

Southern Cal, Mississippi Ranked One-Two in Ratings

New York —(UPI)— Southern California and Mississippi, two of only three perfect-record major college football teams in the nation, held the top two positions today in the United Press International Board of Coaches ratings, the Trojans gaining the No. 1 spot for the second week in a row.

With only two weeks remaining before the crowning of the national champion, a slip at this point in the race could very well mean down and out. Alabama, the defending national champion which was second a week ago, already has stumbled, bowing to Georgia Tech, 7-6, last Saturday for its first loss of the season and slipping all the way to sixth.

The Rose Bowl bound Trojans, named No. 1 by 16 coaches a week ago, increased their margin this week when they were named for the top spot by 21 of the 35 coaches who comprise the UPI rating board. Mississippi, like Southern California unbeaten and untied through eight games, was designated No. 1 by eight coaches but received enough solid support for second and third places to make it a race with the Trojans.

Close Behind
Wisconsin, Southern California's New Year's Day opponent in the Rose Bowl, trails in third, but not by much. The Badgers (7-1) were named No. 1 by five coaches while one coach picked Penn State for the top seat.

With points distributed on a basis of 10-9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1 for votes from first through 10th, Southern California had 323, Mississippi had 284 and Wisconsin had 270.

The big test comes this Saturday for both Southern California and Wisconsin while Mississippi, which gained the inside track to the Sugar Bowl by beating Tennessee, 19-6, last Saturday, enjoys a day

off. The Trojans take on arch-rival UCLA in the 32nd renewal of their cross-town Los Angeles series while Wisconsin plays host to Minnesota, ranked fifth this week behind Texas.

The Longhorns, too, have a tough opponent in Texas A&M on Thanksgiving Day. A victory or tie, though, would wrap up the Southwest Conference title for Texas and give it the automatic berth in the Cotton Bowl. The Longhorns (8-0) drew 244 points for fourth while Minnesota (6-1-1) had 171 for fifth.

Alabama Idle
Alabama also will be idle this Saturday and winds up its season on Dec. 1 against Auburn. On that same day Mississippi plays Mississippi State, while Southern California, shooting for its first perfect-record season in 30 years, tangles with Notre Dame.

Arkansas (8-1) was seventh this week, Louisiana State (7-1-1) was eighth, Penn State (8-1) was ninth and Oklahoma (6-2) was 10th. Penn State and Oklahoma moved into the top 10 for the first time this season, gaining their positions at the expense of Northwestern and Missouri. Northwestern bowed to Michigan State, 31-7, while Missouri was beaten by Oklahoma, 13-0.

In other pairings this Saturday, Arkansas plays Texas Tech, LSU meets Tulane, Penn State tangles with Pittsburgh and Oklahoma battles Nebraska for the Big Eight lead.

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Happy Camp Has Three On All-Star

Happy Camp — From the Happy Camp football squad, the Siskiyou County Coaches association has picked three players for the Evergreen All Star team, naming one of these outstanding linemen of the year. Two members were given honorable mention.

NAMED TO THE ALL STAR TEAM: Quarterback Van Harden, a junior; End, Dennis Hobbs, a senior; and Lineman, Jim Hayes, a junior who was named outstanding lineman.

CHOSEN FOR HONORABLE MENTION: Kenny Hockaday, a senior, who played slot back, and Bill Nowdesha, fullback.

The squad ended the season with a 3 and 4 win-loss record, and a 2 and 2 record in Evergreen league play.

In the final statistics for six games, excluding the six-man game at Fort Jones, these facts were listed:

Nowdesha, senior fullback, was the workhorse for the club. Nowdesha carried 46 times for a total of 357 rushing yards with a 7.8 average per carry.

Harnden, quarterback, led the team in total offense. Harnden was credited with 804 total yards, 639 yards on passing, 120 yards rushing, and 45 yards on passes caught. Harnden completed 42 of the 76 passes attempted, seven of these for touchdowns. He had eight passes intercepted.

In the kicking department, Hobbs punted five times for an average of 30.8 yards per kick. He also led in pass reception and total yards gained on passes, catching 14 passes for a total of 263 yards.

On the defensive tackle sheet, coach Kim Bradshaw credited Harnden with 57 tackles, one run back for a TD, and Hayes 47 tackles.

In addition to the credit given Hayes as a defensive stand-out, Bradshaw also named Harnden as a bright spot on the defensive team, playing wherever he needed a spot.

Linfield Passed Over By NAIA

The NAIA in Kansas City announced Central Oklahoma State and College of Emporia, Kansas, were picked to take part in a playoff to determine one of the Camellia bowl entries.

OSU May Get Sun Bowl Bid

Canyon, Tex. —(UPI)— West Texas State, winner of eight of its 10 games this season, has accepted an invitation to serve as the host team in the Sun Bowl football game at El Paso, Dec. 31.

Buffalo Athletic Director Frank Kimbrough said the team's bowl bid would come from the ranks of five teams — Oregon State, Boston University, New Mexico, Memphis State and Ohio university.

Reports from Albuquerque said that University of New Mexico players had been called to meet late today to vote on whether to accept a bowl bid, presumably the Sun Bowl invitation.
