

DA's to Support Three Bills On Traffic Safety

Portland — (UPI) — The Oregon District Attorneys association has gone on record in favor of two of three bills in Gov. Mark Hatfield's highway safety program.

The district attorneys, meeting here Friday, took no action on a maximum speed law, the third item of legislation asked by the governor.

They will support the so-called "probable cause" bill which would allow a police officer to make arrests at the scene of an accident without actually witnessing the accident and the "implied consent" bill, which assumes that Oregon drivers give their consent to taking a test for alcohol in the blood stream when they accept their state drivers licenses.

Courtney Johns of Linn county was elected president of the association. He succeeds Francis Linklater of Washington county, who was made a director.

Dick Courson of Umatilla county was elected vice president. Hattie Kremen of Marion county was elected secretary-treasurer. Other directors include Jesse Himmelsbach of Baker county and Avery Thompson of Douglas county.

Neuberger Backs Rights of Consumer

Corvallis — (UPI) — Sen. Maurice Neuberger (D-Ore.) called Saturday for an end to hidden credit charges, concealing packaging of goods, and drug monopolies.

He said these represented abuses of the consumer, "the only important group in the economy who are not effectively organized."

"Hidden high finance charges on easy credit spell trouble for millions of American families buying on time with installment payments," he said.

"Just as consumers have the right to know what is in their credit contract," Mrs. Neuberger said, "so also they have the right to know what is in the package they buy."

She said often purchasers are unable to tell from a package the amount or content of the product.

The Oregon Democrat said drug patent monopolies let the drug industry "charge high prices and take enormous profits from a captive consumer public."

She spoke to the Corvallis branch of the American Association of University Women.

Ecumenical Council Takes Unity Steps

Vatican City — (UPI) — The Ecumenical Council Saturday voted overwhelmingly to approve a draft calling for "theological, liturgical, juridical, psychological and practical" steps to narrow the gap between Roman Catholicism and the Eastern churches.

The important vote was the council's first concrete action towards Pope John XXIII's long-range goal — unification of all the Christian churches.

Earlier in the day's session, the applauding council fathers were informed that the Pope, suffering from gastric trouble and anemia, had shown a "good improvement" and hoped to give his regular Sunday blessing from the window of his study.

Elderly Urged To Attend Hearings

Washington — (UPI) — Sen. Harrison A. Williams Jr. (D-N.J.) said Saturday his committee will tour the neighborhoods of Portland in a new effort to hear from the elderly in hearing there Monday.

Williams heads the Subcommittee on Involuntary Relocation of the Elderly. It is trying to find out, through a series of hearings in the nation, the effects on older people when they are moved from their homes by highway construction, urban renewal and other public programs.

The committee also will hold regular morning and afternoon sessions to hear witnesses at the Sheraton Portland hotel.

Truck Tips Over in Highway 62 Accident

State police reported a one-vehicle accident Friday on Highway 62 three miles from Medford. No injuries were reported.

David Wesley Moore, 24, of 712 Crater Lake ave., Medford, was driving the truck owned by Farmers Packing company south on the highway when it went onto the shoulder. He attempted to get it back on the highway, but it turned over, police said.

Jeannace Freeman Returns to Prison; Execution Date Set

Salem — (UPI) — Twenty-one-year-old child slayer Jeannace June Freeman returned to the state prison here about 3:25 p.m. Friday.

Warden Clarence T. Gladson said that nothing happened during the return trip from Madras where her execution date was reset for Jan. 29.

During the return she passed by the canyon over which she is convicted of throwing Larry Jackson, 6.

"She made no comment as she passed the spot," Gladson said. He added Miss Freeman has been by the area several times since her arrest, and has made no special comment on any of these times.

She was returned to her detention cell in the women's prison here, the warden said.

If sent to the gas chamber, Miss Freeman would become the first woman executed in Oregon history.

Her original Dec. 6 execution date was postponed to allow her attorneys time for an appeal to the U. S. Supreme Court.

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Barton Favors Cigarette Tax, Broad Tax Base

Salem — (UPI) — State Rep. Clarence Barton (D-Coquille), speaker-designate of the House, told United Press International Saturday he favored a tax on cigarettes and a broadening of the income tax base.

Both were recommended Saturday by Gov. Mark Hatfield when he revealed his \$405.3 million budget request for the 1963-65 biennium.

Barton said "I was chairman of the Interim Tax committee that recommended these very things to the 1961 Legislative assembly."

"As to the amount, I've no quarrel with the four cent cigarette tax — I've repeatedly urged it. I think Oregon can no longer afford to be the only state out of 50 that has no tax on tobacco."

"However, I'll reserve comment on the income tax until I have a chance to review the budget. The philosophy of a net receipts tax was approved by a tax committee of which I was chairman."

I want to study the amount to be raised.

"I'm glad the governor recognizes the validity of our interim tax committee. I hope the legislature will do likewise," Barton said.

New Land Promotion Regulations Urged

Portland — (UPI) — Oregon Real Estate Commissioner Robert Jensen said here Friday Oregon needs new laws to curb deceiving land promotion and sales.

Jensen spoke to some 150 realtors.

The commissioner said there have been an increased number of "questionable" land deals in Oregon during the past year or two.

He said regulatory laws are needed to assure honest advertising and sales. He said the Real Estate Commission is drafting a subdivision law.

Jensen told the realtors they should do what they can to stop fraudulent promotion. He said a deceiving land scheme casts aspersions on the entire profession.

Pendleton — (UPI) — The Oregon Welfare Commission Friday was asked to provide an investigator to look into fraudulent welfare claims in Malheur County.

The request was made at the commission's monthly meeting here. Umatilla County asked the commission to provide its funds for an investigation of fraudulent claims. The county has been conducting the investigation.

Also at the meeting, complaints concerning the salaries of welfare workers were aired.

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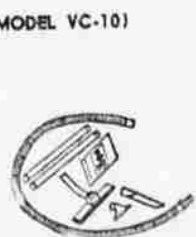
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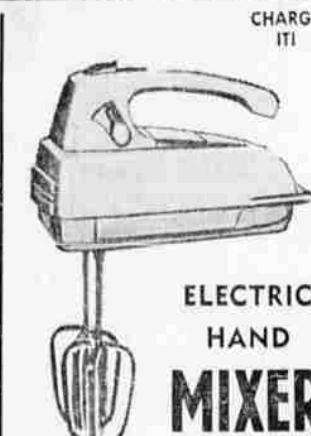
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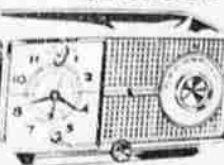


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
