

Khrushchev Directs Harsh Words at Chinese Commies

Moscow - (UPI) - Premier Nikita Khrushchev's foreign policy speech indicated a stiffening toward both the West and Communist China, but his harshest words were directed at the Chinese, Western observers said today.

Khrushchev, in his two-hour and 40-minute report to the nation Wednesday, warned both Peking and the United States not to view Russia's missile withdrawal from the island as a sign of weakness. But he added a note to Red China that the American "paper tiger" the Chinese are fond of belittling has "nuclear teeth."

Khrushchev's address to the Supreme Soviet indicated he

has regained any loss of confidence or control he may have sustained at the time of the Cuban tension. He presented the Cuban settlement to the Russian people as a diplomatic victory, not a defeat, and pledged to defend Cuba from attack.

He warned that Russia would honor its peace commitments in the Caribbean only as long as the United States honored its own.

Khrushchev ranged from Berlin to disarmament in his speech to the Soviet parliament, but clearly was most interested in defending his Cuban policy, which the Chinese have attacked as "bowing to imperialism."

He did not mention Peking by name but attacked its Communist ally, Albania, for saying the same things China has said. He stressed the Soviet view that the world's choice is between peaceful coexistence and nuclear war, and indicated Peking's policies would bring the latter.

Khrushchev emphasized the extent of the ideological dispute with Peking by saying for the first time that "dogmatism" - the extreme hard line taken by China - now is the "main danger" facing world communism.

Moscow - (UPI) - Yugoslav President Tito, onetime renegade of the Communist bloc, joined a chorus of voices before the Supreme Soviet today praising the Kremlin's Cuba policy despite strong criticism from Communist China.

The mere fact that Tito was permitted to address the Soviet Union was a rebuke to Peking which has scored him unceasingly as a "revisionist" and "traitor" to communism.

Tito took the rostrum after Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko trumpeted the settlement of the Cuban crisis as a "victory of reason over folly" and called for Soviet-U.S. cooperation similar to that of World War II.

The 1,400 deputies cheered both men.

Dividend News Pushes Rails Up

Foreign Briefs

KING OF MOROCCO TO VISIT UNITED STATES
Rabat, Morocco - (UPI) - King Hassan will visit the United States late next year, it was announced Wednesday.

Hassan told a news conference here he will meet President Kennedy during his trip in the second half of 1963. He gave no further details.

ITALIAN CHAMBER VOTES TO INVESTIGATE MAFIA
Rome - (UPI) - The Chamber of Deputies voted 478-55 Wednesday to hold an investigation of the Mafia.

A joint investigation was approved by the Italian Senate last April, but observers said next spring's general elections probably will cut it short.

TURKISH COURT SENTENCES SPY
Ankara - (UPI) - A Turkish military court Wednesday sentenced Yakup Ulkeray to eight years and four months in prison for attempting to spy in behalf of Bulgaria.

The court first announced a 15 year sentence, but then reduced it. It said Ulkeray failed in his mission and made a full confession.

273 SOVIET NATIONALS WORK IN BRITAIN
London - (UPI) - A total of 273 Soviet nationals work in Britain at the Russian embassy and trade delegation or as journalists. Foreign Office Undersecretary Peter Thomas said Wednesday.

He made the statement in the House of Commons in reply to a question about British security. Thomas said about 120 British citizens work in Moscow.

Bitter Cold Wave Continues To Grip Eastern States; Florida Crops Hit

Warmer readings were forecast for the Great Lakes region today, but some sections received their eighth straight day of snow.

The center of the Arctic air hovered over the Gulf States and little relief from the frigid blasts was expected before Friday.

Freezing temperatures, sleet and snow caused millions of dollars damage to Florida's vegetable crops. Citrus growers waged an all-out battle to save their crops.

The Rio Grande Valley in Texas also was threatened and citrus and vegetable growers in the lush valley lit smudge pots through the night.

Atlanta, Ga., with a temperature of four above today, set a record for this date - 18 degrees colder than ever before on Dec. 13. Temperatures plunged to 10 degrees below or colder in other parts of Dixie.

Warned Against Freeze
Florida residents were warned to protect water pipes and automobile radiators. A

Miami, Fla., clothier sent a rush order up north for a shipment of topcoats. Stores throughout the state did a land office business in electric heaters, blankets and heavy clothing.

At least 119 deaths have been blamed on the savage onslaught of snow and cold. Ohio counted 32 weather-attributed deaths, Michigan 25, New England 10, New York and Indiana 8, Pennsylvania and Kentucky 6 each, Tennessee 5, West Virginia, Illinois, Georgia and Missouri 3 each, Kansas and Florida 2 each, and North Dakota, Texas and Minnesota, 1 each.

The weather bureau said the frigid onslaught was one of the greatest outbreaks of Arctic air ever to invade the Eastern United States during December.

Snow Continues
In the Midwest the "snow belt" corridor of Indiana, Michigan and Ohio continued to receive snow, although there were signs sunny skies soon may be on the way. Michigan received the

heaviest snowfalls Wednesday. Ludington got another 19 inches, and Paw Paw, already sagging from 48 inches on the ground, got three more.

On the northern edge of the cold air mass, Minnesota reported warmer temperatures today, but forecasters said any increase in readings might be accompanied by light snow.

By contrast the Western half of the nation today was in for another comfortably cool to mild day. Most high temperatures west of the Rockies Wednesday were in the 50s or higher.

Drive-in Service For Ocean Freighters

Baton Rouge, La. - (UPI) - "Drive-in" service of the sort developed by hamburger stands and banks now is being used here to handle giant ocean freighters.

Ships loading soybean meal at this Gulf Coast port on the Mississippi river are serviced by an unusual barge and elevator unit, operated by Rogers Terminal and Shipping Corp., which brings cargo vessels anchored in mid-stream. The captain, like auto drivers at dry land drive-ins, never leaves the wheel.
