Applegate Bridges Withstand Flood

Applegate Valley - All of the five low water bridges over the Applegate withstood the flooding river Sunday with damage only to approaches, according to the owners.

As the water receded, some of the bridges had small trees lodged on them. A 13-foot rise in the river level was reported at Copper.

"Enough driftwood went over my bridge to supply me with wood for the rest of my life," said W. E. Foster, owner of the bridge near Copper.

The other four bridges are located below Ruch. Several planks were removed from the bridge at the LeRoy Offenhauer ranch.

These five bridges are especially constructed to withstand floods. The bridges are built at a particular slant so that as the water strikes them it creates a vacuum which in turn strengthens the structures and keeps them from being washed out.

Albuquerque Once Train Stop Today Is Nuclear Arsenal

Albuquerque, N. M. - (UPI) - Twenty years ago Albuquerque was a train stop for coast-to-coast travelers where they could buy Indian souvenirs. Today it is the nuclear arsenal of the free world.

In 1940, Albuquerque's population was 34,550. Its atmosphere was little changed from the days when it was a Spanish village which stood where El Camino Real (the king's road) crossed the Rio Grande in the mid-18th century.

Today, 35,000 scientists and technicians work on problems of nuclear fission and rocketry in secret laboratories and military bases scattered around the city - which has grown to a population of 284,000.

Visitors still can ride back into the 18th century on a summer night. A slow-moving horse-drawn yellow carriage past open-windowed cafes where strolling troubadours sing native Mexican folk songs, along the open plaza where Indians dance ancient ritual and beside 250-year-old San Felipe de Neri Church, whose thick adobe walls provided shelter for early settlers during Indian wars.

Indians still meet incoming trains with dyed corn and melon seed necklace and small shops line old town plaza, offering hand-made silver, turquoise, copper and leather goods.

Operations Offices

But only a few miles away are the Albuquerque operations offices of the atomic energy commission. On an annual budget of almost \$500 million the office runs 12 primary laboratories and test sites in nine states - including all field tests under development, the program to develop peaceful uses for nuclear energy.

Sandia Corporation, an Albuquerque-based primary development contractor managed by the Bell Telephone System, employs 8,000 persons in two plants that produce and store most of the nation's nuclear arms.

ACF Industries' Albuquerque division runs development, production and storage tests on advanced nuclear weapons. The \$20 million Albuquerque center is a major supporter of Rover, the nuclear powered space vehicle project at the Los Alamos, N. M., scientific laboratory.

The Air Force special weapons center at Kirtland Air Force Base is the site of the new nuclear effects laboratory. The lab will simulate

nuclear explosions on protecting our missile site from enemy attacks, protection of our nuclear warheads from anti-missile weapons and the amount of shielding an astronaut will need if his vehicle is powered by a nuclear unit.

Lovelace Medical Foundation is a major center of experiments in radiation research and therapy. The astronauts took their qualifying physical examinations at Lovelace clinic.

Was Center

Seven years ago the sleepy city of Albuquerque was the marketing, business and social center of New Mexico. It had its start when the Spanish duke of Albuquerque financed the building of a church on the Rio Grande in 1706.

Mexicans and friendly Indians settled in the valley around the church. The settlement took the duke's name - Albuquerque.

The flat plains to the east, across the Sandia and Manzanilla mountains, were divided into huge cattle ranches. Sheep and cattle ranches grew in the broken hills and mountains to the north and west.

The railroad made Albuquerque the shipping point for cattle and wool and the receiving station for manufactured goods. By 1945, the population had grown to 49,000.

In July, 1945, the quiet was broken over the vast desert of white sands, 75 miles south of Albuquerque, when the United States exploded its first nuclear device.

Los Alamos scientific laboratories, 65 miles north of Albuquerque, produced the first crude atomic bomb. The bombs for the atomic attack on Japan were from Los Alamos.

"Tiny Tim" In September, 1945, "Tiny Tim," a highly modified model of the WAC corporal rocket, was fired at White Sands missile range. At the end of World War II, German missiles and missile men were moved to White Sands to push the U.S. program. The leader of the German group was Werner von Braun, who now is in charge of the Saturn moon rocket program.

Today, Los Alamos concentrates on Rover, the nuclear-powered space vehicle. Nuclear weapons are planned and designed there.

White Sands is testing the power systems for project Apollo, America's manned

flight to the moon. In February a West German missile battalion will test fire an Army sergeant missile on the testing grounds.

Rocketry and nuclear science were wedded in Albuquerque.

The federal government has become the primary employer in the city's work force of 91,000. There are 114 federal government units located in the city.

The city's population has increased almost 600 per cent in 17 years.

Albuquerque outgrew the Rio Grande valley and now spreads across rising hills toward 10,678-foot Sandia crest.

Adobe still is a popular building material in the surging suburbs, but it is being molded into \$20,000 to \$25,000 homes for thousands of highly skilled, well paid young engineers. The homes are surrounded by spreading lawns and neat gardens, well kept by the \$1 an hour labor of a staid Indian brave whose straight black hair is pulled back by a painted head band.

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Final Showing of 'Question 7' Is Planned Tonight

Christianity's fight for life in East Germany - the story of a father and son.

This is "Question 7," the motion picture produced by the same company that filmed "Martin Luther." The Lutheran sponsored movie is being shown in Ashland at the Varsity theater. It will have its second and last showing this evening at 8:30 o'clock.

In a town in East Germany a new pastor arrives to replace a pastor who had been sentenced to five years of hard labor. Petty harassments are started immediately by the East German officials.

The small congregation survives - but it is of older persons. What about the next generation?

This is where the East German officials - in school and out - put the most pressure. The pastor's 15-year-old son is who the authorities attack to reach his father.

The boy, who desires to become a concert pianist, is required, along with the other students, to fill out a questionnaire. The seventh question is, "What has been the predominant influence on my social growth?"

The questionnaire will be filed with the student's applications for college.

In the end the boy makes his decision and the pastor, in defiance of the authorities, stands in the pulpit giving Paul's passages from II Corinthians 4:8-18 as the police walk down the aisle.

Photography is well used in this picture. Sharp contrast of shadows and light is used, as well as low angle shots which convey the powerfulness of the state authorities.

This movie is especially good for youth, as it realistically shows the extent to which Communism has penetrated an East German school. The film is based on actual events and was filmed in the West German town of Molln-P.H.
