 and 170 feet.

(In New York, the Coast Guard said it did not know why the vessel had not radioed an SOS or its name.)

(But a spokesman said one ship was reported overdue in that area — the Canadian East Star, a 155-foot vessel that left Havana Oct. 23 or 24 for the return to Halifax. ("I don't know whether this is the ship or not," the spokesman in New York said, "but it's a possibility.")

High seas capsize a second lifeboat launched by the Captain George Thursday when it was seized by a fire in its explosive-laden hull and buffeted by a fierce storm.

The first lifeboat had made it to safety with one of two rescue ships that steamed to the aid of the Captain George. But of the 20 men in the second, only two were rescued.

The Coast Guard here said that no SOS had been received from the small freighter, but a spokesman said that atmospheric conditions and the storm were disrupting communications in the area.

Motorists Advised To Carry Chains

Motorists traveling out of the Rogue valley were advised to carry chains this week end, state police reported.

There were snow flurries in the Siskiyou and on the Green Springs highway, but it was late Saturday night the pavement was bare. Oregon mountain on highway 199 was clear.

Diamond lake cutoff had two inches of new snow and 10 inches of roadside snow.

Ten inches of snow was reported at Crater Lake National park with chains required.

RUSSIA DETONATES NUCLEAR DEVICE

Washington —UPI—The Soviet Union detonated a nuclear device in the atmosphere Saturday just three days short of the reported cut-off time for the current Russian testing series.

ADENAUER FAILS TO PERSUADE PARTNERS

Bonn —UPI—Chancellor Konrad Adenauer failed in two meetings Saturday to persuade his coalition partners to withdraw their demand for the resignation of Defense Minister Franz Josef Strauss — a demand that could topple the government.

WEATHER THREATENS BRITISH SHIPPING

London —UPI—Gale winds and driving snow Saturday night threatened shipping off the British Isles, throwing one tanker on the rocks and capsizing a lifeboat returning from a rescue mission.

Leopoldville, The Congo —UPI—U.S. Ambassador Edmond Gullion leaves for Washington today after being recalled for an "urgent parley" in the state department on the Congo situation, an American Embassy spokesman said Saturday.

OREGON CITY SOLDIER HELD IN SPAIN

Gerona, Spain —UPI—Three American Army enlisted men were held in custody Saturday, accused of beating up a Spanish policeman, the Guardia Civil (Rural Police) said.

The police identified the men as Ralph M. Davis of Woodland, Calif., Don Kuhn of Custer, Ky., and Robert Beckwith of Oregon City, Ore. A U.S. military spokesman in Madrid said they were based at the 26th combat battalion in Heilbronn, Germany.

Kennedy, Ike Aid In Dedication of New Dulles Airport

Chantilly, Va. —UPI—President Kennedy and former President Dwight D. Eisenhower Saturday dedicated the controversial \$110 million Dulles International airport under skies so laden that an Air Force acrobatic show had to be called off.

The sprawling monster 27 miles from Washington in the rolling Virginia countryside will open for aviation business Monday. It was designed primarily for jet traffic and is twice the size of New York's Idlewild International airport.

Before a crowd of 60,000 persons, Kennedy hailed the field as a great airport at a great time in the life of our country.

Fitting Name
Eisenhower said it was fitting that it had been named after his globe-trotting secretary of state, the late John Foster Dulles.

"In the years to come," he said, "this will be the touch-down and takeoff for diplomats and dignitaries visiting Washington. I hope they will demonstrate a measure of the genius, patience, understanding and perseverance that marked the life of John Foster Dulles."

"By merely setting foot on an airfield bearing his name," he added, "I am sure they will gain new strength and new determination to seek new ways to solve the problems of the world."

The airfield, which is still unfinished, is dominated by the soaring terminal building designed by the late and famed architect Eric Saarinen. Before his death, the Finnish-94, Saarinen, designer of such buildings as the TWA terminal at Idlewild and the U. S. Embassy building in London, called Dulles terminal "the best thing I have done."

