Pontiff Cancels Audiences for Two Days in Row

First Reports Say Influenza Cause

Vatican City — Pope John XXIII's physician hurried to the Vatican today and informed sources said the ailing Pontiff, 81, may be suffering from something more serious than the influenza he had announced as the reason he had cancelled his audiences for two days in a row.

Prof. Antonio Gasbarrini, the Pope's doctor, came from Bologna to Rome this morning and promptly went to the Pope's bedside in the Vatican Palace.

Gasbarrini, only four months younger than the Pope, held lengthy discussions with Vatican officials before and after he made an examination of the pontiff, who previously was reported "indisposed" with influenza, nausea and lack of appetite.

Following the examination, high Vatican sources indicated the Pope was suffering from more than the flu. Although these sources did not specify, they gave the impression that it was trouble, not uncommon with men of his age. The Pope is known to have had prostate trouble in the past.

Wilhelmina of Netherlands Dies At Age of 82

Amsterdam, Holland — Queen Wilhelmina, who ruled the Netherlands for 58 years and became a symbol of strength against Nazi aggression, died in her sleep early today of a heart ailment complicated by old age. She was 82.

At her bedside in the wooded estate of Het Loo Palace were her daughter, Queen Juliana; Prince Bernhard, Juliana's husband; and two granddaughters, Princess Margriet and Marijke.

Heiress presumptive Princess Beatrix was summoned home from Hong Kong, her latest stop on a world tour. Princess Irene was flying back from London.

This nation of 11.4 million was plunged into deep mourning for the beloved Queen Mother who had lifted its spirits and bolstered its courage during the darkest days of World War II.

Flags were lowered to half-staff. Holland's two radio networks interrupted their programs to broadcast news of the death and then observed 10 minutes silence, followed by mourning music.

In accordance with her wishes, Wilhelmina will be "buried in white like her beloved husband, Prince Hendrik" in the Delft cathedral. He died in 1934. The tombs are near that of William the Silent who founded Holland in the 16th century.

Wilhelmina, who escaped Nazi dive bombers May 13, 1940, and fled to a wartime exile in England, had been ailing for several weeks. Medical bulletins were issued at her own request.

She had ruled from the throne longer than any other member of the House of Orange, ascending at the age of 10 in 1890. She was officially crowned eight years later.

She stepped down from the throne Sept. 3, 1948, in favor of Juliana.

Injuries Fatal To Ashland Man

Charles Lee Resho, 41, of 667 Walnut st., Ashland, died shortly before noon today from injuries received in an automobile accident early this morning.

He had been taken to Rogue Valley hospital with facial lacerations and skull fractures. According to Oregon state police, Resho's station wagon struck a trailer sticking out of a ditch on Highway 99 near the Talent junction.

Driver of the semi-truck and trailer was Warren Dale Miller, 33, of Clackamas, Ore., who received facial lacerations. His passenger, Jack Calvin Brownlee, 32, Portland, received possible back injuries. Both were hospitalized.

The truck, northbound, jackknifed when it attempted to miss a horse on the highway, police said. Persons at the accident attempted to flag down Resho, but were unable to do so to avoid the collision.

He is the fifth person to die in county automobile accidents during the past 29 days.

United States Sees Proposal As 'Too Vague'

Soviets Accused of Negative Maneuvers

Geneva — (UPI) — Sweden today urged the formation of an international scientific commission with on-site inspection powers to police a nuclear test moratorium. But the United States immediately poured cold water on the proposal by saying it was too vague.

U.S. Ambassador Arthur H. Dean again called on the Soviet Union to accept the principle of international on-site inspection of suspected nuclear blasts when the three-nation test ban subcommittee of the 17-nation Disarmament conference composed of the United States, Britain and the Soviet Union held its 43th meeting.

Negative Maneuvers Charged — He accused the Soviets of engaging in negative and unconstructive maneuvers to block the negotiations, but said the time was certainly right for a settlement and that the United States would do everything possible to achieve a test ban treaty as quickly as possible.

Earlier, at the 84th plenary session of the conference, Swedish Ambassador Rolf Edberg had called on the world's major nuclear powers to appoint an international commission of scientists to police a test ban immediately.

Both the United States and the Soviet Union promised to study the Swedish plan, but Dean made it clear, in talking to reporters afterwards, that he did not think much of it. The plan appeared too vague, he said, and would not work unless the Soviets agree to accept the principal of international control something they have not done to date.

