Cotton Transfer Decreases Stockpile

Washington — Sen. Harry F. Byrd (D-Va.) said Sunday that only the transfer of \$128 million worth of cotton prevented the total value of government stockpiles from rising again during August.

Byrd, making his monthly report on the stockpile, said the cotton was transferred to the Commodity Credit Corp. Its transfer made a net decline in the stockpile of \$64 million, he said. Had it not been moved, the stockpile value would have risen by \$7,409,848.
