Yturri Selected Senate Minority Leader by GOP

Salem—(UPI)—Oregon's Republican state senators met here during the week end, named a minority leader and created for the first time the post of floor leader.

State Sen. Anthony Yturri, Ontario attorney, was named to his third term as Senate minority leader.

Walter Leth, West Salem agriculturist, was named to the new post of floor leader.

The Democrats control the Senate, 21-10.

Eight of the nine Republican senators attended the meeting here in the Marion hotel. Only missing member was Sen. Donald Husband (R-Eugene).

In addition to selecting minority leaders, the group also discussed problems they will face during the 1963 legislature.

Yturri was first elected to the Senate in 1957. Leth has served in the upper house since 1955.

Three New Posts

This makes three new posts that have been created for the 1963 legislature. Last week House Democrats, in a caucus at the Marion hotel, created the new position of majority leader and whip. They are, respectively, State Reps. Richard Eymann (D-Mohawk) and Norman Howard (D-Portland).

The Senate Democrats have not yet held a caucus, and it was indicated they probably would not meet until just before the legislature convenes next Jan. 14.

CONFERENCE SET

London—(UPI)—Prime Minister Harold Macmillan will confer with French President Charles de Gaulle in France Dec. 15-16 for "a personal and direct exchange of views" on international problems, it was announced today.

MARINER 2 TRANSMITTING REPORTS
Washington—(UPI)—The 447-pound space probe Mariner 2 sped toward cloud-masked Venus today transmitting high quality reports from a record distance of more than 22.5 million miles from Earth.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration said Mariner 2 is expected to reach Venus in 18 days, and may return some long-awaited answers about the planet known as the earth's twin.

DE GAULLE WINS MAJORITY CONTROL
Paris—(UPI)—French voters gave President Charles de Gaulle majority control of the National Assembly today and established him as the strongest political force in recent French history.

Runoff parliamentary elections held Sunday confirmed the results of a week ago—that de Gaulle had turned a setback by parliament into a victory of major proportions at the polls.

DUTCH INVESTIGATING DRUGS
The Hague—(UPI)—The Dutch government announced today that an investigation is under way into prelude and other drugs in connection with reports the drugs may have caused birth deformities.

Mikoyan Expected To Give Message To UN Secretary

Cuban Inspection Included in Plan

Havana—(UPI)—Soviet special envoy Anastas Mikoyan left for New York today presumably bearing a Fidel Castro demand the United States dismantle alleged training camps for anti-Castro forces on U.S. soil in return for United Nations inspection of Soviet missile sites in Cuba.

Mikoyan left in a special Soviet transport after a gala farewell ceremony at the airport involving the two Castro brothers, President Osvaldo Dorticos, State Minister Raul Roa and most of Castro's cabinet.

Warm embraces were exchanged between the Russian, here for the past three weeks to patch up Soviet-Cuban differences, as Mikoyan boarded the airliner. He is scheduled to dine tonight with UN Acting Secretary General Thant and may at that time convey Castro's new demand on the United States.

Demand UN Inspection

Castro said he would accept UN inspection of Soviet missile sites in Cuba only if the U.S. would agree to similar UN supervision of the dismantling of what he described as "training camps of mercenaries, spies, saboteurs and terrorists" purportedly on U.S. soil.

The effect of the declaration by the Castro government was to reject the U.S. demand that Cuba permit inspection by the United Nations to verify that Soviet missiles and other weapons have been removed from Cuba.

The official statement, printed in the government press, declared also that Cuba "reserves the right to acquire arms of any type for its defense and to take the steps it deems pertinent to strengthening its security."

This also was in retort to President Kennedy's new conference statement of last week noting that "no lasting safeguards" had yet been established against the re-introduction of offensive weapons to Cuba.

Claims of Aggression

The statement, as published in the newspaper *Revolucion*, said:

"The United Nations must verify on the continental soil of the United States, Puerto Rico and other sites where aggression is being prepared against Cuba, the dismantling of training camps of mercenaries, spies, saboteurs and terrorists, centers where subversion is being prepared and bases from which pirate ships embark against our coasts."

Castro's communique cited his previous five-point program for a Cuban settlement, which included a demand for U.S. withdrawal from the Guantanamo Naval base on the eastern tip of the island.

Mikoyan made a farewell address to the Cuban people Sunday night over a nationwide radio and television hookup, pledging that "the cause of Cuba is the cause of the Soviet Union."

OSU College Bowl Team Victorious

Corvallis—(UPI)—The victorious College Bowl team from Oregon State University was back on campus today and ready to begin training for next Sunday's television encounter with the University of New Mexico.