The 600-foot long building represents a giant humpback. The somewhat swayed-back roof is suspended between parallel rows of huge modernistic columns that form the front and the back. It has two acres of sloping glass curtain walls.

Kennedy said that "this building, I think, symbolizes the aspirations of the United States in the 1950s and 1960s."

"I hope it will be possible, building on what has been done here at Dulles airport, that we will make sure that all of our airports and all of our ports at the seas, and all of the people who work on them, show a face of America to the world which is our best face."

The limited visibility would not have deterred commercial operations. Planes can land and take off at the field in visibility of a half mile or less.

Huge Narcotics Raid Nets Eight In California

Glendale, Calif. —UPI—More than \$6 million worth of heroin was confiscated Saturday in one of the biggest narcotics hauls in California history.

Six men and two women were taken into custody in a series of raids that climaxed nearly three months of investigation by state narcotics agents and local police.

G. M. Coster, field supervisor for the State Bureau of Narcotics Enforcement, said the 6½ pounds of pure heroin confiscated in the pre-dawn raids would have brought about \$6.4 million on the illegal "retail" market. He explained peddlers customarily "cut" the narcotic, a process of diluting it, before retailing it.

Helicopters Used

The intensive investigation included such cloak-and-dagger methods as helicopters trailing secretly marked cars with infra-red equipment, use of electronic monitoring devices, and undercover agents.

An undercover agent had gathered the alleged head operators of the ring together Saturday morning in a motel when 23 narcotics agents and local officers moved in for the initial arrests.

About a third of the heroin confiscated was found in the motel, and the rest in a subsequent raid on a residence in neighboring Los Angeles.

Arrested were Francisco Rodriguez, 33, Los Angeles, described by officers as the ring leader, and his brother, Manuel, 31, Torrance; Robert Valdemar, alias Bobby Vito, 24, and his wife, Maria, 26, Los Angeles; Donald Mesado, 24, Highland Park, and his brother, Daniel, 24, Los Angeles; and Ernest H. Flores, 31, and his wife, Anpara, 32, Los Angeles.

California Demos Pick Candidate

Santa Rosa, Calif. —UPI—First Congressional district Democrats Saturday selected William Grader to represent the party in a special election to fill the seat of his late boss, Congressman Clem Miller.

Grader, 45, a Fort Bragg businessman, had been field representative for Miller during the four years he held office.

Miller was killed last month in a plane crash near Eureka while flying on a campaign tour. He nevertheless was re-elected over Republican Donald Clausen Nov. 6, thereby setting in motion machinery for the special election, called by Gov. Edmund Brown for Jan. 22.

Federal Agents Smash Pro-Castro Sabotage Ring

Attache To UN Mission Arrested

New York —UPI—Fast moving federal authorities Saturday smashed a ring of pro-Castro Cubans who allegedly planned a widespread sabotage-terror campaign through two states with explosives supplied by the Cuban mission to the United Nations.

The FBI arrested three leaders of the campaign — including a newly arrived attache to the Cuban UN mission who carried a pistol and "secret explosive formulas." Agents said the attache tried to swallow the formulas when caught.

Agents said 10 members of their sabotage and espionage "school" had been subpoenaed by a New York grand jury that will hear evidence of what a U.S. attorney called plans to use explosives against "men, women and children."

Two other members of the Cuban United Nations Mission took part in the conspiracy but could not be arrested because of diplomatic immunity, agents said.

Recall Demanded

At the United Nations, the United States demanded the immediate recall by Cuba of the two Cuban diplomats and told Cuba the attache was being held for prosecution under U. S. law.

Agents said the plotters' plans to set off bombs and explosives in New York department stores and oil and gasoline refineries across the Hudson river in New Jersey were ready to be put into effect.

"It was a question of moving in before they had a chance to use the equipment," said John Malone, assistant director in charge of the FBI office here who helped lead the raids that also upturned a cache of explosives and weapons.

Tenants at the building where agents found the cache of explosives on the sixth floor said the plotters were so skillful they had "no idea" anything illegal was going on.

