

SO's Howard Hartman Picked On Little All-Coast Squad

San Francisco (UPI)—Fresno State's Bulldogs, playing what came close to being a "big college" football schedule, placed three men on the 22-man 1962 United Press International Little All Coast football team.

Because the small college teams mostly play on an unlimited substitution basis, the team was doubled to make room for men playing on either the defensive or the offensive units.

Named from the Fresno team were quarterback Jon Anabo; center J. R. Williams and tackle Monte Day.

San Diego State, the CCAA champion; San Francisco State, Far Western champion; Linfield, the Northwest Conference champion; and Cal Poly of Pomona each placed two men on the all-star squad.

Raider Shift Chances Slim

Oakland, Calif. (UPI)—Chances that the Oakland Raiders might be shifted to New Orleans next year were slim today.

The Oakland Raider management met Tuesday night to consider a \$400,000 offer for the team by a New Orleans syndicate headed by David Dixon.

But Raider owners Ed McGah and Wayne Valley held out for \$700,000 and no deal was closed.

Although many cities are pitching for the Raider franchise, the team was told Tuesday that the \$25 million Oakland-Alameda county stadium most likely would be ready for occupancy in 1964.

Valley said he was "favorably impressed" by the news.

The Raiders now play at Frank Youell field, which seats 19,000. A new home for the Raiders is a must since they need an average crowd of 21,000 to break even.

The Raiders have not won a game this season and are averaging only about 10,000 per contest at home.

REACH AGREEMENT

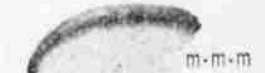

Nat Fleischer Suggests National Boxing Control

Albany, N.Y. (UPI)—A world famous boxing authority suggested today the possibility of establishing national control over boxing.

Nat Fleischer, a 75-year-old writer and boxing editor, told a joint state legislative committee that a national commission of boxing should be established to control prizefighting providing it did not take away any of the states' rights.

Under a commission, he said, rules and regulations could be made uniform and a system could be worked out to pick challengers for title fights.

The committee, created earlier this year after the death of Benny (Kid) Paret following a welterweight title bout, is to make recommendations to the 1963 state legislature on whether the sport should be banned in New York or further regulated.

Fleischer told the committee he opposed banning boxing because it would merely period of 'bottle' fighting which flourished in the upstate area between 1917 and 1920.

"We would return to that period of 'bottle' fighting where fights were conducted with no medical or legal supervisions," he said. "The injuries in those days were tremendous."

During the period, he said, there were 17 deaths in unsupervised matches. From 1920 to the present, with supervisions, there have been a similar number of ring fatalities.

Fleischer, a boxer who quit when he was knocked out, said New York state boxing was free from under-world influence.

"I don't know of any unsavory characters in boxing today in this state," he said.

Statistics Led By Washington

San Francisco (UPI)—Unbeaten University of Southern California is headed for the Rose Bowl, but once-beaten Washington is hogging most of the latest Big Six team statistics.

The Huskies lead the conference in total defense, 239 yards per game, rushing offense, 251 yards, and in rushing defense, 117 yards.

The Trojans boast the best total offense, 332 yards; California leads in passing offense with 180 yards; and UCLA in pass defense, 99 yards per game.

USC has one more game and UCLA two more but the Huskies' lead in the three statistical departments appears to be insurmountable.

BOB CHARLES FAVORED

Bradenton, Fla. (UPI)—New Zealand golf pro Bob Charles was tabbed as the favorite today as the \$10,000 national lefthanders golf tournament got under way here. Charles, who finished fifth this year in the British Open and was medalist in the Canadian Cup matches played recently in Argentina, established himself as odds-on favorite with his showing Tuesday in a pro-amateur event.

Savage To Wrestle; Texas Death Match Holds Spotlight

Wild Bill Savage, who local wrestling fans love to boo, returns to the Medford armory wrestling ring Thursday night to take on smooth-operating Ted Evans of Winnipeg, Canada, in the semi-windup. They are scheduled for 45 minutes or two out of three falls.

Savage, a former all-navy champion, is a veteran of southwest mat circles, regarded as one of the wildest in the country because of the roughhouse tactics allowed there.

The main event will introduce Texas death match wrestling to Medford when it pits Nick Kozak against Haru Sasaki in a grudge affair.

Under Texas death match rules, only choking, eye gouging and low blows are barred. There will be no time limit and any number of falls are possible. A one-minute time limit will be allowed between falls and the match will continue until one man is unable to answer the bell.

The Nov. 8 card when Kozak rushed into the ring to break a Japanese sleeper hold Sasaki had applied to Evans. Sasaki felled the referee and refused to break the hold until Kozak and Referee Elton Owen entered the ring and an impromptu fight started.
