Russian Ready To Talk Business

United Nations, N.Y.—President Kennedy and British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan today announced plans to confer in the Bahamas Dec. 19-20.

It will be their sixth meeting since Kennedy took office. White House Press Secretary Pierre Salinger was in Nassau today making arrangements for the conference.

The announcement did not disclose an agenda. But the two leaders have a broad scale of international matters to discuss, ranging from Berlin to India to Cuba.

The announcement released at the White House said: "President Kennedy and Prime Minister Macmillan have felt that it would be useful to have a further meeting to continue the informal series of reviews of the world situation which they hold from time to time."

"It has therefore been agreed that the President and the prime minister will meet in the Bahamas Dec. 19-20."

Five Earlier Meetings

The five previous meetings between Kennedy and Macmillan took place in March, 1961, at Key West, Fla.; April, 1961, in Washington; June, 1961, in London; December, 1961, in Bermuda, and last April in Washington.

Macmillan will fly to Nassau shortly after meeting in France with President Charles de Gaulle.

Arrangements for the meeting were completed over the week end. A decision on timing of the announcement came Monday as the chief executive toured U.S. military installations in Georgia and Florida.

Board of Control Will Sponsor 22 Legislative Bills

Salem—UPI—The state board of control today agreed to sponsor 22 bills in the 1963 legislature, but rejected one which would allow teenagers in MacLaren School for Boys and Hillcrest School for Girls to smoke.

Under terms of the bill, the young inmates could smoke with written consent of their parents or guardians. All three board members opposed the idea.

Present Oregon law makes it illegal for anyone under 18 to smoke, either with or without their parents' consent. A 1959 law opened up the use of tobacco to minors with parental consent but this was later repealed.

Secretary of State Howell Appling Jr. said minors "shouldn't be permitted to smoke with or without their parent's permission."

Gov. Mark Hatfield and State Treasurer Howard C. Belton agreed. Hatfield said "We would be better off not to resurrect this question."

Bills being recommended to the legislature include those which would:

—Make the minimum term in the penitentiary and correctional institution one year. Anything less, prison officials say, doesn't allow enough time to evaluate an inmate and develop a rehabilitation program for him. Anything under a year would be a term in a county jail, according to the bill.

—Allow the board to develop inmate work camps with any public agency, state or federal. The board is not restricted to developing such camps with the state forestry department.

The board ordered its staff to come back later with a bill that would exempt doctors at state institutions from any judgment of malpractice. If a judgment was brought in by a court, the state would have to pay it. Although such doctors are state employees, under present law they have to pay such judgments out of their own pockets.

Pompidou to Form New Government at De Gaulle's Request

Paris—UPI—President Charles de Gaulle today asked Premier Georges Pompidou to form a new government before Parliament meets again Dec. 6, Pompidou agreed.

De Gaulle's move was announced in a brief official communiqué at the end of a two-hour meeting between the two at Elysee Palace.

Pompidou had been expected to announce formation of his cabinet tonight. But the wording of the communiqué that De Gaulle had asked him to form it before Parliament meets again appeared to indicate that step might be delayed for several days at least.

The swift move to form a new government in the wake of Sunday's overwhelming victory for De Gaulle's followers came as police accused a former naval officer of plotting to kill the president at a military parade last July 14.

The murder plotter was identified by police as 2nd Lt. Jean-Paul Gras, a deserter from the marines. He and another man with whom he had been staying, Marc Thibault, appeared before an examining magistrate on charges of plotting against the security of the state.

De Gaulle returned to Paris during the day along a heavily guarded railroad route following attendance at the funeral of former President Rene Coty in Le Havre. He promptly met with Pompidou, who had been holding office as a caretaker premier following a parliamentary revolt Oct. 5.

Police said Gras confessed that he intended to assassinate De Gaulle during the parade but dropped the plan because the Secret Army Organization gave him only two hand grenades. He said he thought this was not enough to do the job.

This was the fifth plot against De Gaulle's life reported since September, 1961.

Washington—UPI—The State Department announced today that it is "suspending" the regulations instituted during the Cuban crisis which required all officials in the department to report on their contacts and discussions with newsmen.

Assistant Secretary of State for Public Affairs Robert J. Manning said, however, that the department would reinstitute the procedures "if it becomes necessary or advisable."

Manning said he had discussed the information policy with Secretary of State Dean Rusk at some length and talked about it briefly with President Kennedy.

Notice that the procedures were being suspended was contained in a memorandum sent to all assistant secretaries of state "and other principal officers." It was then released to the press.

Peruvian Planes Spot Wreckage South of Lima

Lima, Peru—UPI—A Varig Airlines Boeing 707 jet airliner disappeared en route from Rio de Janeiro to Los Angeles with 97 persons today, and the Peruvian air force reported wreckage had been sighted on a hill about eight miles south of here. There were no signs of survivors.

The Peruvian Air Ministry said all aboard were killed when the plane crashed and burned.

Peruvian airport officials said the plane radioed the tower at Pisco, Peru, 20 minutes away from Lima and gave its position but reported no emergency. After the contact with Pisco there was no further communication with the aircraft, officials said.

Erroneous reports that wreckage had been sighted near Mala, a town of 1,500 on the Pan American highway, led Lima airport officials to begin the search there. That search was called off later.

Mala police said the false reports apparently were given by nearby residents who reported a loud explosion at 8 a.m. That, however, was two hours after the plane, with 80 passengers and a crew of 17, had been scheduled to land at Lima.

Nine Bound for States

Among those reported aboard was Maj. Gen. Jesus Melgar, Peruvian minister of agriculture, and his wife.

The passenger list had the names of nine persons bound for Los Angeles, all of whom had Latin American
