After a report by the Medford postmaster screening committee, William Deatherage, Medford, recommended that all names of applicants for the Medford postmaster job be referred to Congressmen-elect Robert Duncan (D-Ore.) and Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) and let them fill the position.

This followed a statement made earlier in the week by Duncan saying he favored non-partisan appointment on a merit basis.

County Clerk Marvin Madden and Alva Bradford, Medford barber and city council-

man, were mentioned as two job, although the screening committee had made no recommendations yet and are still receiving applications.
