

Wet Brakes Blamed For Two Accidents

Resolutions Adopted By Izaak Walton League at Meeting

C. J. (Jack) Hanel, Medford, was elected regional vice president, at the state convention of the Izaak Walton League of America recently in Eugene.

Appointed to the state division executive committee by Allan L. Kelly, Portland, president, was Col. Paul Weiland, Medford.

During the convention 15 resolutions were adopted. Among those of interest to valley residents are:

1) Provides for a consultant of conservation and outdoor education on the staff of the state department of education under the direction of the state superintendent of public instruction;

2) Funds accruing from boat licenses and unclaimed marine fuel taxes be distributed to local counties on population rather than on boat registration, be used for enforcement of boating laws and enhancement of water oriented recreational areas, and make unclaimed marine fuel taxes available for water-oriented recreation uses;

7) Enactment of a bill which would provide the principles of the federal coordination act to federal highway construction to conserve fish runs and big game migration routes;

8) Enactment of legislation amending present laws dealing with pollution and sedimentation of streams by mining operations;

9) Supports and sponsors legislation which will provide realistic adjustments of hunting and fishing licenses and tag fees to finance the continuance and necessary expansion of the state's fish and game management programs;

12) Favors restricting commercial fishing for salmon and steelhead to the ocean; and

14) Opposes recommendation of legislative interim committee on natural resources which would increase the fish commission by two members which would be appointed from the membership of the state game commission, and that the new five-member commission would take over the research management and regulation of the salmon resource of the state.

Resolution number 9 is similar to a resolution adopted by the Oregon Wildlife Federation.

The other resolutions concern the expansion of the national park system; recommending hunting and fishing game tags to armed forces personnel, at same fees as Oregon residents; commendation of the U.S. Forest service road and logging practices; channel straightening; legislative education; hunting on national parks; the endorsement of proposed legislation of the Oregon state board of forestry relating to forest fire protection.

Relay Satellite May Expand on Feat of Telstar

Cape Canaveral, Fla. —UPI—A small, eight-sided space machine may make it possible for Europe and North and South America to exchange Christmas greetings via "live" television this year.

The machine is a 168-pound communications satellite named Relay. The United States will try to put it into orbit soon, possibly around Dec. 11 or 12.

Relay is a satellite of the same scientific breed as Telstar, the famed moonlet which thrilled the world last year by relaying television programs and telephone conversations instantaneously between Europe and North America.

With Relay, the "space network" will be expanded to include South America for the first time.

The satellite, as its name would indicate, is expected to serve as an electronic relay station in space to pick up radio and television signals from one ground station and transmit them to another thousands of miles away.

This is the same sort of system used by the drum-shaped Telstar which was launched July 10. Telstar now is dead, partially as a result of damage to its vital solar cells caused accidentally by a manmade belt of radiation created by a U.S. nuclear test last summer.

To Use Delta Rocket — The United States will try to put Relay into orbit from Cape Canaveral aboard a Delta rocket which has run up a string of 12 successes over a two-year period.

If all goes well, Relay satellite will make one swing around earth every 163 minutes, at altitudes ranging from about 800 miles to 3,500 miles. This is quite close to the orbit traveled by Telstar.

Money Reported Taken From Local Apartment — The manager of a Medford apartment court has reported to city police that \$323.20 — the month's receipts from the apartments — has been stolen from his home.

Roy Dean Shepherd, 315 Dakota ave., told investigating officers he had the receipts in a metal box in his bedroom. He first missed the money when a tenant came in Sunday, Nov. 2, to pay his rent. Shepherd said.
