Wordy, Outdated Constitution Streamlined by Commission

Editor's note: The most far-reaching item to be debated by the 1963 legislature will be a new Oregon Constitution. This is the first of three dispatches describing the background, and what lies ahead. Today: The forces for change.

Salem—UPI—Trying to give the Oregon Constitution a badly needed overhaul is like trying to tell the queen mother she can't wear those comfortable, patched up old galoshes anymore.

It is a very delicate undertaking, and the political implications are great.

Oregon's Constitution began as a basic, relatively lean document of about 11,000 words. That was 103 years ago.

Today, it is still basic. But it is also old and patched up. It has been amended 111 times—five times as much as the U.S. Constitution. It has swelled to nearly 22,000 words, one of the most wordy in the nation.

A major reason behind this great and disorderly growth is the Oregon initiative and referendum law passed in 1902. It makes amending fairly easy.

There are numerous cases where special interest groups have taken out initiative petitions, gotten their pet aim before the voters, and then had it approved—frozen into the Constitution. This prevents the legislature from tinkering, for only the people can change the Constitution.

The result is that the Constitution is loaded with material that belongs in the statutes.

The initiative law, however, is considered sound and vital by experts, and there is no campaign to get rid of it.

Many provisions are obsolete, such as the bans on dueling and holding a title of nobility.

One of the provisions in the Oregon Bill of Rights is liquor - by - the - drink, ranking right along with such rights as freedom of worship, and speech. This is comical, and detracts from its prestige.

The death penalty is also in the Bill of Rights, guaranteeing every citizen's right to be executed.

Until now, the last attempt to clean up the Constitution was a decade ago. A long study was made, and there was a request for calling a constitutional convention.

The 1955 legislature put this into a pigeon hole.

A breakthrough came in 1960 when the voters authorized the legislature to submit a new constitution in one chunk at one election. Prior to this, constitutional changes could be put before the people only a piece at a time.

The 1961 legislature created a 17 member Constitutional Revision Commission, directing it to present a plan to the 1963 legislature.

This blue ribbon group includes legislators, supreme court justices, a circuit judge, two former governors, newspaper publishers, a housewife, a law professor and a trucking executive. Chairman is State Rep. George Layman (R-Newberg), an attorney.

At the outset, the commission had to decide between just tidying up the Constitution, or giving it a real housecleaning. It chose the latter course.

The commission did not pussy-foot around on policy. It suggested some bold changes. Controversy is guaranteed.

After a year and a half the commission has come up with a streamlined document. It is meaty, runs 9,600 words and is a model.

The document is sure to be a reference point in other states for years to come.

Santa Monica, Calif.—UPI—Former Vice President Richard M. Nixon has brushed off the controversy over a recent television appearance of Alger Hiss and indicated again he will never again seek public office.

In a telegram Saturday to Robert E. McClure, editor and publisher of the Santa Monica Evening Outlook, Nixon, the defeated Republican candidate for California governor, said, "What does an attack by one convicted perjurer mean when weighed on the scales against thousands of wires and letters from patriotic Americans?"

Thanked for Coverage
Nixon thanked McClure for "your recent editorials and the objective news coverage of my campaign activities during the 16 years I have been in public office."

"As I finish my last campaign for public office I shall always be grateful for the opportunity that has been accorded of serving as a congressman, as a senator, and as Vice President of the United States for eight years."

Hiss appeared on the American Broadcasting Company television show "The Political Obituary of Richard M. Nixon" aired a week ago. Nixon was instrumental in the investigation that led to Hiss' conviction in 1950 for perjury.

Smear Denied
In New York, James Hagerty, ABC vice president in charge of news, defended Hiss' appearance on the program as "representing a chapter in Mr. Nixon's history." Hagerty called the appearance "debatable" but denied that

Scranton Has No Presidency Plans

Hobe Sound, Fla.—UPI—Pennsylvania Gov.-elect William Scranton dispelled rumors he would be a presidential candidate in 1964 today by saying he had "no intention" of seeking the nomination.

"I have no intention of seeking either the presidency or the vice presidency in 1964, except under extraordinary circumstances," said Scranton, who is vacationing here.

The extraordinary circumstances, he said, would be that the Republican party could not find another candidate and he was drafted.

"I think the job of the new governor is to spend his efforts on Pennsylvania problems since they are so acute and so numerous," he said.