No Soviet Comment — Semyon K. Tsarapkin, the Soviet negotiator, made no comment on the Swedish proposal other than to say it was very interesting.

At the afternoon session of the subcommittee, Dean called on the Soviets to bring forth scientists to back their frequently made contention that national detection systems or some form of unmanned seismic devices are adequate to police a ban.

"Reasonable men ought to be able to reach a solution to a problem which is so clearly one of deciding, on the basis of scientific evidence, what the facts of the case actually are," Dean said.

Lease Discussed For U.S. Hotel

The U.S. Hotel in Jacksonville may be leased to an individual in the east who operates historic hotel concessions, it was reported at last night's meeting of the Jacksonville Pioneer Sites Foundation.

Sites Foundation President Jack Sutton said he would contact the man to see if arrangements might be made when the hotel renovation is completed.

The front part of the hotel could be renovated in the near future so it can be used. George Brewer, members of the hotel committee, said. Work parties are needed to install the upper story windows and do other work, he added.

Foundation members discussed the possibility of obtaining a new sign for the Methodist church in Jacksonville. Thomas Vaughan of the Oregon Historical Society, said he had received complaints that the sign on the church is not accurate. It states "The Oldest Protestant Church West of the Rockies."

Vaughan cited an authority who stated the West Union Baptist church was dedicated in 1833 and the Jacksonville church in 1854. California has churches of 1851 and 1853 vintage, he added.

Ambulance Law Repeal Drafted

Salem — (UPI) — Legislation to repeal the controversial 1961 ambulance law has been drafted, State Health Officer Richard Wilcox said today.

He said at least two legislators are working on repeal legislation, and legislation to make drastic changes in the law in lieu of repeal. They are State Reps. C. R. Hoyt (R-Corvallis) and Winton Hunt (R-Salem).

The law went into effect last year but the State Board of Health, besieged by complaints from small private and volunteer ambulance operators, has delayed enforcing it until March 1, 1963.

Since the legislature meets in January, any needed changes can be made before the enforcement date.

Wilcox said the biggest complaint about the new law is the matter of fees, including a \$100 a year fee per ambulance and a \$5 fee for operators.

Reclamationists Start Meetings In Medford Today

The Oregon Reclamation Congress activities were scheduled to get under way this afternoon with committee meetings at the Jackson County extension service auditorium south of Medford, according to Jack Hoffhuhr, Medford Irrigation district manager.

Committee reports will be made on research and agriculture, new projects and public relations.

Registration is scheduled at 7 o'clock tonight. John Stewart, Klamath Falls, congress president, will preside over the general session starting at 9 a.m. tomorrow in the extension service auditorium.

"I want to urge the general public as well as farmers to attend the congress sessions since there will be talks of interest to everyone. Theme this year is reclamation and recreation," Hoffhuhr said.

Symposium on Resources

One of the more interesting sessions will be a symposium on Oregon's water resources starting at 10:30 a.m. Thursday. Chris Wheeler, state engineer from Salem, will talk on the water master situation in Oregon. Jack Seva, ground water geologist, Salem, will speak on the status of good water in Oregon. Don Lane, executive secretary of the state water resources board, Salem, will speak on Oregon water resources board activities.

At tomorrow's luncheon meeting, Harold T. Nelson, bureau of reclamation district director, Boise, Ida., will speak on reclamation on reclamation projects.

At the Thursday afternoon session, Tom Helseth, state conservationist, will talk on the status of Public Law 566 projects in Oregon.

People planning to attend the banquet tomorrow night at the Rogue Valley Country club have been asked to make reservations when they register.

County Court, FS Consider Agreement

The Jackson County court this morning considered a consent and subordination agreement with the U.S. forest service for use of sections of the Colostine rd. as part of the access road to the proposed Mt. Ashland ski area.

County Engineer Robert J. Carstensen said the county must give permission for use of the county's right-of-way.

The county court also considered this morning the sale of a small piece of county property on High banks rd. and Kirtland rd. between Table Rock rd. and the old Blackwell Hill road.

An area rancher wants to purchase the property, Carstensen said. The county now uses the property for storage. If the property would be sold, Carstensen said he would want to be assured that the county could leave its rock stockpile there, since it is a central location.

