

Elderly People Tell Troubles in Relocating

Portland — **EPI** — Elderly people with no place to go told a Senate subcommittee Monday the troubles they face when they are forced from their homes to make way for urban renewal and highway projects.

And a senator and a mayor rebuked the Oregon Highway Department for failing to do all it can to make relocation easier for the displaced.

Forced relocation of the elderly was the subject of a day-long hearing by a subcommittee of the Special Senate Committee on Aging. In between hearing sessions, the committee, headed by Sen. Harrison A. Williams (D-N.J.), visited Portland neighborhoods where older people are being moved from their homes.

Hotel Visited

One of the tours took the committee to the Carlton Hotel where 140 elderly men and women live on state allowances of \$101 per month. The hotel will be razed to make room for the Foothills Freeway.

Manager Palma Whitney told the committee lease prices are so high she has been unable to find another hotel where she can operate her low-rate boarding plan for her tenants.

"These people will have no place to go," she said. "It would be a shame to move these people back into sub-standard housing when the hotel is razed."

Lacks Money

Older people also spoke at the hearing sessions. One 74-year-old woman said she has supported herself by cooking Jewish foods for clients in her neighborhood. She said moving from the neighborhood will end the work.

Another, who moved once before for urban renewal, said she lacks the money to move again to make way for the freeway.

Both Sen. Williams and Portland Mayor Terry Schrunk were critical of the Oregon Highway Department. Schrunk called its relocation services minimal.

Williams said the department was failing to pay moving expenses, as already allowed under existing law. He suggested legislation to make payment of moving allowances mandatory. He said the department also should provide a better relocation service — one that would seek to solve individual problems of the elderly as well as provide lists of available real estate.

'Liberalizing' Changes Told In Expense Account Reporting

Washington — **EPI** — Internal Revenue Commissioner Mortimer B. Caplin today bowed to business protests and announced some "liberalizing" changes in the government's new proposals for preventing expense account tax abuses.

The new rules, drafted under the 1962 tax law, take effect Jan. 1. Caplin revealed the modifications in opening a two-day public hearing on the rules.

As a result of objections, Caplin said, the rules will require less detail on expenses claimed as deductions on tax returns. For example, a salesman will not have to list separately such miscellaneous outlays as taxi fares, local telephone calls, gasoline for his car and parking fees.

ROYAL HOUSEWIVES GO GIFT SHOPPING

Queen Elizabeth II did her annual Christmas shopping for the family in the toy, linen and book departments of a leading store while Princess Muna, English-born wife of Jordan's King Hussein, visited a sewing center called the "Needlewoman Shop". She bought \$2.50 worth of yarn and a needle-case inscribed, "A stitch in time saves nine."

NEW AGRICULTURE MINISTER NAMED IN PERU

Lima, Peru — **EPI** — Air Force Col. Alfonso Teran Brambila has been appointed to the post of agriculture minister in Peru's military Junta government in place of Air Force Maj. Jesus Melgar, who was killed in last week's Brazilian airliner crash south of here.

FRANCO APPEARS UNDISTURBED BY BOMBINGS

Madrid — **EPI** — Spain's durable Generalissimo Francisco Franco turned 70 today apparently unmoved by a new series of bombings which the press has blamed on Communists.

The bombings started Sunday when an explosion rocked the military governor's headquarters in San Sebastian. Monday two more bombs blasted government buildings in Valencia and a bomb was exploded at the administrative court building in Madrid.

Full-Scale Rally Noted at Opening Of Stock Market

New York — **EPI** — Stocks began a full-scale rally today. The first blue chip to show a point gain was U.S. Steel. Nearly all the other heavyweights in the industrial average went ahead fractionally.

Electronics and specialties were prominent in the plus column, such issues as Polaroid, Xerox, Fairchild Camera, Litton, Texas Instruments and others trading up from 2 to 3 points. IBM jumped more than 6.

Other strong spots in the list were Aldens, Anken Chemical, Delta Airlines, Douglas, Owens Corning, Grace and Lecoma. National General and Ampex rose fractions.

Republicans Loading Up For Intraparty Struggle

Chicago — **EPI** — Republican leaders, wasting no time in mapping strategy for the 1964 election campaign, are loading their weapons for what may be the most bitter intraparty power struggle since 1952 when GOP members were forced to choose sides between Dwight D. Eisenhower and Robert Taft.

From a Republican view, last month's election was widely interpreted as a clear-cut victory for the liberal wing of the party with candidates like Nelson A. Rockefeller, George Romney and William Scranton emerging in control of key governorships.

Tabbed as Front Runner

Rockefeller, in fact, has been tabbed by many as the front runner for the 1964 GOP presidential nomination.

But if there were any notions that Republican conservatives were ready to accept Rockefeller as the man to challenge President Kennedy, they probably were dispelled by events which took place here this past week end.

A determined group of conservative Republicans from all parts of the country, but with a notably strong concentration from the South, gathered at a motel here Sunday to draft plans for a "Goldwater for president" drive.

The strategy session, attended by about 40 persons, was held in secrecy. Word of it leaked out Monday.

Conservative Voice

The general purpose of the meeting was to prepare and organize a strong conservative voice in the party that would speak with power at the 1964 Republican National convention.

Specifically discussed were possible ways of blocking Rockefeller's bid for the nomination and gaining the candidacy for Sen. Barry Goldwater (R-Ariz.).

If Goldwater and the New York governor actively oppose each other for the nomination, it would touch off the most direct clash between liberals and conservatives in the Republican party since the 1952 pre-convention battle between Eisenhower and late Ohio Sen. Taft, which cut deep wounds into the party that were slow to heal.

Goldwater, reached Monday night at his home in Phoenix, said he knew nothing of the Chicago meeting.

"I just got back from Grand Canyon," he told newsmen. "I don't know who they are or what it is." He declined any further comment.

Republican National Committee Chairman William E. Miller also refused to comment.

But Charles Barr, a Cook County, Ill., Republican leader who attended the closed door session, called it "A meeting where you let your hair down and talked candidly about the candidates and the issues that might be affecting the 1964 race."

Barr said five possible presidential candidates were discussed and that it "was generally concluded the strongest candidate if he were available would be Goldwater."
