Red Raiders' Second-Half Push Topples Fired-Up Weber, 26-3

Ashtland (Special)—Southern Oregon college downed a fired-up Weber college football team, 26-3, Saturday afternoon on Fuller field in Ashtland. The win gave the Raiders a 7-1 season record, with one game left. Weber finished the season with a 5-4 record.

The boys from Ogden, Utah, held the Raiders at bay for the first half, in making a second period field goal stand up for a 3-0 first half lead. The third period saw the Raiders score a single touchdown and take the lead, 7-3.

Southern Oregon kicked off to start the second half. In three plays, Weber fullback Duffy Deaver fumbled the pigskin, with the Raiders' defensive guard Ken Bastian pouncing on the ball on the Wildcat 30 yard stripe. Just seven plays later, Dave Hughes caught a Mike Hood

pass in the end zone, good for 17 yards and the first Raider touchdown. Hughes tallied the point after on a pass from Doug Olsen.

Late in the third period, Weber quarterback Brent Hancock dropped back to pass on the Southern Oregon 28 yard line. Defensive end Jess Munyon put on a tremendous rush and grabbed the ball from behind out of Hancock's hand. This gave the Raiders the ball on their own 35 yard line.

Ten plays later, Howard Hartman scored on a four yard pass from Olsen. Olsen's kick for the point after was blocked, and the Raiders took a 14-3 lead with 14:53 left in the contest. Big gainers in the drive came on an Olsen to Kern Bennett pass good for 16 yards and an Olsen to Hughes pass good for 21 yards.

Weber received the kickoff

and started a drive from their own 19 yard line. With the ball resting on the Wildcat 41 yard line, Hancock dropped back to pass. Fleet Southern Oregon defensive safety Doyle Branson intercepted the ball on the 'Cat 45 and followed a wall of Raider blockers into the end zone for six points. The point after attempt failed on an Olsen to Hughes pass, which fell incomplete.

On SOC's last offensive drive of the game, Branson took the ball from Olsen and scampered 19 yards into the end zone for his second successive touchdown of the day. Olsen kicked the point after, and the final score was 26-3 in favor of Southern Oregon.

"Good breaks gave us the victory," stated Raider mentor Al Akins. "Weber had a fine football team and will be real tough next year," further revealed. Weber did not have any seniors on the squad, as it just turned into a four year college. The squad was dominated by a host of freshmen and sophomores.

Southern Oregon will finish the regular season when it meets Whitworth college of Spokane, Wash., in a Thanksgiving Day battle in Central Point in the Crater High stadium. The game will begin at 12 noon.

Rooks Trim UO Frosh

Eugene (UPI)—Halfback Charles Shaw ripped off a 91-yard scoring run as the Oregon State Rooks broke loose for three touchdowns in the final period to post a 20-7 football win over the Oregon Frosh Friday.

Shaw's touchdown run came with 5:04 left in the game with Oregon holding a 7-6 lead.

Oregon State's other scores came at 14:50 in the final period on a 62-yard pass from quarterback Brian Barnes to halfback Jim Smith and with 46 seconds remaining on a four-yard run by Smith.

The Frosh collected their score in the second period. Quarterback Jack Sovereign passed seven yards to end Ray Palm for the touchdown.

The game ended the season for both teams. The Rooks finished with a 3-1 record and the Frosh ended with a 2-2 mark.

Oregon State rolled up 270 total yards to 157 for Oregon. First downs were 9-9. Shaw was the leading ground gainer for the Rooks with 120 yards in 13 carries.

Sieg Story Proves One Of Success

Oregon State University, Corvallis—There are a number of reasons why the Oregon State football team has a 7-2 record to date, but one of the big ones is the success story of Dan Sieg.

A fine prep back at Medford high, Sieg was somewhat of a disappointment on last year's OSU Rook football team. In fact, there was some doubt in the minds of the coaching staff as to whether Sieg would be much help to the Beavers until possibly his senior year.

Those doubts ended fast when Sieg started performing in spring practice.

He worked himself up the ladder and soon had ousted letterman Jim Sinyard from the team's No. 1 wingback job. When the season opened this fall, Sieg was still in that position, fighting off the challenge of four other aspirants.

Learned Quickly

"I've never seen anyone learn so quickly," OSU senior assistant coach Bob Watson, a former Medford prep star, says. "He makes few mistakes, which is amazing for a sophomore."