Freedom Center Material Submitted For Investigation

Salem — (UPI) — Secretary of State Howell Appling Jr. said Tuesday he has turned some Freedom Center material pertaining to Rep. Edith Green (D-Ore.), over to the Marion County district attorney for "investigation and appropriate legal action."

Appling, chief Oregon elections officer, took the action after receiving a letter from Walter Huss, director of the Freedom Center in Portland, rejecting Appling's contention that the center is required to file a statement of contributions and expenses in connection with the recent campaign.

The center material in question was critical of Mrs. Green, who was reelected Nov. 6.

Huss said "the Freedom Center is not now, and never has been, a political organization. We categorically deny your allegation of any literature campaign or expenses for or against Mrs. Green or any other candidate. Your charges are false and without foundation of fact."

Huss said the center is "an educational and charitable organization conducting research and writing and the publishing of its results to advance education and the enlightenment of the general public."

Appling replied that "our law will become a mockery if it can be evaded by the contention that literature attacking various candidates is 'educational' and not political."

Children Admit Entering Building

Six children, ages 9 through 14, have admitted to Medford police they entered the Salvation Army building, 236 North Bartlett st., and took toys and candy from a store room.

The children broke a window with a pipe to gain entry to the building from an alley, police said. A mechanic at the Greyhound Bus station observed the children as they were leaving the building.

Officers followed a trail of candy from the alley for several blocks to the homes of some of the children involved. The children were questioned by police and released to their parents.

UO Social Clubs Queried In Pledging of Negroes

Eugene — (UPI) — University of Oregon fraternities and sororities are being asked by letter if their national chapters have "unwritten" rules against pledging Negroes or members of other minority races.

Arthur Flemming, president of the school, said the letters ask if the university chapters are "free to pledge members without regard to race, color, or creed."

The State Board of Higher Education has set a Jan. 1 deadline for elimination of any pledging restrictions against minorities. Flemming said the letters represent a step in compliance with the board's edict.

Donald DuShane, dean of students, said all 16 of the national fraternities and all but two of the 20 national fraternities here have said they have no discriminatory clauses in their national charters. The two fraternities, however, said their local chapters are free to pledge members without regard to race or religion.

Flemming said that if there are replies that some unwritten discriminatory policies exist he would then have to decide the next step.

He said replies are due by Dec. 10.

Flemming said the school was not trying to direct local fraternities or sororities to pledge Negroes or others but was trying to assure that these groups have the right to do so if they choose.

No Negro Members — DuShane said there were no Negro members of any sorority or fraternity on the campus now, to his knowledge.

The university, newspaper, Daily Emerald, said editorially Tuesday the information should be gathered on the national level, too.

Psychiatric Test Suggested for Duel Challenger

La Paz, Bolivia — (UPI) — Political leader Armando Bascope, 43, shot Tuesday night that Rosa Dolz, 33, the congresswoman who has challenged him to a "duel to the death," should see a psychiatrist.

Bascope, provincial leader of the governing MNR party, said Mrs. Dolz appears to be suffering from "delusions of grandeur."

Preparations for the proposed duel were in abundance today while the principals awaited action by the MNR Executive Committee. The committee, which held an emergency meeting on the matter Tuesday, was expected to work out a settlement.

Complaint filed — Bascope said he had filed a complaint with Dist. Atty. Miguel Rodriguez Olivet concerning damage done to the MNR provincial headquarters by Mrs. Dolz and her followers.

Rodriguez told newsmen Friday night supporters of Mrs. Dolz stoned the party offices, breaking several windows, while the congresswoman fired several shots at the building. No one was hit.

The district attorney said he is preparing to prosecute the case.

Mrs. Dolz told newsmen Monday she had challenged Bascope because he expelled her from the party for "lack of discipline."

It was believed to be the first time a Bolivian woman had ever issued such a challenge.

Told By Telephone — Bascope said Lidia Guetier, a leader of the MNR Women's Auxiliary who is seconding Mrs. Dolz, told him about the challenge by telephone but that he had received no formal notification of it.

The MNR leader said he is prepared to defend himself if necessary.

"Rosa may be handy with a pistol, but I'm not so bad myself," Bascope said.

He added that Mrs. Dolz was expelled from the party after a number of warnings, because of the "methods of violence" she favored.
