

Terry Baker Makes Coaches' All-America; Renfro on 2nd

Chicago — (UPI) — The South, Midwest and Far West, with three players each, dominated the 1962 All-America football team selected Tuesday by the American Football Coaches Association.

The mythical eleven, chosen by the men who know the game the best, was rounded out by one player from the East and the Southwest.

More than 250 coaches, representing all the major colleges, took part in the balloting with the selection of the quarterback "the most difficult decision in the 1962 voting," according to President Bill Murray, president of the coaches association and head football coach at Duke.

"This year was a vintage year for quarterbacks," Murray said.

The spot went to Terry Baker of Oregon State, who got the nod over George Mira of Miami (Fla.) and Tom Myers of Northwestern. Mira was named to the second team, Myers to the third.

Bill Is Only Repeater
There was only one repeater from the coaches' 1961 team — tackle Bobby Bell of Minnesota.

Machen Camp Challenges Clay To Pick Round

Portland — (UPI) — Young heavyweight Cassius Clay was offered \$10,000 if he can name the round he can knock out Eddie Machen, then follow through.

Sid Flaherty, Machen's manager, issued the challenge. "If he'll fight Machen," he said, "we'll post a \$10,000 cashier's check. It's all his if he can name the round."

Clay recently predicted he would dispose of veteran Archie Moore in the fourth round — and did.

Flaherty said, "So far Clay's fought the usual run of washed-up fighters and one ancient warrior. Machen's been trying to get Moore into the ring for the last four years and hasn't had any luck. Clay's been mouthy enough to pick the round for nearly every heavyweight fight he's had. Let's see him do it now."

Machen, who fights out of Portland, backed up his manager. "If he can pick the round against me, then make it good, I'll crawl across the ring on my hands and knees and give him the check."

Curtice Reported Fired

Stanford, Calif. — (UPI) — Stanford University Coach Cactus Jack Curtice whose team finished this year with a mediocre 5-5 record was fired Monday.

Though Curtice would not admit his services were no longer wanted by the Indians, a high authoritative source confirmed the action of Athletic Director Alfred R. Masters.

Curtice, reached at his Palo Alto, Calif., home, said he was honored to be "silenced by Masters."

But he indicated he would not be around the Stanford campus next year by expressing concern about moving his young son to a different school.

"You do the best you can on a job and hope it's good enough," said Curtice. "Sometimes it isn't."

Curtice had been coach at Stanford for five years and his firing has been the subject of discussion for three of them.

One Stanford spokesman said the question of whether to replace the jovial bespectacled coach has been a subject for discussion for "some time."

Never A Winner
Though his teams have shown flashes of brilliance, he never has finished a season here with more wins than losses.

Curtice's best year has been this one. He wound up winning the "big game" against California — the second year in a row — last Saturday to end the season with a 5-5 record. California Coach Marv Levy, whose season record is 1-9 recently received a new two-year contract.

In another house cleaning, line coach John Neumann and linebacker coach Lou Cullen gave their "resignations" to Levy yesterday at the University of California.

Both men insisted that they resigned for "personal reasons," but it was known that the alumni had pressured Levy regarding his defensive staff.

Southern Cal Leads UPI Ratings Again; OSU Picked 15th

New York — (UPI) — Rose Bowl bound Southern California, needing only one more victory to complete its first perfect season in 20 years, was named the nation's No. 1 major college football team by the United Press International Board of Coaches.

The Trojans, who wind up what they hope will be their most successful season since 1932 this Saturday against Notre Dame, drew 22 first-place votes from the 35-man UPI coaching board and increased their lead to 48 points over second-place Wisconsin, the team they will meet on New Year's Day in the Rose Bowl game at Pasadena, Calif.

Wisconsin, which completed 1962 regular-season play last Saturday with a 14-9 victory over Minnesota that gave the Badgers the Big Ten championship and the unqualified right to play in the Rose Bowl, was named No. 1 by 5 coaches, while Mississippi, idle last Saturday, drew 5 votes for the spot. Mississippi, which has an inside track for a Sugar Bowl berth opposite Arkansas, slipped from second place to third.

The Rebels, unbeaten in eight games, finish up Saturday against Mississippi State.

Texas, which earned a Cotton Bowl berth by beating Texas A&M on Thanksgiving Day, remained fourth; Alabama moved up two positions from 10th to eighth; Penn State remained ninth, and Minnesota slipped from fifth

to 10th.

All of the top 10 teams except Minnesota either have accepted bowl bids, are in the process of nailing down automatic berths or will decide on already tendered invitations. UPI will crown the national champion next week and will present the winning school with a permanent trophy emblematic of its championship.