"He's well prepared fundamentally, as are all of our Medford athletes," Watson added.

An improved blocker, Sieg has sparked as a defensive halfback. Against University of the Pacific, he set up a Beaver touchdown with a pass interception deep in Tiger territory. He's caught one pass for a 21-yard gain and sports a healthy 4.3 rushing average, although the Beaver offense, built around Terry Baker, calls for the wingback to be blocking most of the time.

Only 5-9 and 167 pounds, Sieg has been a starter in every game except Idaho. He missed that contest due to a shoulder injury.

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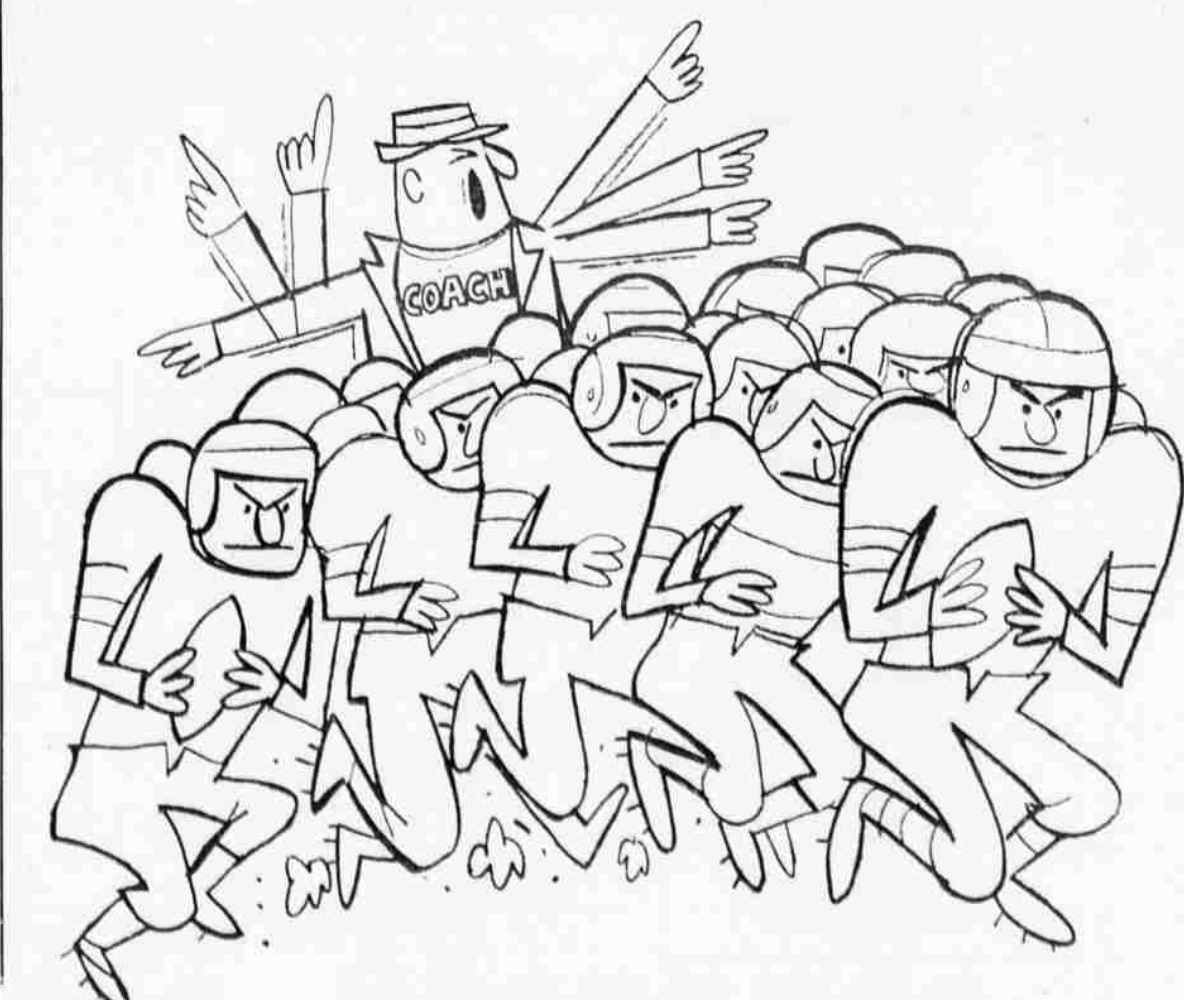
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
