IN TRAINING

Several Jackson county men have completed their processing in Portland, and are now undergoing basic training in the U.S. Army at Fort Ord, Calif.

They include Thomas K. Winter Control For Blackberries

Ray Hubbell, Jackson county weed supervisor, is recommending dormant cane broadcast spraying for blackberry control.

Hubbell said that he has received a number of calls from landowners asking how to rid areas of blackberries.

Local tests show such treatment can rid restricted areas of blackberry problems.

After Leaf Drop

Dormant cane broadcast involves use of 2-ethylhexyl ester of 2,4-D and/or 2,4,5-T in a diesel or fuel oil carrier of six to eight pounds per 100 gallons. Any concentrated formulation of four pounds 2,4,5-T formulated to mix with straight diesel will work equally as well. Hubbell warned that many brush killer formulas have restrictions on use with oil. Read the label, he added.

The dormant spray should be made after leaf drop in the fall and prior to spring budding, he said. Low pressures should be used and applications made on calm days to dry stems and wet to the point of run-off.

The volume per acre will depend on the growth density of the blackberry bushes. Follow-up sprays should be planned on and applied if and when needed. If this is not done, two or three years' growth will result.

Although the per gallon cost is considerably higher than the water-diluted foliage mixtures, Hubbell said, cost per acre should be lower due to less material required. Percentage of kill is higher than with foliage sprays which should be considered, he added.

Labor Dispute, Deep-Sea Diving Incident Top News

A Swiss scientist's dreams of a revolutionary new skin diving method ended in tragedy when two of his companions died as the result of a deep-sea dive off Santa Catalina Island.

Peter Small, 35, a well known British diver and journalist, died of an air embolism after being brought to the surface. During the scientific experiment, safety diver Christopher Duncan Whitaker, 21, slipped beneath the surface of the water and failed to return.

Small and Hannes Keller, 28, who hoped to prove the effectiveness of a secret gaseous mixture as a means of avoiding the "bends," were pulled unconscious from a diving bell after returning from a 1,000-foot descent.

The ill-fated experiment stirred up a controversy and caused Los Angeles County Coroner Theodore J. Curphey to consider calling an inquest. A dispute arose between the coroner and Keller, who said Small died of a heart attack. The coroner claimed Small "died of gas embolism—similar to the bends."

"This business of the Swiss professor's preserving the secrecy of the composition of the gasses doesn't sound like something a reputable scientist would do," Curphey said. "We are making thorough studies to determine the nature of the gasses used."

Elsewhere, there were these developments:

Lockheed: President Kennedy invoked the Taft-Hartley law in the labor dispute between Lockheed Aircraft corporation, and the International Association of Machinists. A federal judge then issued a 10-day restraining order preventing a strike pending outcome of a federal government request for an 80-day injunction. Key issue in the dispute was the union demand that workers be permitted to vote on whether to have a union shop. The company refused to consent to the vote.

Lawford: A woman involved in a traffic accident with President Kennedy's sister, Mrs. Pat Lawford, received a \$1,500 settlement check from Mrs. Lawford's insurance company, it was learned. Mrs. Nancy Jane Foster, 38, of San Valley, Calif., suffered a slight concussion, shock and whiplash in the Santa Monica accident. The incident attracted wide attention when Mrs. Lawford, wife of actor Peter Lawford, was sentenced to inspect traffic collision wrecks and visit young traffic victims after pleading guilty to driving with an expired license.

Peck: Gov. Edmund G. Brown announced he intends to appoint Paul Peck, presiding justice of the third district court of appeals, to the state Supreme Court. Peck, 38, will succeed retiring justice Thomas Patrick White, who stepped down Oct. 31 after more than 36 years as a California judge. Peck is a former state assemblyman from Long Beach and briefly held the office of Secretary of State in 1940. He was appointed to the district court of appeal by former Gov. Culbert L. Olson in 1942. Brown, after naming Peck to the high court post, selected Fred R. Pierce to become the third district court of appeals presiding justice. Pierce was appointed by Brown to the court last year.

Deputala: Gov. Edmund G. Brown commuted the death sentence of John J. Deputala to life imprisonment without possibility of parole 19 hours before he was to die in the San Quentin gas chamber. Deputala was convicted Dec. 6, 1961, for killing a night watchman at the Los Angeles bowling alley which he man-

Increase Noted in Use of PGE's Parks

Portland — Portland General Electric company played host to 336,100 campers, picnickers and fishermen at its ten public parks and recreation areas during the 1962 summer season, according to statistics compiled by the utility's community relations manager James H. Goggin.