OSU scholars who joined Sunday to defeat a team of women from Manhattanville College 245-145 were Gary Kord, and Clifford Dempster of Corvallis and Fran Freeman and Mrs. Judy Torgerson of Portland.

"Some of the pleasure of victory was lost in defeating such fine young women," said Dr. James Groshong, associate professor of English who traveled with the OSU team to New York as coach.

The team brought back a \$1300 scholarship from General Electric and is assured of at least \$900 more even if it loses next week.

Nuclear Test Ban Efforts Urged

Geneva—(UPI)—The United States called on the 17-nation Disarmament Conference today to redouble its efforts to reach early agreement on a nuclear test ban and general and complete disarmament.

But the Soviet Union gave no indication that it is prepared to make an effort to do so. A Western spokesman said after the first session of the resumed conference that the Soviet position was unchanged.

The U.S. delegation chief told the conference that recent events which pushed civilization close to the abyss of nuclear war had brought a new sense of urgency to the conference's work.

Young Madras Couple Killed As Light Plane Hits Mountain

Takeoff Made Despite Warnings Of High Winds

Portland—(UPI)—The bodies of a Madras youth and his girlfriend were brought here Sunday from the wreckage of their light plane that crashed on Pepper Mountain east of here during a windstorm.

Killed in the Saturday evening crash, about 32 miles east of here, were Jerry M. Van Cleef, 20, son of a Madras farming family, and 17-year-old Dorothy Jean Simpson, a Madras High School senior.

They were flying back to Madras after viewing the Portland Auto Show, Mementos of the show were scattered through the wreckage of the single-engine Cessna 210.

The young couple took off from Portland International Airport around 8 p.m., despite posted warnings of high winds and severe turbulence along their flight path.

A little while later, Mr. and Mrs. Jack Emmer, who live near Pepper Mountain, reported hearing a plane crash.

A search was launched. Sunday morning, a plane taking off from Portland sighted the wreckage. Ground parties went in and recovered the bodies.

Freed Man Held by Military Authorities

Mountain Home, Idaho—(UPI)—Airman Gerald M. Anderson, 24, freed and cleared by civilian authorities of a murder charge after seven months in jail, will return to military confinement.

Anderson, who stepped off from the Elmore county courthouse this morning cleared of any implication in the stabbing deaths April 9 of Mrs. Nancy Joy Johnson, 22, and her son, Danny, still faced an Air Force inquiry.

Col. Charles A. Allard, commander of Mountain Home Air Force Base, said that "Airman Anderson was turned over to civilian authorities from military confinement."

"Upon his release, he will be returned to military confinement," Allard said in an impartial investigating officer will make a complete evaluation in order to determine further disposition or action to be taken.

Anderson was freed of the murder charge after authorities decided to believe the story of another man who said he killed the mother and child.

Madras Man Killed In One-Car Accident

Redmond—(UPI)—Stanley Taylor, 29, Madras, was injured fatally in a one-car accident today about four miles west of Sisters.

State police said Taylor's car left the road and struck a tree.

Exhausted Youth Reveals Story of Boating Tragedy

Bodega Bay, Calif.—(UPI)—A barefoot, exhausted boy told authorities today how he spent the entire night in a lonely search along a beach for his father, brother and four friends who all apparently drowned in a boating accident.

Mike Diller, 12, turned up wet and cold at 6 a.m. at the Jack Dei ranch here seeking help.

"He was so badly frightened," said herdsman Clyde Crump, "that he could hardly talk. I couldn't understand him, his teeth were chattering so bad."

Boat Found
Finally, the boy was able to tell his story and the overturned 14-foot aluminum boat was found about a half-mile from the ranch. The bodies of a man and three children were recovered. Two others were missing, and a search was under way.

The beach is below a steep, 200-foot cliff near the ranch, but the climb to the upland was not difficult. There are paths and a graded roadway so vehicles can reach the shore.

"The boy's just in a sort of delayed shock," Crump said. "He doesn't want to talk on the telephone, but he did talk to the sheriff's deputies when they got here this morning. I guess he was just in a daze for a long while, and then went to hunting for his friends himself."

The craft was powered by an outboard motor and, when found today, showed no structural damage. The boy had not viewed the bodies. His mother was being sought in a trailer camp near the beach by sheriff's deputies. She had not gone on the boating trip.

The boy said seven persons had been aboard the 21-ft. 11-in. craft. He said they were his father, Don Wayne Diller, about 33, Carmichael; his brother, Rusty, 8; "S'mitty" Smith, age unknown, and the two Smith children, Cindy, 4, and Stanley, 6.

