Pain In The Legs That Comes With Walking

Many a man past 40 or 50 writes to say that he can walk for perhaps half a block, and then he gets such a pain in a leg or thigh that he must stop and lean up against a building for a few minutes.

By then the pain has stopped and he can walk on again for a way. This is called intermittent claudication, and is due usually to some obstruction in one of the arteries supplying the muscles of the leg. The obstruction in the artery can occur anywhere in the leg. Some times when a doctor examines the man he finds that the foot is cold and there is almost no pulsation in the big arteries in front and behind the ankle.

One type of obstruction in the artery is associated with heavy smoking of cigarettes, perhaps two or three pack-a-days a day. Persons with claudication who are smoking heavily certainly ought to quit and see what happens. That probably is the best way in which they can give themselves a break, and perhaps avoid an operation on an artery, or an eventual amputation of a leg.

If the person is very heavy he had better go on a reduction diet and take off a lot of weight. He may also have to change from animal fats to vegetable oil so as to cut down on his blood cholesterol. It is good to keep doing a certain amount of walking, because exercise can help. There are several drugs which are supposed to dilate the arteries, but experts in this field are usually not much impressed with what these drugs can do. The arteries are usually too stiff to relax, or they may be definitely obstructed.

An operation which used to be done, and which sometimes still is done with advantage is the cutting of the sympathetic nerves back of the abdomen. Sometimes when these nerves are cut the artery will dilate somewhat and give the man relief.

Today in a number of clinics, the first thing done is to inject a material into the arteries which shows with x-rays exactly where the narrowing is and how widely it ranges. If the obstruction is a narrow ring, it can be removed surgically, but if it spreads over too long a segment, an operation cannot be performed with success. In some cases, a tube made from dachon is inserted. Sometimes an expert in the surgery of arteries can give decided relief.

Spondylitis, or 'Poker Spine'
Dozens of people write to ask me what is spondylitis, and what can be done about it. Spondylitis is a special name for a certain type of arthritis which usually attacks young men in their twenties or thirties, and often, within a few months, leaves them with a rigid spine — rigid from the base of their skull down to the sacrum — the bone between the two hip bones. In rare cases the hip joints are also involved, and then the man becomes somewhat ossified. I have seen a few such cases in which the man had to decide quickly whether he wanted to be ossified sitting