Grenades Found

The agents found hand grenades, incendiary devices, detonators and other sabotage and guerrilla warfare material in a jewelry workshop operated by Jose Garcia Orellana, 42, near busy Pennsylvania station.

In addition to Garcia, agents picked up Antonio Suelo Cabrera, 22, treasurer of a Cuban social club, and the UN attache, Roberto Santiesteban Casanova, 27.

Agents said Garcia and Suelo were members of the Communist party.

Also named as conspirators but not arrested because of their diplomatic status were Jose Gomez Abad, 21, and his wife, the former Elsa Montero, 20. A federal complaint said the couple supplied incendiary material and explosives to Garcia.

Ashlander Dies Of Heart Attack

Ashland —UPI—A 71-year-old Ashland man suffered a fatal heart attack Friday afternoon after the inside of his trailer home was gutted by fire.

Ashland firemen tried to revive the man, Floyd L. Sanford, with a resuscitator, but were unable to do so.

The interior of the trailer home, at 902 Hillview dr., caught on fire from a butane burner that firemen said had apparently been left on. Sanford and his wife, Mary, were preparing to leave on a trip when the fire occurred. Firemen were summoned at 1:07 p.m. Friday.

Directive Orders Commercial Planes Out of Skies Over Cuba

Soviet Personnel In Cuba Formed Into Armed Units

Kennedy Schedules Radio-TV Address

Washington —UPI—U. S. officials said Saturday that several thousand Soviet "technicians" still in Cuba are being organized into regular military units for reasons as yet unclear to intelligence analysts here.

The development was being watched with increasing concern because it could balloon into another sticking point in the efforts to solve the Cuban crisis by diplomatic negotiations.

Officials said the Russian "technicians" remaining on the island, estimated at approximately 4,000, were "looking more like regular soldiers every day." There were indications they were being formed into groups of approximately battalion strength.

Kennedy Deadline Seen

Meanwhile, it appeared to diplomatic authorities that President Kennedy may have set some sort of deadline for Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev to give definite assurances that he intends to remove the Soviet jet bombers still in Cuba. This was described by top officials as being the key issue holding up consideration of all other aspects of the problem.

The White House continued its silence on Cuban developments. However, officials said that Kennedy, in scheduling a "live" radio-television news conference for Tuesday at 3 p.m. (PST), obviously expected to have some major news on Cuba for the American public.

It could be an announcement that Khrushchev had agreed to pull out the IL28 twin-jet bombers without attaching unacceptable conditions. Or it could be a declaration that the United States was being forced to take tougher measures — including a cut-off of petroleum for Cuba — because the Soviet leader had not come to terms.

Proposed Oregon Constitution Seen 'Neutral Document'

The proposed new Oregon Constitution, which will be presented to the legislature next January, should be studied and judged as a whole, not as an assembly of isolated provisions, a member of the Constitutional Revision Commission said here Saturday.

Prof. Hans Linde of the University of Oregon school of law, chairman of the drafting committee of the commission, spoke to some 85 persons under the auspices of the Medford League of Women Voters.

He termed the proposed constitution a "neutral document," non-partisan in approach, which will damage no particular interests, and which should be judged by whether it is a "good document," better than the existing one, and not on the basis of details with which one may agree or disagree.

Passage Expected

Professor Linde said if it is widely studied that way, and a favorable attitude toward it is generated, he believes it will be passed by the legislature and referred to a vote of the people. But, he indicated, if arguments over minor points dominates the discussions, it may fail.

Pointing out that not all 17 members of the Revision Commission were unanimous on all points in the document, Professor Linde added that, at the same time, the commission is near-unanimous in believing they have produced a good Constitution.

Lacking time for a detailed, point-by-point explanation of the Constitution, the speaker limited himself to discussing the important changes that would be made, giving some background on the preparation of the Constitution, and pointing out that many provisions which are unchanged are not as "newsworthy" nor as widely discussed as the provisions which do make changes.

Oregon is not alone in the field of Constitutional revision, he reported; some states have completely revised or adopted new constitutions, and some 20 or more are engaged in revision to a greater or lesser degree.