Georgia Tech, which will meet Missouri in the Bluebonnet Bowl, headed the second 10 grouping this week, followed by Washington, Ohio State, Duke, Oregon State, Missouri, Northwestern, Michigan State and Illinois in that order. Only 19 teams received votes in this next-to-last week of balloting.

Major League Draft Is Branded 'Socialistic' As Teams Pick 56 Men

Rochester, N.Y. — (UPI) — President Johnny McHale of the Milwaukee Braves, who lost five first-year players in the major league draft, angrily branded it "socialistic" today and said it represented one year's work down the drain.

But if McHale was upset over the Braves' loss in the draft, how about the Baltimore Orioles, who watch seven of their first-year farmhands snatched up by other major league competitors and eight more in the minor league go-around?

Revamp Draft System
All told, 56 players were drafted for a record total of \$680,000 Monday by major league clubs in the biggest bargain basement binge in baseball history. Of this total, 45 were first-year players.

And by the time the minors get through drafting the total reached 110 players and \$1,178,000.

It all came about because of organized baseball's revamped draft system, which was designed to curb excessive bonus spending for untried talent.

The current draft rule provides that any first-year player not promoted to the roster of the major league club which signed him must run the draft gauntlet at prices of \$12,000 or \$8,000.

"That's all good and well," McHale said, "but the five first-year men we lost yesterday represented some of the best young ballplayers in our farm system and at least one year's work by our scouting staff."

"The \$40,000 we'll receive for these five players won't even come close to our expense for scouting and developing them this past season."

Eleven minor leaguers were drafted at the top price of \$25,000 each; 15 first-year men were picked at \$12,000 each; and 29 first-year players at \$8,000 each.

The New York Mets, with first choice in the annual grab bag, chose Ted Schreiber, 24, an infielder who batted .277

for Seattle of the Pacific Coast league last season.

It had been expected that the Mets would make a pitcher, former Giant hurler Alan (Red) Worthington, their No. 1 choice but instead the National League tail-enders named Schreiber.

The Washington Senators had the second choice and selected pitcher James Duckworth from San Diego of the PCL.

Worthington was No. 3 and was selected from Indianapolis of the American association by the Cincinnati Reds.

The Los Angeles Angels chose pitcher Gordon Richardson from Atlanta of the International league.

Beavers Accept Bowl Bid
Corvallis — (UPI) — Oregon State today accepted an invitation to play Villanova in the fourth annual Liberty Bowl football game in Philadelphia Dec. 15.

Athletic Director Speer Keene said the Beavers' acceptance was wired East at 9 a.m. today.

Villanova, which was a 7-2 season's record, accepted its invitation yesterday.

Oregon State, featuring the aerial combination of Terry Baker to Vern Burke, finished the season with an 8-2 record.

Keene said the team would leave here for Philadelphia Thursday, Dec. 13. The team voted to accept the invitation yesterday.

The Dec. 15 date means that Baker will miss three more weeks of basketball practice. He is a regular on the Oregon State hoop team.

The University of Oregon played in the Liberty Bowl in 1960 and was drubbed by Penn State, 41-12.

Cincinnati Picked 1st, Oregon State 6th in Basketball Poll

New York — (UPI) — The University of Cincinnati, which so relished the role of underdog that it won the NCAA championship for the past two years, today was rated the most likely 1962-63 national college basketball champion by the United Press International Board of Coaches.

Thirty of the 35 famous coaches who comprise the UPI board tabbed Cincy's Bearcats as the No. 1 team in the country in the annual pre-season major college ratings.

The coaches saw Cincinnati's chief threat for the national crown coming from the South as they rated Duke No. 2, Kentucky No. 3, and West Virginia No. 4 before switching back to the Midwest to pick Loyola of Chicago to round out the top five.

Votes of the coaches, who will rate the nation's teams weekly for UPI subscribers throughout the season, were compiled on a basis of 10-9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1 for votes from first place through 10th.

Out of a possible 350-point "perfect score," Cincinnati received 343 points for 30 first-place votes, and one fourth-place vote, and one fourth-place vote.

Of the five first place votes missed by the Bearcats, three went to Duke, one to Kentucky, and one to West Virginia.

Completing the top 10, were Oregon State in 6th, Mississippi State 7th, St. Bonaventure 8th, Wisconsin 9th, and Stanford and Bowling Green tied for 10th.

Ranked from 12th through 20th were Dayton, Illinois, Kansas State, Arizona State, New York U., UCLA, Colorado State, Creighton and Indiana.
