

Honors Flooded on Terry Baker; Gains Heisman Memorial Trophy

Corvallis—UPI—Terry Baker, who has been breaking records since his sophomore year at Oregon State, may have set another unofficial one.

Perhaps no other athlete has received as many honors in one day as the Beaver quarterback collected in a few hours Tuesday.

In chronological order, Baker: —Was named first team quarterback on the All-American Football Coaches association.

—Was assured of one more college football game when the Beavers accepted an invitation to play Villanova Dec. 15 in the Liberty Bowl at Philadelphia.

—Was named winner of the Heisman Memorial Trophy as the nation's outstanding college football player, the first player ever from the West Coast to get the award.

—And was chosen by the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame as the outstanding scholar-athlete on the West Coast.

In addition, Oregon State said it would retire his jersey — No. 11.

It all adds up to a strenuous three weeks between now and Dec. 15 for the senior quarterback who led the nation in total offense with 2,275 yards this season.

Baker was called from a class by OSU athletic director R. S. (Spec) Keene and told he had won the Heisman award.

"No kidding? That's great. I'm a very lucky boy," he said. Then, "I've got to get back to class."

An interest in going to class while he can now is natural.

Baker is due in New York Monday night to receive the scholar-athlete award. He and the other members of the coaches' All-America team will appear on the Ed Sullivan television show. Wednesday he will receive the Heisman Trophy, given by the Downtown Athletic Club of New York.

And looming over Baker and all other Beaver players is the fact that the Liberty Bowl game falls at the end of fall term final examination week at Oregon State. Baker, who has a 3.04 grade point average, must get most of his exams out of the way before the Beavers leave for Philadelphia.

WORST INJURY

Jerome made a brief stopover at Portland International Airport. He has a pulled muscle in his left leg. B-B Boys Top Nation In Offense

New York—UPI—Oregon State's passing combination of Terry Baker and Vern Burke has clinched the total offense and passing receiving titles.

Baker has gained 2,275 yards to top the nation's major college players in total offense while Burke has caught 69 passes for 1,007 yards, the latest NCAA service bureau figures showed today.

Baker also is third in forward passing with 112 completions in 203 attempts for 1,738 yards and 15 touchdowns. The leader is Dick Shiner of Maryland, who completed 121 passes in 203 attempts for 1,324 yards and only four touchdowns.

Mel Renfro of Oregon is tied for eighth in scoring with 13 touchdowns and 78 points.

In team statistics Oregon State ranks second in the nation in total offense and third in passing offense. The Beavers have a total offense average of 375.2 yards per game in 10 games. Arizona State is the leader with 384.4 average, also in 10 games. Both teams have completed their regular seasons.

OSU's Baker Cited for Scholarship

New York—UPI—Terry Baker of Oregon State, this year's Heisman Trophy winner, was one of eight college senior football players designated today as scholar-athletes of the year by the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame.

The eight players, one from each geographical district of the country, were selected not only for their football ability, but also for their academic application and achievement and all-around leadership qualities.

Joining Baker in this distinguished group are Albert Snyder of Holy Cross, Timothy Callard of Princeton, Gary Cuozzo of Virginia, Bob Heckman of Dayton, Rex Russell of Oklahoma State, John Culppepper of Texas and Ron Manno of Utah.

Each is entitled to an Earl H. Blaik fellowship of \$500 if he goes on to graduate studies. The prizes will be presented at the annual awards dinner of the foundation in New York, Dec. 4, at which time Associate Justice Byron (Whizzer) White of the Supreme Court will receive the foundation's annual gold medal award.

OREGON STATE ACCEPTS BID TO LIBERTY BOWL

Corvallis, Ore.—UPI—Oregon State has accepted an invitation to face Villanova in the fourth annual Liberty Bowl at Philadelphia Stadium Dec. 15.

Villanova accepted the bid Monday to play in the bowl which will benefit the 60 member hospitals in the Delaware Valley Hospital Council. Oregon State, featuring Heisman Trophy Winner Terry Baker, compiled an 8-2 record this year. Baker, sophomore quarterback, was national total offense king this season.

Villanova, winner in the Sun Bowl at El Paso, Tex., on Jan. 1, finished with a 7-2 record.

Boston Victor Without Russell

Boston's Bill Russell sat on the bench Tuesday night and the Celtics still picked up a game over second place Syracuse in the NBA Eastern division scramble.

Russell, the defensive and rebounding demon generally considered to be the key Celt, was held out of Tuesday night's contest against Detroit. He is nursing an injured ankle.

The Celts played part of the way with veteran Clyde Lovellette in the post and went the rest of the way with the type of sizzling no-pivot fast break they used to employ before Russell arrived. It paid off with a 125-115 win over Detroit.

Garden Double Bill

The game was played as part of a doublebill at Madison Square Garden. Oscar Robertson led Cincinnati past New York, 139-129, in the nightcap.

In other action, Chicago held Wilt Chamberlain to his lowest point count of the year in dumping hapless San Francisco, 115-107, and St. Louis moved into a tie with the Los Angeles Lakers in Western division action with a 120-105 win over Syracuse, now 12-5 compared to Boston's 15-5 in Eastern division play.

Lovellette played 28 minutes — his longest stint of the season — and scored 16 points. Seven Celts hit in double figures with Tom Heinsohn scoring 24. Bailey Howell had 29 for Detroit.

Joe Adcock Back With Old Boss

Rochester, N.Y.—UPI—Joe Adcock, key figure in a five-man deal, was back with his old boss, Birdie Tebbetts, today because the new Cleveland manager remembered "he never once quit on me" in Milwaukee.

Thus, in a nutshell, Tebbetts explained the "motivating factor" behind a trade in which the Indians acquired Adcock and southpaw Jack Curtis from the Braves for reliever Frank Funk, outfielder Don Dillard and player to be named later. Curtis was promptly assigned to Jacksonville of the International league.

