Play up the "helpless little me" bit, even though you're about as helpless as a Mack truck. This is one woman's advice to the thousands of females currently reading travel folders and checking airline, ship and train schedules against the next vacation.

The "Oh, how nice of you, but..." goes a long way toward getting carry-on baggage carried on by some strapping male. And don't ask me why, but women always are laden with more hand luggage than men. Anyway, if a HE helps you with hand luggage, you're free to search for passport, immunization card, boarding pass, all the paraphernalia that goes with international travel.

Has Suggestions
From this tour of Southeast Asia with 11 other newspaperwomen on an inaugural Scandinavian Airlines flight, my notebook is crowded with these suggestions to the woman traveler.

Some are unorthodox; most you won't find in a travel folder.

For instance, the safety razor for neat legs. Packed in a suitcase, it speeds your way through customs. Just casually warn the inspector that the razor is there when he goes poking through suitcase compartments. Then add that it's loaded.

Pack pills: Vitamin pills, sleeping pills, antihistamine pills, pills for air or sea sickness, aspirin. . . It will turn out you will NOT need a single one, but the reason for packing is one of morale. Knowing they are there keeps you healthy.

Pack money. I mean, load your billfold with \$1 bills. It is a rare country in which the dollar is not accepted if you don't just happen to have local currency. But having small denomination saves on the inevitable load of pesos, ticas, yen, etc., all to be reconverted to dollars when the trip is over.

Don't overpack clothes. The less the baggage—an airlines allowance of 44 pounds should be more than ample—the fewer the worries, because you'll be seeing different people and different places. YOU will get tired of that basic suit or dress to the point of deciding it belongs to the Salvation Army when you get home, but no one else is getting the same mileage out of it. Relax, and let the costume play to several.

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audiences. Don't sit around the hotel room when traveling alone. You've paid your money to get to another land. Pay a little more, hire a reputable guide for sightseeing. Or, join a tour. Perhaps the latter sounds most unsophisticated, but there is no better way to get a basic look at a new city. This builds the groundwork for your own later exploration.

Washington—UPI—The state-halls of the White House will be turned over this afternoon to the Kennedy children—Caroline and her little brother John—who have invited their friends in for a joint birthday party.

About 30 youngsters in their party best are expected to sing "happy birthday" to Caroline who is 5 today, and to John Jr., who became two years old Sunday.

John Jr. missed out on Thanksgiving and earlier birthday festivities with his family at Hyannis Port, Mass., because of a slight cold which forced him to remain in the care of his nurse, Maud Shaw, at the White House.

Caroline and her brother are expected to gather with their little friends in the State Dining room to blow out the candles on the big birthday cake. White House butlers will be serving ice cream and milk to the children, who also attend Caroline's kindergarten class and the daily play school on the third floor of the mansion.

Their first cousins in the same age bracket—children of Atty. Gen. and Mrs. Robert Kennedy and the Sargent Shriver—will be coming to the party, which will be held from 4 to 6 p.m. EST.

The White House likes to keep the children's doing top secret. But like birthday parties in every American home, there are expected to be favors and gifts for all the little guests.

Caroline is a great fan of Mickey Mouse and other cartoons, and it is probable that she will lead the children down to the ground floor theater for movies.

Gifts and birthday cards have poured in for the children from throughout the country.

Swim, Stay Fit Program Is Announced by YMCA

As a follow-up for the physical fitness testing program recently conducted by the Medford YMCA and in conjunction with the women's recreation program, a "Swim and Stay Fit" activity is being launched at the Y on Saturday, December 1.

This program consists of a 50-mile swim to be completed in quarter mile stretches over an indefinite period of time. Each participant may set his or her own pace. The initial three miles are done in quarter mile laps, although they do not have to be completed non-stop. During this early phase the swimmer is gradually building up his endurance and may complete his laps with rests in between. After completing three miles the individuals condition should be such that he can swim consecutive laps for at least a quarter of a mile.

