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Rogue Gallery Show, Sale Opens Tuesday

The best works of major west coast artists and artisans will be offered in the Rogue Valley Art Association Prints and Crafts exhibition and sale.

It will open to the public Tuesday, November 27. The show and sale, which will extend through December 24, will be open Mondays through Saturdays, from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m., in the Rogue Gallery, 220 West Main street.

The items will range in price from inexpensive to more than \$100. The wide assortment will include, sculpture, textiles of various kinds, wood blocks, lithography, etchings, ceramic sculpture and vessels, batiks, rugs, place mats, pottery, wall hangings, all types of crafted jewelry, toys, mosaics, furniture, hand-made gift wraps, enclosure cards, silk screens, collages, calendars, driftwood assemblages, wrought metal work, decorations, calendars, light fixtures and many other items.

Mainly the works are from the Bay area though many are from other west coast cities including Seattle, Sacramento and Los Angeles.

The public is invited to view the show free of charge, and to purchase items if desired.

Memberships to the art association also will be available for those who attend the show or for gifts for friends. Memberships, which give members numerous privileges, also include admissions to the foreign and classic film series sponsored by the association.

A preview showing will be held for association members Monday, November 26 from 12 noon until 9 p.m. A ten per cent discount will be available to members.

Richard Graham to Narrate Presentation of Messiah

Ashland - Richard Graham, actor, will serve as narrator for the annual presentation of Handel's "Messiah," which will be presented at 3 p.m., Sunday, December 2 in the Southern Oregon college gymnasium. The announcement was made by Dr. Herbert Cecil, director.

More than three hours are needed for a presentation of "Messiah" in its original and complete form. A complete rendition of the oratorio would be very taxing, both for performers and audience, therefore, it has become customary to omit certain numbers in the score, Dr. Cecil explained.

Mr. Graham, Oregon Shakespearean Festival actor, has recently returned to the West coast from a four year stay in New York, where he appeared in two seasons of Shakespeare at Stratford, Conn., and in plays on Broadway in New York. Before going East, he had appeared for eleven summers at the Shakespearean Festival in Ashland and played roles in all but two of the 37 plays of the Shakespeare Canon and those two he directed.

There will be no admission for this fifth annual presentation of Handel's "Messiah" although an offering will be accepted for the benefit of the Music Scholarship fund. Coffee will be served at intermission by Alpha Sigma chapter of Beta Sigma Phi. The public is invited to attend.

Richard Graham, who recently returned to the valley after appearing in plays on the East coast for four years, will narrate the annual presentation of Handel's "Messiah." The production, open to the public, will be held Sunday, December 2, at the Southern Oregon college gymnasium.
