

Symphony Orchestra Conductors Intend To Offer New Touch

New York—(UPI)—Henceforth non-musical showman ship

among symphony orchestra conductors is not going to be limited to Leonard Bernstein.

Erich Leinsdorf, new music director of the Boston symphony, clearly intends offering competition and, because the public likes the unorthodox unmusical touch so much, there are bound to be others.

While rehearsing Mendelssohn's incidental music for Shakespeare's "A Midsummer Night's Dream," Leinsdorf had the notion of re-reading the play. The result was that he called in Inge Swenson, a Shakespearean actress, to recite excerpts from it between the musical sections.

But already in this budding season Bernstein has copper-riveted his reputation as the podium's top showman. He did it with Debussy's semi-oratorio, "The Martyrdom of Saint Sebastian," by adding a second narrator, by translating the narration into English while leaving the vocal score in French and by fattening the narration with explanatory additions.

And that was not all. To warm up his New York Philharmonic audience for these innovations, he preceded Saint Sebastian with Honneggar's "Three Symphonic Movements." One of them, you may recall, is a musical description of a football game and another depicts a locomotive in action.

It was generally agreed Bernstein enormously clarified the story and emotions of the martyrdom. They usually leave most of an audience bewildered because, having been conceived by the mystical poet, Gabriele D'Annunzio, they are clear as mud.

Whether Leinsdorf's innovation did anything for Mendelssohn's music was another question. The composer's music has long been admired for clarity and a limpid purity. On the other hand no one could argue a verbal documentation from the play was alien.

Traditional Showmanship
Meanwhile, the venerable Otto Klemperer, guest-conducting the Philadelphia orchestra, was displaying the traditional musical showmanship of the old-style conductor. He drew out some of the slow passages of Beethoven's

"Egmont" overture so far they seemed to be pulled apart.

And he strove for such musical effects of his own devising in Brahms's 3rd and Schumann's 4th symphonies

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that those listeners accustomed to more straightforward readings of their scores had a sense of the familiar losing its familiarity.

Regarding audiences and their understanding of what they hear, Eugene Ormandy, music director of the Philadelphia orchestra, is trying something new. He's invited the orchestra's subscribers in Philadelphia to attend the

final rehearsal of Elliott Carter's new piece, "Variations for Orchestra."

It's a tough score. The musicians are finding it so tough Ormandy decided audiences could benefit from a preliminary exposure, too. On Thursday, Dec. 6 he and the orchestra will play it through twice in rehearsal for the first formal performance that evening.

What makes it tough, both to play and to make something of while listening, is its "idiom," according to Ormandy. But Carter's reputation as one of the top contemporary American composers is growing. His output hasn't been large but each piece is in this "idiom" which is a musical language that is both modern and highly personal.

'Emphysema' Topic Of Health Program

Influenza continues to have the most number of cases reported in the county, according to Dr. A. Erin Merkel, Jackson county public health officer.

Ashland reported two, Shady Cove 10 and Medford six last week.

Medford also reported four cases of pneumonia.

Other communicable disease cases reported in Medford are two cases of infectious hepatitis, one case of pink eye, four cases of whooping cough and one case of mumps.

Other cases reported are one case of pneumonia in Ashland and one case of measles in Ashland.

TO ALL PERSONS CONCERNED:

You will please take notice that at the general election held November 6, 1962, an election was held to determine the creation of the Sardine Creek Livestock District and a majority of all votes cast at said election was in favor of the creation of such district.

Therefore, from the sixteenth day after the date of first publication of this Notice, which date of first publication is the 25th day of November, 1962, it shall be unlawful for that class of livestock known as bovine cattle to be permitted to run at large within the boundaries of the Sardine Creek Livestock District described as follows:

Beginning at the Quarter corner common to Sections 19 and 20 in Township 33 South, Range 3 West of the Willamette Meridian in Jackson County, Oregon, thence Easterly along the East and West Center line of said Section 20 and the East and West Center line of Section 21 of said Township and Range to the Northeast corner of the West one-half (1/2) of the West one-half (1/2) of the Southeast quarter of Section 21, Thence Southerly to the Southeast corner of said Section 21, Thence Southerly along the East boundary of Sections 28 and 23 of said Township and Range to the Southeast corner of said Section 33, Thence Westerly along the South boundary of Sections 33 and 32 of said Township and Range to the Southwest corner of said Section 32, Thence Northerly to the Quarter Corner common to Sections 31 and 32 of said Township and Range, Thence Westerly to the center East one-sixteenth (1/16) corner of said Section 31, Thence Northerly to the Northeast one-sixteenth (1/16) corner of said Section 31, Thence Northerly to the North one-sixteenth (1/16) corner between said Sections 31 and 32, Thence Northerly along the West boundary of Sections 32, 29 and 28 to the point of beginning.

From this date and hereafter, said Livestock District shall be known as the Sardine Creek Livestock District and in which District for violation of ORS 607.045 lawfully Permitting Livestock to Run at Large the statutory penalty upon conviction is a fine of not more than \$25.00.