Students will be able to do their laps on Saturdays and women will be able to swim Tuesdays and Thursdays between 6:30 and 7:30 p.m. and during the women's slim and trim program on Monday, Wednesday and Friday mornings. 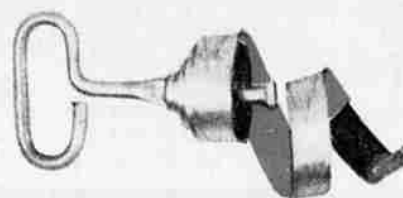
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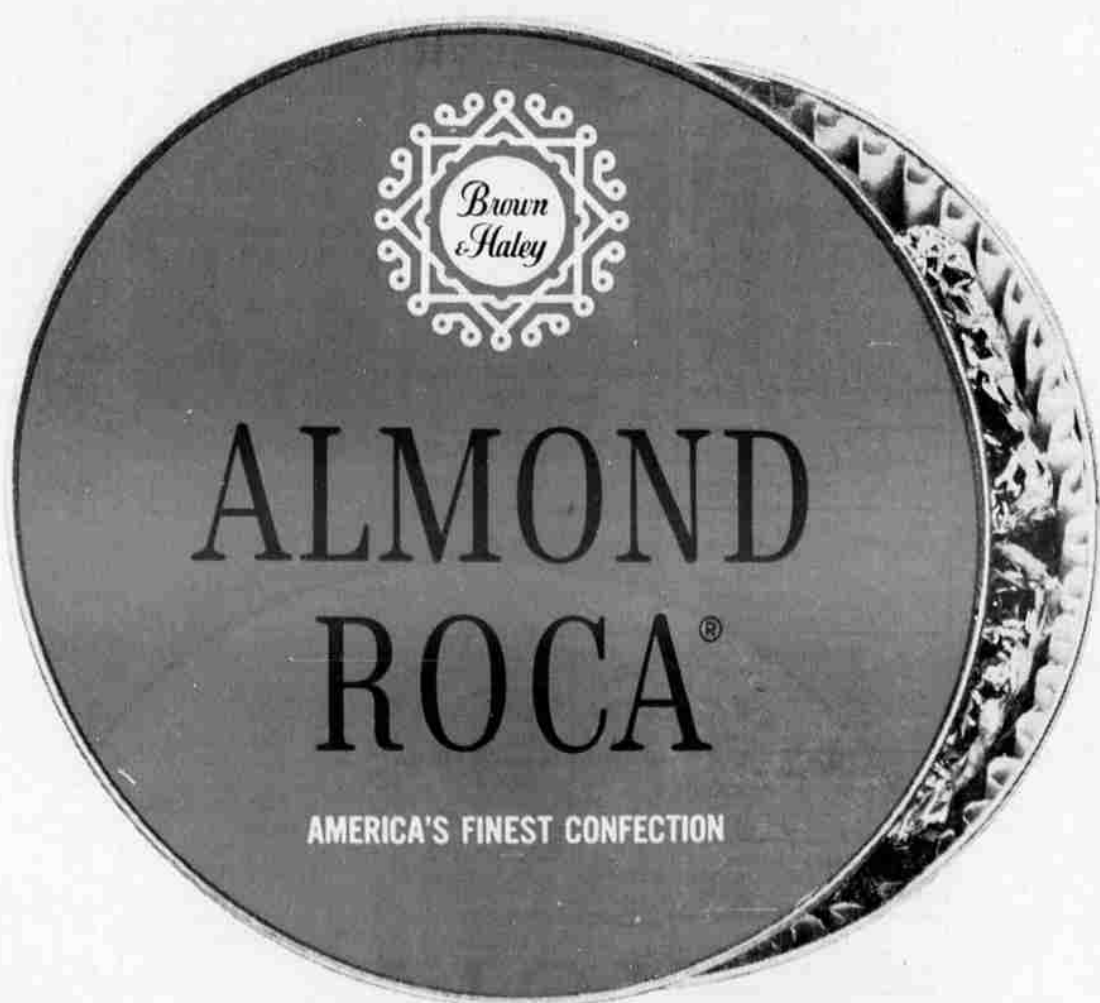
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
