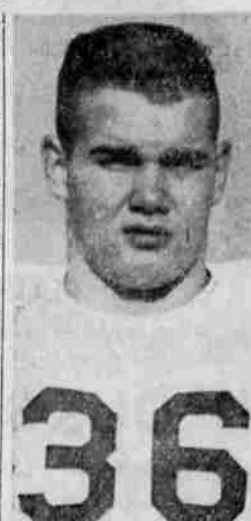

Charlie Berry Ends Umpiring Career in AL

Boston — Umpire Charlie Berry has retired after a career in the American league that spanned two decades, six World Series and five All-Star games.

The announcement of Berry's retirement came Tuesday from league president Joe Cronin who also said the league had purchased conditionally the contracts of four minor league umpires.

Cronin had warm praise for Berry. "Charlie Berry was a fine catcher in his playing days, an outstanding athlete and a credit to baseball through his career as an umpire," he said.

The 60-year-old Berry, a resident of Phillipsburg, N.J., began his major league career with the old Philadelphia Athletics as a catcher in 1925. He also played with the Boston Red Sox, the Chicago White Sox and later managed Wilmington in the Inter-State league.

He began umpiring in the International league in 1941 and the following year was brought up to the American league. He umpired in the World Series of 1945, 1948, 1950, 1954, 1958 and 1961.

The four minor league umpires come from the Pacific Coast league, and the International league. They are: William T. Valentine, 30, of Little Rock, Ark., from the PCL, and Louis DiMuro, 30, Floral Park, N.Y.; Walter Doyle, 34, of Denver, and James C. Odom, 40, of Bensenville, S. C., all of the International league.

Bob Jencks Kick Champ For NCAA

New York — UPI — Bob Jencks of Miami (Ohio) captured kicking honors for the 1962 college football season when he tied one modern record and shared the lead in two kicking departments.

Jencks booted eight field goals for a three-year total of 17, according to official statistics released today by the NCAA service bureau. This equaled the career mark set by Ed Dyas of Auburn from 1958-60. The eight three-pointers enabled Jencks to share the major college season title with Woody Woodall of Auburn.

A 6-foot, 5-inch 222-pounder, Jencks applied much of his power to his foot to register a total of 48 points by kicking alone. This tied him with Bill Wellstead of Dartmouth for the national lead. In addition to his field goal prowess, Jencks booted 24 of 26 point-after attempts.

However, the best conversion mark was turned in by Gary Kroner of Wisconsin, who established an all-time record with 27 after-touchdown boots without a miss. John Seeborg of Arizona State registered the most conversions with 37, missing only two, and John Gavin of the Air Force kicked the season's longest field goal, 55 yards against Miami (Fla.).

Donnie Frederick of Wake Forest handled 29 kickoff returns — more than anyone ever did before — and ran them back for 689 yards to lead the nation in that department. The 5-10, 175-pounder averaged 22.8 yards per return, far less than the 39.9 yard average turned in by Alabama's Butch Wilson on just eight returns.

Jon Don Looney of Oklahoma paced all kickers in punting with a 43.4 yard average and Darrell Roberts of Utah State was most proficient in returning punts with a total of 333 yards on 16 chances.

Terry Baker Story Said Too Improbable Even for Class B Motion Picture

New York — UPI — The Terry Baker story is too improbable even for a "B" movie out of Hollywood.

The No. 1 college football player of 1962, All-America quarterback and winner of the Heisman award, doesn't even look like a football player.

You'd peg him for one of Oregon State's basketball stars. And you'd be right, too. He's a left-handed passer in football, a right-handed pitcher in baseball and an either-way shooter in basketball. He kicks a football right-footed, eats left handed but bowls right-handed.

"My parents were separated," Terry says simply. "My mother did a remarkable thing, putting three sons through college."

Because there were a couple of brothers available and baseball mitts only for right-handed players, Terry learned baseball as a right-hander.

"But I'm a natural lefty," he says. "So I throw a football left-handed. They say I passed once right-handed but I don't believe it. I'm lousy with my right."

But as a left-handed passer and a terrific runner, Baker became the No. 1 college football player of 1962 at the end of a career that simply didn't figure to turn out that way.

Looks Like Big Trade Good One

It looks like that big trade that sent Tom Gola from San Francisco to New York in exchange for Willie Naulls and Kenny Sears was a good one for both clubs.

New York knocked off mighty Boston in the nightcap of a Madison Square Garden doubleheader for its fourth straight win. A crowd of 15,237 sat in as the Knicks edged the Celts, 95-87. Los Angeles edged Cincinnati, 124-121, in the opener.

Meanwhile, the San Francisco Warriors snapped an 11-game losing streak with a 136-124 win over Syracuse.

Moves Were Wise
While observers might argue the skills of the respective players in the big Warrior-Knick trade, the move was wise for both teams from a psychological viewpoint.