It was Cleveland's third deal of the baseball meetings and the Detroit Tigers kept pace by making their third trade when they sent third baseman Steve Boros to the Chicago Cubs for righthanded pitcher Bob Anderson.

Tebbetts said he was "overjoyed" over the acquisition of the 35-year-old Adcock, whose 248 average with the Braves last season was his lowest in 11 years.

"Never Dogs It"

"I admire Adcock because he's one of the few ball players I have ever known who never has taken a short step," Birdie said. "He may not be the fastest runner in the world but I have never seen him dog it even once. He gives 100 per cent of himself all the time."

"He will be my first baseman, period."

Despite the decline in his average, Adcock made a respectable long-ball showing with Milwaukee this year by hitting 29 homers and driving in 78 runs in 121 games.

"I think he'll like the left-field fence in Cleveland," Tebbetts said with obvious relish.

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Wilkinson Given UPI Citation

Norman, Okla.—UPI—One day last summer, Oklahoma football Coach Bud Wilkinson surprised his army of followers by announcing that he was very optimistic about his team's chances this season.

"We have people on our squad with more ability than we've had in three or four years and I really feel our team has a chance to play well this season," he said. "I think we have a squad with a chance to improve rapidly as the season progresses."

This was certainly welcome news to dedicated Oklahoma football fans who had watched their Sooners tumble from a perennial power to obscurity within their own conference. But even they were not fully prepared for what happened.

After losing two of its first three games and looking like anything but the team that was supposed to be a national contender in another year, Oklahoma suddenly found itself. With an awesome blend of explosive offense and herculean defense, Oklahoma shocked six straight foes—shutting out four in a row—and romped untruffled to the Big Eight Conference championship and the Orange Bowl.

The man behind this amazing resurgence, capped by Saturday's 34-6 win over Nebraska, was, of course, Bud Wilkinson, the 46-year-old grey-haired genius of the gridiron named today by United Press International as college football "Coach of the Week."

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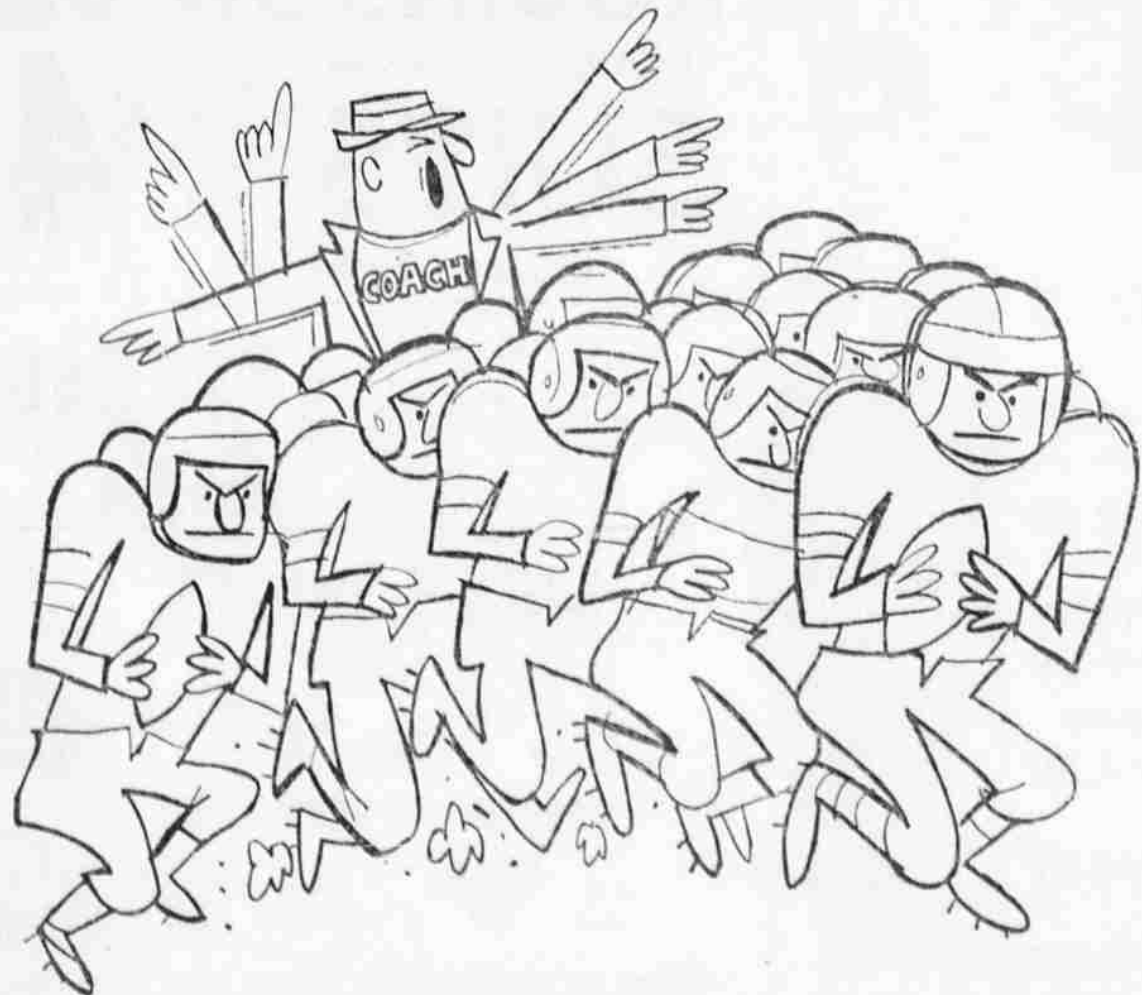
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
