The announcement was made by the more than 400 Oregon Senior Citizens whose work has been passed on by a jury of artisans to insure high quality of workmanship and original design.

Among these seniors displaying their work are 15 local craftsmen who have been accepted as members of this non-profit cooperative. The branch in southern Oregon was started last July with the cosponsorship of the Rogue Valley Council on Aging. This is the first branch shop in Oregon outside of the headquarters at 1128 Southwest Alder street, Portland.

To honor the local seniors who are contributing to this effort, a tea will be held Sunday, December 2, from 2 to 4 p.m. at the Ashland Art Gallery. The public is invited to meet the 15 new local senior