Gola resides in the East and was reluctant to make the move West when the Warriors switched from Philadelphia. Naulls and Sears are West Coast residents and Sears returns to his college coach at Santa Clara, Bob Feerick, now Warrior head man.

Gola contributed 12 points and his usual smooth floor game to New York's attack Tuesday night. Richie Guerin and Johnnie Green had 23 points apiece, while Bill Russell led the Celts with 18.

New York responded to the packed house's urgings and did not allow Boston a field goal for nine minutes. Rookie Paul Hogue gave as good as he got all night against Russell in a good battle at the pivot spot.

San Francisco got a 61-point blast from Wilt Chamberlain, but also benefited as Naulls and Tom Meschery hit 21 points apiece. When the Warriors' long guns are on target, foes can't afford to concentrate solely on stopping Chamberlain and he benefits, too.

Elgin Baylor outscored Oscar Robertson in the Los Angeles-Cincinnati battle, 48-31. Cincinnati led early in the fourth quarter until Los Angeles hit a 14-4 streak in the final stanza to move ahead to stay.

Two-Division Schedule Eyed

Spokane, Wash. — UPI — The Spokane Baseball club will push for a two-division league playing a 162-game schedule when the old Pacific Coast league meets to reorganize this week end in Salt Lake City.

Team president Spencer Harris said Tuesday he knew of two or three teams which favored his plan and about the same number opposed to it.

He said the Spokane proposal would include a schedule which included 18 games against the other teams in at least two different stands.

The suggested 162-game schedule would mean opening the season about a week earlier, around April 10 with the closing date remaining about Sept. 9.

Under the baseball reorganization voted last month, Vancouver is out of the PCL and Denver, Dallas, Fort Worth and Oklahoma City are in the league.

Duke Blue Devils Have More Than One Man Club

Art Heyman of Duke is frequently referred to as a "one-man team," but that's a misnomer.

The Blue Devils' 6-foot-5 "import" from Rockville Centre, N.Y., has at least two other sidekicks who know how to score, too.

Heyman, who averaged 32 points a game as second-ranked Duke won its first three games, was held to 13 Tuesday night by a sticky Vanderbilt defense. However, 6-10 Jay Buckley and 6-4 Jeff Mullins took up the slack to lead the Blue Devils to a 90-70 victory at Durham, N.C.

Mullins tossed in 22 points and Buckley added 21 as Duke ran its season record to 4-0 and gave every indication it is ready to challenge top-ranked Cincinnati for national honors this season.

Crater JV Wins From Prospect

Central Point — Crater high junior varsity, cold in the first half, turned hot in the last two periods to subdue Prospect varsity basketballers 40 to 36 last night in a game at Prospect.

In the prelim Crater sophomores downed the Prospect jayvees 47 to 29.

Mike Turner spurred the Crater jayvees with 12 points and 13 rebounds. He put in five field buckets and plucked seven of his rebounds in the second half.

Prospect varsity led 9 to 3 at the quarter and 15 to 11 at the half. Score was tied at 26 after three periods. Crater shot only 11 from the field in the first half but hit 500 in the second.

John Scott had nine points for Prospect. Denny Ryerson pulled down eight rebounds for the Crater Comets.

Crater's soph pulled away from their Cougar foe in the second quarter. Period scores were 11 to 9, 24 to 13 and 37 to 23 for Crater. Don Patterson scored 18 points for the victors and Ray the same total for Prospect. Dave Harper collected 20 rebounds for Crater.

Gotham Bowl Kinks Ironed

New York — UPI — The Gotham Bowl game is on.

Bob Curran, executive director of the Gotham Bowl, says "all kinks have been ironed out" and the game between the University of Miami (Fla.) and Nebraska will be played as originally scheduled Saturday at Yankee Stadium.

The chief kink was a \$60,000 guarantee demanded by both teams, and Curran said the sum will be placed in escrow today.

"The money is being put up and the game is on," Curran declared. "I can also say that the Gotham Bowl game definitely will be televised."

Earlier in the week both teams had indicated they might pull out of the game if the money was not put in escrow but officials of both universities apparently have been satisfied since then.

Phils Trade For Averill

Philadelphia — UPI — The Philadelphia Phillies traded outfielder Jackie Davis to the Los Angeles Angels of the American league Tuesday for catcher Earl Averill, son of Earl Averill Sr., Cleveland standout of the 1930's.

The Phils said Averill will be used as a third catcher and a pinchhitter to back up Clay Dalrymple and Bob Oldis.

Averill, like his dad, broke in with the Indians, went to the Cubs and was with Los Angeles for two seasons, but was used mostly as a pinch hitter in 1962. He batted .268 with 21 home runs in 113 games during 1961 and 219 with four homers in 92 games last season.

Davis hit .313 in 48 games for the Phils in 1962 before he was sent back to Buffalo, of the International league where he averaged .244 in 57 games and a .320 average with Buffalo in 1961.

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