Cows Became Uneasy
Crump said he first heard about the accident after the cows in the dairy barn became uneasy about 5:30 a.m.

"They were jumping around," Crump said, "and I got up to see what was wrong. I saw a face at one of the windows, and I thought it was a prank-puller."

"I ran out to catch him, but it was only a small boy and I caught him easy. He was so wet and frightened he could hardly speak. All he could say was 'town, town.' I took him in the house and got him warmed up. Then he told about the accident."

Brothers Killed In Sunday Crash
Ashland—Two brothers were killed and a young couple was seriously injured in an auto collision on Highway 99 near Walker ave. here last night.

Thomas L. Pruitt, 28, of 259 Bridge st., driver of one of the two cars involved, died instantly of a broken neck.

Ashland police reported. His brother, Jackie Lawrence Pruitt, 23, of 1715 Parker st., died at Ashland Community hospital at 7:45 p.m., a little over an hour after the accident.

Seriously injured, but reported in good condition today at the hospital, were David Vinson Lewis, 22, of Alameda, Calif., driver of the other car, and his wife Louise, 20. Both received facial lacerations and fractures that will require surgery. The Lewis' three-month-old son David was not injured.

Police said the accident occurred when Pruitt, northbound on Highway 99, crossed over into the southbound lane to pass another car. His car was then struck broadside by the oncoming southbound Lewis auto.

Largest Douglas Fir Shattered by Wind
Astoria—(UPI)—Washington state today inherited the honor of owning the largest Douglas fir tree. Oregon's mammoth fir, belonging to Crown-Zellerbach, was uprooted by the wind Sunday.

The forest giant, which poked more than 200 feet into the air in the firm's Klontehy Creek park in southeast Clatsop county, was shattered by the gusty winds.

The Oregon tree was judged the largest in the country, with a breast-high diameter of 15.48 feet, compared to 14.46 feet of the Washington tree.

Folsom Inmate Dies Attempting To Stop Kidnap

Folsom, Calif.—(UPI)—A deeply religious Folsom prison inmate died Sunday in a futile attempt to stop three other prisoners from kidnapping and holding hostage members of a church choir who had come to sing for them.

Conrad N. Becker, 41, serving time for burglary, was stabbed three times with a makeshift knife. He died without knowing that the three convicts released their prisoners unharmed after negotiations with prison authorities.

The stabbing occurred in the prison chapel of the maximum security prison just as the 16-member Bethel Choir from nearby Sacramento finished its first hymn of the afternoon services.

Becker noticed the three convicts, all armed with some sort of weapons, walking purposefully up the aisle toward the choir. He screamed, "Praise God," and attempted to tackle one of the men who turned and stabbed him repeatedly.

Serving Life Sentences
Th convicts, all serving life sentences, hustled six of the startled choir members and the prison chaplain into the chapel's seven-by-seven foot office.

Then they began negotiations for release with Warden Robert A. Heinze, and Richard A. McGee, director of the California prison system. Discussions were carried on through a window of the door which one convict smashed.

"They wanted us to open the gates, and we just don't open gates," said Heinze. "It's possible that these fellows just wanted to give it a try to see if it would work."

After three and a half hours the convicts, Farrell Fenton, 29, Edward W. Maher, 27, and Edward Caught, 29, released their seven hostages.

Rain Slows Road Work; Bridge Department Moves
Today's rains have temporarily stopped road work in the county. County Engineer Robert J. Carstensen said today.

Work on a grading project under way on the East Side rd. in the Applegate area has stopped, but is expected to resume when the rain stops. The project covers 1 1/2 miles. Carstensen noted that road crews work on road projects in the Applegate when poor weather and sticky soil in other parts of the county make work impossible.

Bridge crews are moving bridge timbers and materials to the future county road shop headquarters on Table Rock and Antelope rds., Carstensen said. The 41 acres and several buildings were acquired from the government surplus property section earlier. The area was occupied officially by the county last February.

The bridge crew will be relocated on the new property, the county engineer said.

Other equipment and materials shifted to the new location include a cold mix plant for road patching, plus materials and culvert pipe. It will be some time before the machine shop is moved from Barnett rd. to the new property, Carstensen said.

Bridge abutments on the Willow creek reservoir road have been completed, Carstensen added. The crew is now waiting for delivery of prestressed bridge frames to continue work. The beams will be delivered from the Norse Brothers' plant at Harrisburg near Eugene.

Routine road maintenance is continuing, he concluded.
