

Chandler's Toe Keeps NY Giants On Top; Green Bay Noses Colts

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Neither rain, snow nor mud could prevent Don Chandler of the New York Giants from the swift completion of his placekicking rounds, but the Green Bay Packers might have missed delivering the mail if not for two of their young carriers.

Chandler kicked four field goals in wretched weather conditions to keep the Giants atop the Eastern division of the National Football league with a 19-14 come-from-behind victory over the Philadelphia Eagles.

The Green Bay Packers played in much better weather but had all kinds of trouble before rallying to beat the Baltimore Colts, 17-13, for their 10th straight victory. They were outgained and outplayed but kept their 1962 record spotless with the help of a 103-yard kickoff return by Herb Adderley and a game-winning 23-yard touchdown run by Tom Moore.

Both the Packers and the Giants face an opportunity this week to break the division races wide open and set up a return meeting in the championship playoff Dec. 30. Green Bay meets the Detroit Lions, Thanksgiving Day, while New York plays the Washington Redskins next Sunday.

There was plenty of foot in football Sunday as three of the NFL's seven games were decided by field goals. Besides

Chandler's efforts, Lou Michaels booted a 24-yarder with 13 seconds left to give the Pittsburgh Steelers a 23-21 win over Washington, and Roger Leclerc's 12-yard kick with 31 seconds remaining enabled the Chicago Bears to edge the Dallas Cowboys, 34-33.

The Lions remained two games behind the Packers in the Western Division by rallying in the last half for a 17-6 victory over the Minnesota Vikings; the San Francisco Forty Niners defeated the Los Angeles Rams, 24-17, and the Cleveland Browns drubbed the St. Louis Cardinals, 38-14.

Green Bay, playing without Paul Hornung and linebacker Dan Currie, was outgained by the Colts, 380 yards to 116. Johnny Unitas' passes gained 237 yards for the Colts and the Baltimore defense held Green Bay fullback Jim Taylor in check for the second time this season. Taylor, the league's leading rusher, gained only 46 yards in 19 carries.

Two field goals by Dick Bielecki and Unitas' 34-yard scoring pass to Jimmy Orr put the Colts ahead, 13-10, after

The Packers' defense came to their rescue twice with a pair of remarkable goal-line stands. In the second period Green Bay held the Colts off for four downs at the one-yard line, and with three minutes left in the game the Packers held firm after Baltimore had reached the two on the second down.

By winning their 12th straight game dating back to last season, the Packers tied the club record set by their 1928-29 predecessors.

Perfect Record List Cut to 17

New York —UPI— The nation's perfect-record list of college football teams dwindled to just 17 during the week end when Alabama, Hofstra, California Poly of Pomona, and East Stroudsburg were beaten Saturday.

Southern California, the nation's No. 1 team in the United Press International Board of Coaches ratings, third-ranked Mississippi and Dartmouth were the only major schools left on the list. Alabama, the No. 2 team, was knocked off by virtue of a 7-6 loss to Georgia Tech.

Hofstra, the top small college team in the East, bowed out following a 16-12 loss to Wittenberg, which now has won nine straight without defeat. Slippery Rock knocked East Stroudsburg off the list, 13-6.

Only five of the 16 perfect-record teams have not completed their season. Emporia College of Kansas and Central Oklahoma, ranked third in the UPI small college ratings, lead the list with 10 victories each.

Reserved seat tickets went on sale today at Mann's Department store in Medford, Central Point pharmacy and Southern Oregon college in Ashland. Herb Partridge, game chairman for the co-sponsoring Medford Kiwanis club, reported that around 950 seats are now on reserve. Season ticket holders to Crater high games have been given until Tuesday noon to buy their same seats. Those not called for by that time will go on regular sale. Since the Crater grandstand holds approximately 2,000 spectators, there will be around 1,000 general admission seats under cover. General admission tickets can be obtained from Kiwanians or from Southern Oregon college. There are special high school and grade school prices. SOC students will be admitted by their student body cards.

Baker Gains Leadership In Offense

Corvallis —UPI— The great Terry Baker was the nation's top offense leader and second all-time ground gainer in the history of college football today.

Baker exploded for 339 yards in the rain Saturday to lead Oregon State to a 25-14 victory over stubborn Colorado State.

Baker took over first place in the national total offense race with 2,144 yards in nine games as the Beavers posted their seventh win of the season against two losses.

He became the second highest ground gainer behind Johnny Bright of Drake with 4,847 yards. Bright rolled up 5,903 from 1949-1951.

Oregon State, now 7-2 and hopeful of a post season bowl invitation, scored on runs of one and 28 yards by fullback Bruce Williams, a 42-yard screen pass play from Baker to halfback Leroy Whittle and a six-yard run by Baker.

Baker completed 16 of 29 pass attempts for 226 yards and carried the ball 13 times for 163 yards.

End Vern Burke caught 10 passes for 108 yards for the Beavers to break the NCAA pass receiving record for one season. He shattered the record with 972 yards in nine games. The record was held by Washington State end Hugh Campbell of 881 set in 1960. Burke also tied Campbell's mark of 66 catches in one season.

Colorado State Coach Mike Lude, whose Rams suffered a defeat which extended the nation's longest losing streak among major colleges to 25, joined a long list of opposing coaches who have hailed Baker.

"He's easily the best ball player we've seen this year," he said.

Oregon State Coach Tommy Prothro, whose Beavers play host to Oregon here next Saturday, was unhappy with his team's performance.

"I wish we had played better," he said. "It's all right to have one supposedly easy game but two in a row is bad. We're now a sloppy football team and we weren't two weeks ago."
