

Russia Renews Call for Peace

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Pakistan, India Reported Ready To Air Long-Standing Troubles

Anglo-American Mediation Effort Said Responsible

Meeting Planned at 'Ministerial Level'

Rawalpindi, Pakistan — (UPI)—Pakistan and India were reported today to announce plans for direct talks aimed at settling their bitter dispute over Kashmir and other issues in the face of Communist Chinese aggression.

Informed sources said simultaneous announcements were expected in Rawalpindi and New Delhi that Pakistan President Mohammed Ayub Khan and Indian Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru had agreed to try to settle the differences between their two countries by direct talks.

Reliable sources in New Delhi said Ayub and Nehru will meet at "an early date." The unexpected move by the old enemies was the result of Anglo-American mediation, the sources said.

The sources added that there will be an early meeting at the "ministerial level" to iron out major issues before the date is set for the Ayub-Nehru meeting.

The reports came as "Yankee go home" slogans appeared on the walls of the National Assembly building as American Envoy W. Averell Harriman conferred with Ayub in talks described by American officials as "crucial."

One member of the National Assembly said the signs indicate the general anti-Western attitude of the Pakistani people over Western arms aid to India in its border war with Red China.

However, Harriman and Ayub talked for 2 1/2 hours this afternoon and scheduled a second session in the evening, amid reports that Pakistan may agree to direct talks with India for settlement of the Kashmir issue that has divided them in a bitter dispute for 15 years.

Preliminary Plan For Hawthorne Being Prepared

A preliminary plan for the redevelopment of Hawthorne park will be available for review in about six weeks, Director Robert Hawthorne told the Medford park and recreation commission last night.

The city council, Nov. 15 voted to appropriate \$18,500 for the restoration of the park, which was damaged by the loss of 4.4 acres to the freeway right-of-way.

Hawthorne said that some work is already under way at the 10-acre park. The parking lot adjacent to East Main St. has been restored and some landscaping is being done along the banks of Bear creek under the freeway viaduct.

No Progress Reported

No progress was reported on the commission's recommendation to the city council that \$7,500 be expended to obtain a master plan from a professional firm for the development of the newly-acquired Barnett park site.

At its last meeting the council voted to accept the commission's recommendation, but to take no action on it pending a joint meeting of the two groups to discuss the matter further. The meeting has not yet been scheduled.

At the suggestion of one of the commission members, temporary commission Chairman James Sullivan was instructed to take what steps he could to bring about an early meeting of the group with the council.

Hawthorne reported to the commission that work on the basic development of Jackson park is about half completed, and that about \$4,500 of the \$8,000 appropriated for the project has been expended.

Satisfied With Progress

The director said he was "satisfied" with the progress that has been made to this time. "The tough, slow work has been completed," he said, "and we should be able to finish the project in about eight weeks next spring, assuming favorable weather."

Hawthorne reviewed the activities of the department during October and reported that about 3,000 youngsters more than last year had participated in the Bicycle Safety Roadshow, and that about 700 more teenagers than last year had attended the Youth Honor Day dance at the Medford Armory on Halloween.

Applegate Stockmen Discuss Reduction Of Range Allotment

Applegate — A group of Applegate stockmen indicated last night they would take their range reduction problems all the way to Washington, D. C., if necessary.

Martin Grier, Applegate Stockmen's association president, urged all beef ranchers present to read their proposals from the forest service, make any revisions they feel necessary, then send range allotment representatives to a committee meeting. The cattleman would then attempt to reach a basic agreement with the forest service.

Leroy Offenbacher, president of the Jackson County Stockmen's association, said none of the proposed allotment reductions has received final approval by the forest service, but feels if ranchers do not fight the proposed cuts now, it will be too late.

Serious Economic Problem

State Sen. Lynn Newbury, State Rep. Ed Branchfield and James Redden, agreed that the ranchers are faced with a serious economic problem, Newbury urged ranchers to appeal through Congressmen-elect Robert Duncan and Sens. Wayne Morse and Maurice Neuberger.

Applegate area Forest Ranger Neil Suttell urged ranchers to wait until the range development and allotment reduction plans are approved, then to appeal them through channels, to Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman, if necessary.

Ranchers generally argued that allotment cuts are not needed since their cattle cannot come off the range fast, it is unfair to charge cattlemen for a share of range improvement work yet drastically reduce use at the same time, present range analysis systems are questionable, and proposed fencing for grazing control is not practical.

Allotment Cuts Made

Ed Findley, Applegate rancher, argued that allotment cuts had been made every year since 1907, when he first ran cattle on the Applegate range.

Bruce Myrick, a newcomer to the area, blasted forest service policy, and demanded a statement of policy from the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Duncan Appoints Representatives To Fiscal Group

Outgoing House Speaker Robert B. Duncan, (D-Medford) today appointed 15 representatives to a special Senate-House committee on fiscal matters.

The committee, to which 10 state senators were appointed earlier by Senate President Harry Belvin (D-Klamath Falls), will meet here Dec. 17-19 for the pre-legislative fiscal conference.

Duncan's appointees include State Reps. Clarence Barton (D-Coquille), the 1963 speaker-designate; Stafford Hansell (R-Hermiston), Ross Morgan (D-Gresham), Mrs. Katherine M. Smith (D-The Dalles), F. West Berlin Issue Revived In Formal Notes

Specific Proposals, Time Limit Lacking

Moscow — (UPI) — The Soviet Union formally called today for a German peace settlement for the first time since the Cuban crisis in moderately worded notes to the United States, Britain and France.

