Brazilian Police Find New Clues Pointing to Chinese Communists

San Paulo, Brazil — (UPI) — On Oct. 11, Sao Paulo police unexpectedly found dramatic new evidence of the extent to which Communist China is going to foster the spread of Communism in Latin America through sabotage and terrorism.

That was the day they broke into a 12th floor office in a building at No. 40 Avenida 9 Julho and raided the headquarters of the "China-Brazilian Cultural Society." Their suspicions that this was something more than a cultural organization were more than borne out.

Among other things, police now suspect that Chinese Communist "know-how" was behind the bombing of Venezuelan oil refineries during the Cuban crisis last month. The bombs used by the Venezuelan terrorists were of the same type as those described in a "terrorism manual" seized in the Oct. 11 raid here.

Alcides Cintra Bueno Filho, Chief Inspector of Sao Paulo's Department of Public Order, says the booklet not only tells you how to make bombs or Molotov cocktails but where to find the ingredients.

The manual, believed to have been published in Communist China, is in the Portuguese language and entitled "Sabotage Warfare: Work Of Destruction." The first chapter says:

"Ammonium Nitrate is a salt employed in chemical fertilizers. It is of pale, yellowish color, highly corrosive to metals and of violent combustion. In case TNT is unobtainable, an identical explosive can be made by using 91 per cent Ammonium Nitrate, three per cent automobile grease, three per cent shoe polish, and six per cent sawdust."

Easily Obtained
Police in Sao Paulo maintain strict control over the use of Ammonium Nitrate but point out it can be obtained relatively easily in the interior of many Brazilian states where controls are either lax or non-existent.

The manual also gives

"highly recommended formulas" for the manufacture of incendiary bombs of the kind known as Molotov cocktails. Before tossing the bottle, the instructions say, you can make it even more destructive if you "fasten three or four bags of chlorate of potassium and sugar (equal parts) around the bottle with a flask of sulfuric acid."

Other booklets seized by

police from this "cultural" establishment covered such subjects as "the open and secret work of the party" (25 pages, in Spanish); Three chapters from Mao Tse-tung's "The Revolutionary War In China" which provide Portuguese language instructions on how to seize power in a country where the Communist party is illegal.

Woman President

The president of the society was Helena Silveira, well-known Brazilian woman writer and journalist who has traveled extensively in both Communist China and Russia.

When police raided her headquarters, she termed the action an "error."

This has not dissuaded police from investigating Miss Silveira and her top aides on grounds that the society was in reality nothing more than "an entity of secret character, a nest of agitators specializing in strikes, rallies and other activities inspired by Communism . . . a bogus society, commanded by the Chinese Communist party."

Police have declined to make public a list of 200 names, many of them prominent in university, journalistic and political circles of Sao Paulo, that also were seized in the raid. They are quietly checking each name to make certain none was deliberately put on the list to create confusion.