But if Oregon makes its plan work — Revision Commission presenting a document to the legislature (which in turn may adopt, reject, revise or rewrite the proposal), and if the legislature presents it to a vote of the people and it is adopted — then Oregon will be famous in the field, the speaker stated.

The proposal is not a patchwork or face-lifting job, Professor Linde said, but is a brand new document.

High points of the Constitution are these, he said: —Annual sessions of the legislature, and a new system of legislative apportionment based on population but more broadly representative than the present one.

Only Elective Officer

—An elected governor (the only state-wide elective officer provided by the Constitution) with broad powers over a maximum of 20 departments of government, responsible for the execution and administration of the laws.

—A new official called a controller, to be elected or be chosen as the legislature directs, who will continue the post-audit functions of the secretary of state and perform such other duties as the legislature may assign. He will serve for an 8-year term, be largely non-political in function, and serve as a "watch-dog" of state government and the legislature.

—A non-partisan judiciary appointed by the governor, whose members, after serving 6-year terms, will run for reelection on their record in office.

—Elimination of much material from the Constitution which is statutory in nature. This would remain in effect as legislation but would not have the stature of Constitutional law.

and other provisions which Oregon voters have indicated they wish retained in the basic charter.

Started in 1953

The Constitutional revision movement, Professor Linde explained, has arisen since the war, and is at least in part an outgrowth of the increased power of the federal government, which has grown in many cases because the states were powerless to solve their own problems. In Oregon, the movement is the culmination of discussions first started in 1953 as to the need for a new Constitution, he said, outlining the steps preceding the appointment of the Commission in 1961.

The Commission, which will expire at the end of the year, included seven legislators, three judges, and seven public members, including two former governors. Thirteen of the members were appointed by the Senate president and House speaker, two by the governor and two by the chief justice of the Oregon Supreme Court.

It has been meeting, both as a whole and as sub-committees, for some 18 months. Publication of the final draft of the proposed Constitution will be in a couple of weeks.

Higher Gasoline Taxes Discussed

Salem —UPI—The Oregon Highway commission is discussing the possibility of asking the 1963 legislature to increase the state gasoline tax by one cent a gallon, a spokesman said Friday.

Such an increase would up the state's tax per gallon from six cents to seven cents.

State Highway Engineer Forrest Cooper said the increase would bring in another \$6.2 million a year. Of this, the state would get about 70 per cent, and the rest would go to cities and counties.

Cooper said, "The commission feels this is the best way to finance additional needed highway improvements." A final decision on whether to ask for the increase hasn't been made, he said.

The extra money would be applied to primary, secondary and urban routes only.

Dismissal Requested in Balloon Bread Cases

Deputy District Attorney Thomas Owens Friday afternoon filed two motions requesting dismissal of balloon bread charges against Beck's and Fluhrer's bakeries in Medford.

Owens noted that the Multnomah county circuit court on Oct. 25 rendered a verdict and judgment for Davidson Bakery of Portland, charged under an identical grand jury indictment. The company admitted all allegations of the indictment were true and challenged the constitutionality of the state department of agriculture order.

The Multnomah county circuit court had found the order unconstitutional and void since it denied equal protection.

Connection Seen With Threat To Shoot U.S. Craft

No Reason Given By Havana Radio

Miami —UPI—Cuban military authorities Saturday ordered the skies over Cuba cleared of all domestic commercial airline flights by 4:50 a.m. Sunday, according to a Havana radio broadcast monitored here.

The broadcast gave no reason for the order, but there was immediate speculation that it could be connected with Premier Fidel Castro's threat to shoot down U. S. surveillance planes flying over Cuba. The warning was delivered to UN Acting Secretary General Thant at the United Nations last Thursday.

Until Further Notice

The broadcast said the new order will remain in effect "until further notice."

There was no indication how it might affect a Mexican commercial airline that has been flying into Cuba from time to time.

Friday U. S. Ambassador Arthur H. Dean said at the United Nations that the United States would use "all means necessary" to protect the western hemisphere against danger from Cuban soil. Pentagon sources said the United States was prepared to protect its reconnaissance flights with fighter plane escorts.
