

Hatfield's Budget Slated for More Trouble at Legislative Fiscal Parley

Salem — (UPI) — The already much-hattered budget proposed by Gov. Mark Hatfield for the 1963-65 biennium faces further bombardment next week when the legislative fiscal orientation conference is held here.

The Monday-through-Wednesday meeting of legislators with the Legislative Fiscal Committee is being held "to consider the revenue and expenditure programs for the 1963-65 biennium."

All 90 of the state's legislators have been invited.

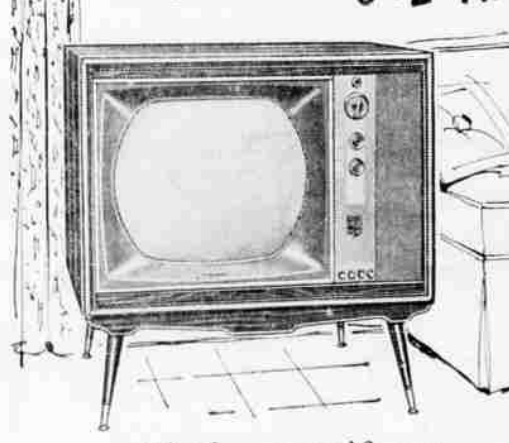

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The budget was begun Dec. 1 when the \$405.3 million general fund budget was presented.

Hatfield indicated the state was in danger of skidding into the red before the end of the current biennium.

To finance next biennium's proposals, he called for a hike in liquor prices, a cigarette tax, and an increase in personal income taxes.

A \$40 million higher education construction bond issue was proposed, and an election during the legislative session on the bond proposal and tax hikes was suggested.

First to comment on the budget was State Rep. Clarence Barton (D-Coquille), speaker designate of the House.

Businessman Held in Salem Holdup Plot

Salem — (UPI) — A Washington businessman was arrested near here Wednesday night after allegedly threatening the family of a Salem supermarket manager as part of a holdup plot.

Roland Ray Bennyhoff, 32, operator of a Seattle electrician manufacturing firm, was arrested by state police in the Sidney area eight miles south of here.

Officers said the victim of the robbery attempt was Edward L. Hatfield, manager of Erickson's Supermarket.

Hatfield said he received a call at the store about 5:15 p.m. from a man who said Hatfield's wife and two children were being held hostage. The caller directed Hatfield to take all the money from the store and leave it at a stop sign at Liberty and Jory rds.

The arrest was made after the money was delivered.

IN THE MATTER OF THE PROPOSED FORMATION OF THE SOUTH TALENT SANITARY DISTRICT

On the 30th day of November, 1962, at the hour of 2:00 p.m., this matter came on for public hearing in the County Courtroom in the Courthouse in Medford, Oregon, on the question of the proposed formation of a Sanitary District in the Talent area lying within the following described boundaries, to-wit:

Beginning at the intersection of the centerline of the re-located Pacific Highway No. 99 and the centerline of Valley View Road in Section 23 Township 38 South, Range 1 West of the Willamette Meridian in Jackson County, Oregon; thence Northwesterly along the centerline of said Pacific Highway No. 99 to the intersection of Talent City limit boundary; thence Northwesterly along said Talent City limit boundary to intersect the centerline of Fern Valley Road; thence Easterly along centerline of Fern Valley Road in the S. E. Corner D.L.C. 50; thence Northwesterly along the centerline of said Pacific Highway No. 99; thence in a Southerly direction along the centerline of said Interstate Highway No. 5 to intersect the centerline of Valley View Road in Section 31, Township 38 South, Range 1 East of the Willamette Meridian; thence Southerly along the centerline of said Valley View Road to intersect the centerline of the re-located Pacific Highway No. 99; thence in a Southerly direction along the centerline of said Highway No. 99 to its intersection with the Northeastly right-of-way line of the Southern Pacific Railroad Co. in Section 5, Township 38 South, Range 1 East of the Willamette Meridian; thence Northwesterly along the Northeastly line of said Railroad to intersect the Southeasterly city limits boundary to the city of Talent, Oregon; As said boundary existed in July, 1962; thence in a Northeastly direction along the said city limits line of said Talent, Oregon, to its intersection with the east line of Donation Land Claim No. 60; thence Northwesterly along the said Donation Land Claim line and the city limits line to a point which is South 34 degrees 05' West 209.26 feet from the Southeasterly boundary of the re-located Pacific Highway No. 99; thence North 54 degrees 05' East 219.26 feet to the Southeasterly boundary of said Highway; thence Northwesterly along said Highway boundary to an intersection with the centerline of Valley View Road; thence Northeastly along said Road centerline to point of beginning.

And the Court having duly considered the petition filed herein, and having heard and considered the matters presented on public hearing, and being fully advised, it is hereby

ORDERED that the petition on file herein is approved, and it is further

ORDERED that the 15th day of January, 1963, is hereby set as the date upon which the election shall be held on the question of the formation of the proposed district, at which election there shall be elected three members of the sanitary board, and it is further

ORDERED that the Resmore Motel, Unit No. 7, South Pacific Highway, Route 1, Box 233, Talent, Oregon, is hereby designated as the polling place at which the election will be held.

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Thornton said transfer of \$5.5 million from the veterans' bond sinking fund to bail out the general fund would violate the constitution.

This was followed by an explosive blast from State Rep. Richard Eymann (D-Mohawk), chairman of the House Taxation Committee. Eymann charged Hatfield had juggled figures to produce a "phony" budget.

Eymann's charge was first answered by Freeman Holmer, director of the Department of Finance. Holmer defended the budget, and said Thornton's opinion was "not convincing."

Nevertheless, Holmer suggested "if there is legislative doubt," the transfer of the \$5.5 million could be referred to the people in the form of a constitutional amendment.

Hatfield met with reporters Monday and said drastic cuts in basic school aid, welfare services, and closing of state institutions could result next spring if the \$5.5 million is not returned to the general fund.

"Constructive Criticism"
Hatfield repeated his call for "constructive criticism" of his budget, and termed "statesmanship" a suggestion by Barton that a deficiency

appropriation might be the answer to keeping the state in the black.

Hatfield also downgraded Thornton's view the \$5.5 million could not be returned to the general fund.

Eymann wasn't much impressed with the governor's plea for "constructive criticism."

"Before the election we were led to believe the state would have a half a million dollar surplus," Eymann said.

He criticized Hatfield for not advising the legislature in advance of apparent general fund deficits.

Another potential threat to the state's financial stature was unveiled Tuesday when Secretary of State Howell Appling Jr. announced \$18.2 million more each biennium would be required if state wards and prison labor were not allowed to do state work.

The AFL-CIO is bringing suit to halt use of prison labor in construction of the new women's prison. Appling has expressed the view that if labor wins the suit, the state would be prohibited from using any inmate labor at any of the institutions.

With most of the state's legislative leaders scheduled to be on hand next week, it

can be expected the battle of the budget will gain in intensity.
