

Broadcasters Open Conference

Portland — (UPI) — Former Florida Gov. LeRoy Collins, president of the National Association of Broadcasters, was featured speaker here today as the NAB opened its regional fall conference.

The NAB meeting will be followed Tuesday by a meeting of the Oregon Association of Broadcasters.

Topics at the two meetings include industry affairs, government relations, broadcast research and editorials and labor-management affairs.

Collins predicted on his arrival here Saturday that present systems of rating television programs will die away.

He said present rating methods are "open to serious challenge." He said the end of the present rating systems will give producers "a greater responsibility to judge programs and develop the kind of programming that will make a substantial contribution to citizenship and culture."

Collins said this will include more live coverage of news and community activities such as city government.

Musa Pledges Full Cooperation

Salem — (UPI) — State Sen. Ben Musa, prospective 1963 Senate president, hailed the election of State Rep. Clarence Barton (D-Coquille) as 1963 House speaker Sunday and pledged full cooperation.

"We will have our differences," Musa told Barton, "but we will work them out." Musa, Democrat from The Dalles, was here for the House Democratic caucus which his wife, State Rep. Katherine Musa, attended.

Both Musa and Barton reiterated they will go along with the wishes of the legislative majority on whether to have a joint House-Senate committee on constitutional revision, or separate committees in each house.

The House Democrats favored appointment of a bipartisan House committee to meet with a similar Senate committee on the question of a legislative pay raise. The lawmakers are expected to vote themselves an increase. The present pay is \$600 a year.

Barton said this issue "must be resolved early in the session," to head off all-out bickering on extent of the increase.

Columbia Trade Conference Opens

Portland — (UPI) — The fourth annual Columbia Basin Export-Import Conference opened here today — focused on expanding trade with Japan.

Opening speakers included Hideo Nakano, executive director of the Japan Trade Center at San Francisco, on "How to Do Business with Japan." Trade between the Columbia Basin and Japan last year amounted to an estimated \$114 million.

Some 150 businessmen from the Northwest were expected for the two day meeting. Other speakers included Assistant Commerce Secretary Arthur Jones and Richard W. Lindholm, dean of the school of business administration at the University of Oregon.

Corey Requests Stay of Sentence

Portland — (UPI) — Earl C. Corey, convicted of conspiracy in government wheat storage two years ago, has asked a federal judge to let him stay out of prison.

Corey's petition cited poor health.

Corey and Laurence Smith, Waterville, Wash., were convicted of conflict of interest while Corey was director of the Agriculture Department's Portland commodity office. They received two-year sentences. The U.S. Supreme Court this month refused a hearing.

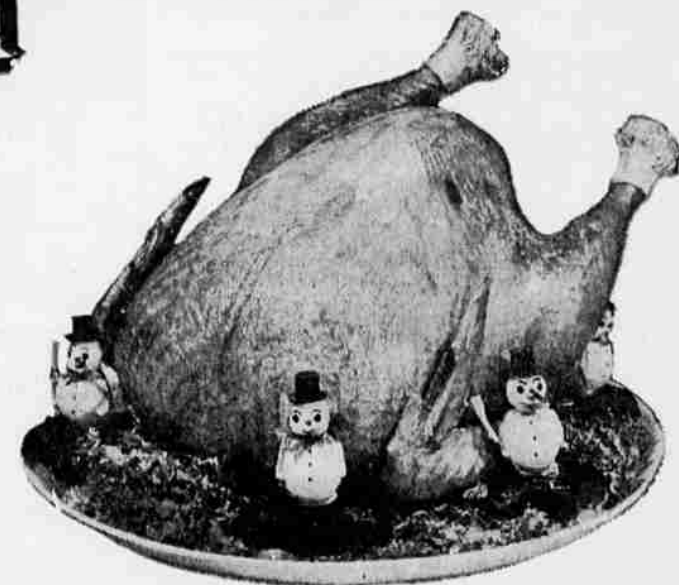

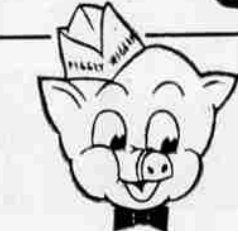
