

UP Pilots Could Be Tough Club

Portland — (UPI) — "We're going to be tough if our veterans can pick up where they left off last year."

Al Negretti was describing the prospects of the Portland Pilots for the upcoming basketball season. The Pilots open their schedule by playing host to San Jose State in games in Portland Friday and Saturday nights.

"I think we're capable of scoring more than last year and I know we're going to have a better bench," Negretti said. The Pilots finished with an 8-18 record last season.

The veteran Portland coach, who is heading into his eighth season, pointed out "that we'll be a bit shy on height but I'm hoping we can overcome this deficit."

Ansett Key Man

Carrying a large amount of the Pilots' hopes is 6-8 junior center Steve Ansett. "Big Steve" definitely one of the keys," Negretti said. "He's jumping higher and shooting better this year. He's just more mature."

Ansett, a rugged 210-pounder, scored 331 points in 26 games for a 12.7 average and led the team in rebounding with 284 recoveries.

Ansett figures to start in the Pilots' front line with 6-5 senior Roland Carpenter and 6-3 senior George Koch at forwards. Carpenter was out last season with a knee injury.

Opening at the guard spots probably will be 6-4 junior Jim Dorth and 6-3 junior Tom Nichols, a transfer from Diablo Valley Junior college in California.

Oregon State Tough

The personable Negretti predicted "Oregon State and Seattle look to be the two best teams in the Pacific Northwest at this point and also are two of the best teams in the nation." Portland is scheduled to meet the Beavers and the Chieftains for two games each.

"Oregon also figures to be tough," he said. Negretti said he thinks Ansett "will more than hold his own" against such star centers as Oregon State's Mel Counts and Oregon's Glenn Moore.

The Pilots' biggest losses are 6-6 forward Art Easterly, who failed to return to school for his senior year, and 5-11 guard Frank Bosone, who graduated.

Top reserves for Portland figure to be 6-4 forwards Dennis Channing, Dave Cooper and Joe Minnehan and 6-1 guard Mickey Beardon. Channing and Cooper are junior college transfers.

Tornadoes Tuning For Title Fracas

"We'll be there to play. The kids have been looking forward to it."

So declared Head Coach Fred Spiegelberg of the Medford High Black Tornado football team.

The Black Tornado goes to Portland on Friday to battle North Salem in Multnomah stadium for the Oregon Class A-1 championship. Medford bids for its third title in history and is in the final after last appearing in 1959, when it tipped Jefferson 7 to 6 for the mantle.

The Tornadoes had a "good short drill" on Monday and yesterday were on the practice field until dark despite miserable rain. Defensive preparations against the hefty Vikings were begun yesterday.

"Pray for clear weather" could be a Medford slogan. A water-soaked and muddy field, it is figured would be advantageous to the North Salem club with its greater beef than Medford's.

Scouting appraisal indicates the Vikings are not spectacular but big and powerful. "They come right at you with all that weight," Spiegelberg has been informed.

Against Medford, however, the Vikings will face the best prep defense in the state. Only three touchdowns have been scored against Black Tornado defense and no adversary has tallied more than one. The first seven foes went scoreless. No. 1 ranked Medford will carry a 10-game undefeated record into the contest. North Salem has a less impressive 8-3 but its losses all were in non-league games.

Viking defense, with more heft up front than its offense, will be faced with a Tornado offense which in important games showed that championship ability to get touchdowns when they were needed. North has held five rivals without a score, including its two playoff opponents but has given up as many as four TDs in a game.

University of Oregon, Eugene — Coach Steve Belko, looking for improved defense, better speed and more scoring balance from his 1962-63 squad, sends Oregon against Brigham Young Friday and Saturday at McArthur Court in the initial hoop action of the season for the Ducks.

Belko is frankly optimistic regarding the upcoming campaign, despite the loss of his scoring Charlie Warren, Bill Simmons and captain Wally Knecht through graduation.

A big reason for Belko's cheerful outlook is 6-7 senior center Glenn Moore, out of school last season. Moore not only gives the Webfoots a definite scoring threat in the post, but is also one of the area's best defensive performers.

His probable starting mates on the front line for the BYU series are 8-4 junior Jerry Anderson and 6-5 junior Steve Jones, who was used as a first unit guard last winter.

Guards Unsettled
The guard situation is still unsettled with veterans John Mack and Tom Tuttle and sophomores Elliott Gleason, Bob Yates and Pat Loy all in the running for starting assignments.

BYU brings an experienced squad to Eugene for the two-game series. The Cougars appear to be particularly strong at forward with letterman Bruce Burton, (6-4), Bob Skousen, (6-4), and Jim Kelson, (6-3) and with 6-4 sophomore Bob Quinney, former Medford high all-stater, adding to the depth and ability.

Central Point — Quickness was a trade mark of the Crater High school Comets in basketball last season. It will be the same this year.

Coach Lloyd Hoffine described his crew as "awfully small, but real quick." He pointed out that the bigger players among his top prospects are not heavy. "We'll try to utilize our quickness," he said.

There are three two-year lettermen on the Crater squad. They are Mike Glines, Lou Alvarez and Pat Pepper, a talented back court trio. The one-year lettermen are Paul Branson, Willie Jones and Darryl Summerfield. Branson is the lone 6-footer among the vets.

Others on Varsity
Others on the squad include Howard Tomlinson, who played some varsity along with jayvee ball; Neil Ribenburg, Mike Gardner and Bob Turner, from the jayvee team; Bob Stroh, who played sophomore ball, and Tom Crawford, a transfer from Bonanza.

Crawford is 6-2 and Tomlinson and Stroh each 6-1. Crawford, a 225-pounder, has displayed some shooting ability but lacks experience. If he comes along, he could supply some needed bulk.

A problem plaguing the Comets now is injuries. Alvarez was hospitalized over the week end and was in traction because of a sprained back. He reportedly aggravated an old injury in practice and his duty may be limited during the pre-conference slate.

Arm Getting Better
Summerfield suffered a dislocated arm in the football game with Medford. The arm is getting better but he reportedly still can't straighten it and his shooting is affected. Tomlinson pulled ankle ligaments in practice on Friday, an injury which put him on crutches.

Crater will open its season on Friday, Dec. 7, at Eagle

Point and will go to Mt. Shasta, Calif., on the following night. On Dec. 14 the Comets go to Cottage Grove. They entertain Mt. Shasta on Dec. 15, against Ashland on Jan. 5.

Lebanon will be guest of the Comets on Dec. 21 and 22. Southern Oregon conference play opens at home against Ashland on Jan. 5.

Highlighting Crater's 1961-1962 season were two victories over Medford, first in basketball for the Comets over the Tornado.
