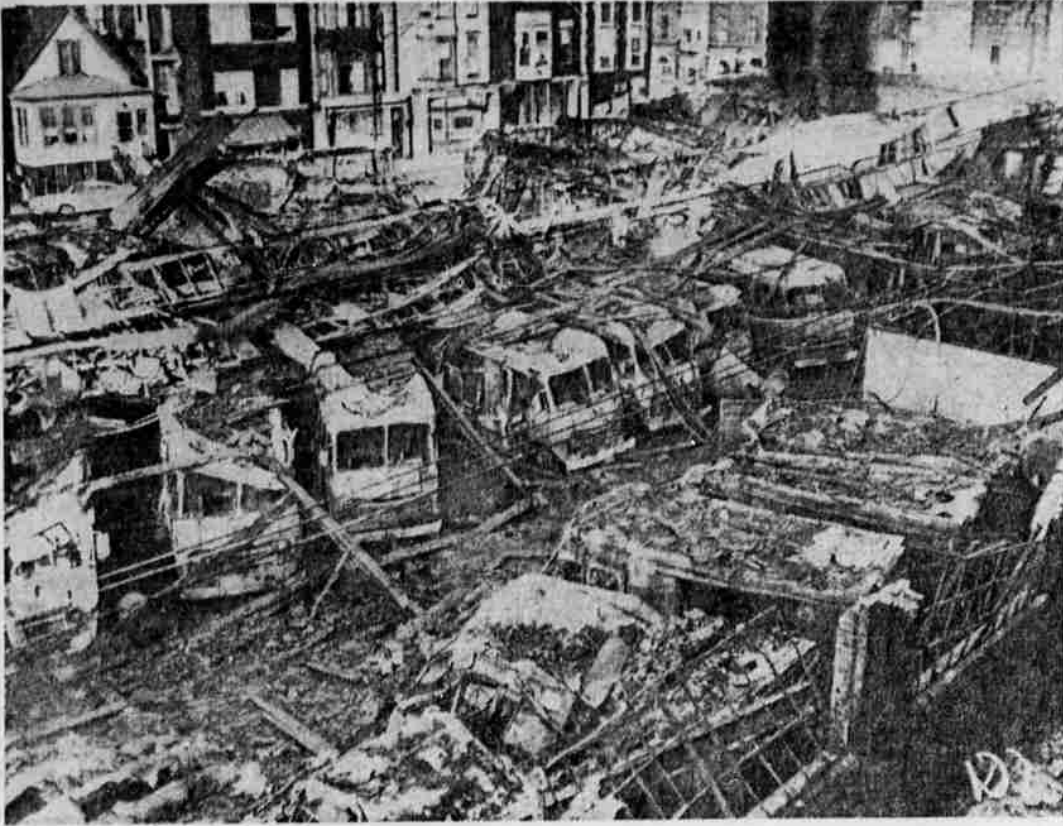

Multnomah Readies Food Stamp Plan

Portland — (UPI) — Multnomah county stops distributing surplus food Friday afternoon and opens its doors for food stamp distribution Monday morning.

The federal food stamps, ranging in denominations from 50 cents to \$20, will be sold at less than face value to the needy. They will purchase food at face value at local grocery stores. The government will pay the difference.

Doug Yeater, supervisor of the program, said some \$672,000 worth of stamps, about a 60-day supply, were delivered to Multnomah county this week.

He said surplus foods remaining from the old program will be transferred to the surplus food program in Clackamas county.

Short in Transformer Ignites Capital Ceiling

Salem — (UPI) — A fluorescent light fixture transformer apparently shorted out about 2:15 p.m. Tuesday and set fire to several ceiling tiles in a storeroom in the basement of the capitol building here.

Alex Peterson Talks at Rotary Club Luncheon

Alex Peterson, physical education instructor at Southern Oregon college, urged men engaged in business and professional life to make a conscientious effort to keep physically fit in an address here Tuesday.

Speaking at a luncheon meeting of the Medford Rotary club at the Rogue Valley Country club, the Ashland educator stressed the need to keep in shape to meet the

stresses and tensions of life today. He warned against an immediate strenuous program of exercises, however, without first checking with the family doctor.

Tests have shown that executives make wiser judgments when not fatigued, Peterson said. Efficiency and physical fitness go hand-in-hand. The heart is a muscle, he said, and can be strengthened with exercise just as the circulatory system can be improved.

To become really helpful physical exercise, whether it be simply walking or swimming and tennis, must be regular with a moderate beginning and gradual acceleration.

Ben Jensen, physical education instructor for Medford's YMCA also stressed the need for regular exercise keyed to the age and condition.

Former Medford football stars were guests of honor to Tuesday's Rotary meeting, including Carl von der Hellen, who played in 1897, Claude Miles, all around football, baseball and basketball ace of the era just following the turn of the century, Cliff Moore, Virgil Swanson and Jack Walker.

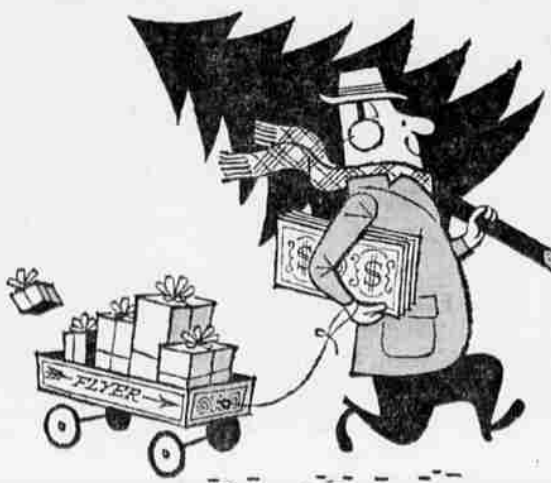
