Mr. and Mrs. Ed Milne were entertaining the employees of their business, Quality Market, at a holiday dinner party at North's Chuck Wagon. About 10 p.m. one of the employees, Roy Watson, was struck with a wonderful idea—wouldn't it be just great to put through a long distance telephone call to Germany, where the Milne's son, John, is serving with the Third Armored division, so the three could have a surprise conversation.

He confided the idea to another employee, Loyd Huston, who agreed that it was indeed a positive inspiration. The two men left the private dining room where the party was under way, sought out a waitress and asked permission to put through the call. Their excitement communicated itself, and the waitress agreed.

One of the men had all the information needed—the soldier's name, exact location, etc., and the call was put through. Luck was with the two conspirators, and in what seemed practically no time at all—in reality only about 15 or 20 minutes, John Milne, in Glenhausen, Germany, was talking with his parents halfway around the world in Medford, Ore.

It was about 7 a.m. Sunday morning in Glenhausen, and John was just starting the day. Since the whole scheme had been a spur of the moment deal, the Milnes afterwards weren't quite sure what they had said to their son, or what he had replied. Mrs. Milne did remember one part of the conversation—John had just returned to his base after having been on a field trip. The trip had been a joint endeavor of certain sections of the U.S. and German armies and John said the weather was terribly cold and he was glad to be back in Glenhausen, which is near Frankfurt. John, a specialist fourth class in the division, was 21 years old last month. This will be the fourth Christmas that the young soldier has not been home for Christmas, and he was mighty glad to hear his parents' voices.

"It was the most wonderful Christmas present we could have had," Mrs. M. declared to Potpourri earlier this week. The Milnes have a daughter, Mary, a student at Lewis and Clark college in Portland and they are happy that she will be home for the holidays.

The telephone, radio, television—all the other wonders of modern science have been with us quite a while and should be commonplace by now. But to this small town female, it is still something of a miracle that wires and little containers and some mysterious element in the atmosphere will enable a parent to hear the voice of a beloved son or daughter thousands of miles away, or that a scene originating in one city can be recreated in another spot across continents. Mrs. Kennedy Makes Visit To Junior Village

Washington — UPI — The children of Junior Village, a Washington institution for the homeless, swarmed eagerly around the smiling lady wearing the Christmas red suit Thursday.

Her name was Jacqueline Kennedy, and her visit had an official purpose: To call attention to overcrowded conditions in the home.

Public duty gave way quickly to private sympathies, as the First Lady succumbed to the charm and plight of the small charges.

She bore a large basket filled with toys and candy,

and her schedule called for their distribution at the end of the visit. But the schedule crumbled when a small boy, his voice edged with disappointment, asked, "Didn't you bring us anything?"

Mrs. Kennedy immediately jettisoned the schedule and began handing out the candy and toys. Climbing on table tops, waving their hands and shouting with glee, the tykes emptied the basket in a matter of minutes.

The First Lady's itinerary called also for a brief visit. That too was forgotten as she talked to the children, dis-

pensed cheerful words to the sick and viewed a small boy's drawing. "It's very pretty," she told him.

The youngsters responded to Mrs. Kennedy's Christmas gesture with a rendition of "Silent Night, Holy Night."

President Kennedy, at his news conference Wednesday, had called for Congress to give the institution more attention.
