Court Will Give Policy Statement On Development

A statement of policy will be prepared telling what is required of the planning commission regarding development of the county fairgrounds and other locations on which county buildings are being erected or planned for, the county court said this week.

The policy statement was requested of the county court by the Jackson county planning commission in October. In its letter the planning commission noted the county has been constructing various facilities at the fairgrounds and is now considering further facilities.

The city of Medford prepared a plan for its public facilities with the bureau of municipal research and services, University of Oregon. This study was financed by the city and from a planning assistance grant from the federal housing and home finance agency.

The city plan recommends that federal, state, county and city administration facilities be grouped to form a government center, the county planning commission letter noted.

The county planning commission proposes that Jackson county's building and expansion plans be studied in relation to the existing plan prepared by the city.

The county planning study would be a review of the county courthouse area, fairgrounds and other public land and facilities including a possible site for a new fairgrounds, it was explained.

Two Accidents Are Reported in City

Two non-injury vehicle accidents occurred Friday, Medford police reported.

Cars driven by Roger Lee Mantor, 120 West Fourth st., Ashland, and Colton Wendell Morris, box 49, Prospect, collided on South Grape st. between West Main and West Eighth sts.

No citations were issued.

Medford Figures Appear In 'Parking'

Some figures on the usage of Park and Shop spaces in Medford for a one week period during August of this year have been published in the fall issue of "Parking," a national trade magazine.

The figures, which are presented in the form of graphs, were compiled by Don McNeil, manager of the Medford Chamber of Commerce.

The six graphs are presented without comment by the editors of the magazine. The two-page article is entitled "Park and Shop Usage Pattern."

The graphs reveal that peak usage occurred about 11 a.m. Thursday and Friday. During that time, over 90 per cent of the spaces on the lots were occupied.

Marine Board Sets Medford Meeting

The state marine board has scheduled a public meeting in Medford Wednesday, Nov. 28, in the auditorium of the Jackson County courthouse. The meeting will be at 7 p.m.

Local boating enthusiasts are invited to attend and express their views as to whether private boat owners should hold an operator's license.

The marine board states that it has no definite plans on the matter. However, because of reports of possible legislation being sponsored by some organizations, the board is holding several "fact-finding" meetings throughout the state from which a report of the boating public's view will be compiled. The report will be made available to the next Legislature should a bill be introduced on this subject.

Family Council

Leonard A. — I feel badly because I can't do more for my children.

Hugh D. — And I feel badly because I'm spilling mine. You're better off.

Leonard A. — My brother-in-law Hugh is an extremely wealthy man. I took a chance last week and asked him to lend me the money to send my three boys to camp next summer. It's a matter of \$2,000, counting trunks and uniforms. To my surprise he refused and read me a lecture on how it would be the worst thing to make camp so easy for my kids, going into debt and all.

Why are my children so different from his own? His go to private school, take horseback-riding lessons, spend week ends and holidays on a 60-acre country estate, see every sports event and show in town. As for mine, I'm glad if I can catch up their modest allowance each week. Even so, they must do odd jobs to cover their school expenses.

Hugh D. — Len wouldn't be so envious of me and my children if he knew the whole story. My daughter is undergoing psychotherapy and the analyst has also been seeing my wife and me.

The trouble seems to be that things come too easy to my children, and so, when a setback comes they can't take it. My daughter went into a depression because she was refused admission to an acting class, and also because her favorite boy friend switched to another teen-ager. The analyst traces our trouble with the kids to overprotection. I can lend Len the money if he insists. But as a father I'd be better off in his boots. If I try to make my children work for luxuries, they know it's just an act.

The Council: Into each life some rain must fall, and does fall, Hugh. So you can lend Len that money without worrying about his children growing soft. But your point about the uses of adversity is well taken. It should comfort Len when he must say honestly to his children, "I can't give you the money for that. Try to earn it yourselves."

Conversely, Hugh has a tough time developing a sense of "can't-have" in his children, who may only see cussedness in his refusals to pay up for anything they want. Nevertheless he must refuse in the interests of their optimum development.

Why? Because people who are never subjected to stress, who are always sheltered and shielded, are unable to build up important defenses and resistance. Previously this was accepted as a theory for both physical and mental health. Now comes a physician with proof that in severe mental illness, a certain protective element in the blood is lacking. Dr. Jacques Gottlieb of the Lafayette Clinic of Detroit, Mich., has isolated a factor called "ATP" which is needed in the blood to respond to stress. Schizophrenics, he finds, don't have it. His present research is based upon the idea that people who are never put to the "test" just never build up anti-stress mechanisms.

Having real, not phony, obstacles is an all-right condition. Len. Your children's may be financial, Hugh's emotional. But facing them honestly is an essential first step toward health.