The identical notes asked for "normalization of the situation in West Berlin," but contained neither a time limit or any specific proposals. The contents were distributed by the official Soviet news agency Tass and broadcast by Moscow Radio.

Trial Protested

Russia primarily protested the federal trial in West Berlin of the West German Association of Victims of the Nazi Regime, which is charged with being a Communist-front organization.

The note accused West Germany of evoking a situation which "contains a threat to peace in Europe" by violating the four-power Berlin treaty.

"Everything happening in West Berlin clearly shows how urgent has become the need for a German peace settlement and the normalization of the West Berlin situation on that basis," the note said.

Reference to a German settlement confirmed Western diplomatic opinion here that Premier Nikita Khrushchev had not forgotten the German problem in the heat of the Cuban crisis.

Secondary Issue

Western diplomats believe Khrushchev intended to raise the German question again despite an apparent go-slow policy for the moment.

Western observers noted the Soviet Foreign Ministry used a secondary issue as a vehicle for renewing its peace call.

The note said, "The trial which has been planned in West Berlin shows that the occupation forces of the Western powers are becoming in fact participants in the persecution of those who fought against Hitlerite Fascism."

Probation Terms Modified by Order

Circuit Court Judge James M. Main has signed an order modifying the terms and conditions of the probation of Mrs. Ann Todd, Eagle Point, who was found guilty of disturbing a public meeting of the Eagle Point Irrigation district.

The order, signed Nov. 27, was filed Wednesday afternoon. It modifies the defendant's probation so as to permit her to enter the Eagle Point Irrigation district office and to inspect and copy certain records, maps, files, statements and other documentary matter. The matter to which she will have access is detailed in ten items included in the order.

Mrs. Todd was placed on probation March 27, 1962, following a circuit court trial.

Symposium Opens Meeting of State Reclamationists

The Oregon Reclamation Congress prepared for a busy schedule today bearing on the theme "Reclamation and Recreation."

A symposium on "Oregon's Water Resource" was held this morning. State Engineer Chris Wheeler spoke on the water master situation in Oregon, Jack Seeva, ground water geologist, on status of ground water in Oregon, and Don Lane, executive secretary of the state water resources board on Oregon Water resources board activities.

Harold T. Nelson, regional director of the bureau of reclamation, Boise, Ida., was scheduled to speak on recreation on reclamation projects.

Resolution Studied

During committee sessions yesterday, delegates studied resolutions to present to the congress. Resolutions ranged from public relations to research and agriculture.

The Rogue River Valley Irrigation district is recommending in a resolution that the new state legislature be asked to make a thorough study of state drainage problems. Industrial and residential development in more populated Oregon counties "has resulted in material changes in the run-off pattern of small natural drainages in said areas," the resolution stated. Expanding developments will compound the problem, it was noted.

Following considerable discussion, the public relations committee recommended that promotion of better understanding of irrigation and reclamation projects be done through local news media.

Makes Recommendation

The committee also recommended that a representative of an irrigation district be on local recreation commissions so recreationists can be better understood reservoir operations, particularly regarding draw-down.

Jack Hoffbuhr, congress vice president and Medford Irrigation district manager, recommended signs be posted in reservoir areas informing the public that the farmer has financed the reservoir development.

The committee also proposed school tours of reclamation projects similar to the present forestry tours.

Physical Education Group's Convention Opens Here Tonight

The Oregon Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation will open its 45th annual convention here tonight.

The convalesce will begin at 7 o'clock tonight with an administrative and supervisors section. It will continue through Saturday night, concluding with a banquet and dance at Rogue Valley Country club.

About 250 men and women are expected for the sectional and general sessions. Membership is made up of physical education instructors, supervisors and administrators in high schools and colleges, of nurses and of persons associated with health and recreation organizations and agencies.

Sessions will be at the Hotel Medford, which is convention headquarters, and at Medford High school.

Featured Speakers

Dr. Robert Livingston, of Oregon College of Education, and Dr. L. J. Krakauer, of the Corvallis Clinic, will be featured speakers. Livingston will address the first general session at 8 p.m. Friday at the high school. His subject is "Correcting Our Trajectory."

Krakauer will speak at 7 p.m. Saturday banquet which also will be the second

general session of the conference. His talk will concern "The Heart, Exercise, and Diet—1962."

Clair V. Langston, Oregon State university physical education director, will address a Friday noon luncheon of Phi Epsilon Kappa, at the Medford hotel. National President William P. Rhoda is expected to attend.

Executive council meetings are scheduled Friday morning and Saturday afternoon. The association luncheon and business meeting is scheduled Saturday noon at the high school cafeteria. Election of officers is set for that time.

Friday sections are administrators, supervisors, college section; research; health education; special dance and a Peace Corps, all at the high school. Health movies showing is set at 5 p.m. and at 6 p.m. the division of girls' and women's sports will have a dinner at the Rogue room.

Saturday sections are student, in the Rogue room, and health education; physical education; recreation; elementary school PE and girls' and women's sports, and secondary school PE, all at the high school.

Health education exhibits are scheduled at 10:15 a.m. Saturday in the high school auditorium lobby. OAPHER district meetings will be held Saturday morning.
