Officers will be elected. Members are to take materials to pack boxes for shut-ins as well as articles to be sent to Fairview Home in Salem.

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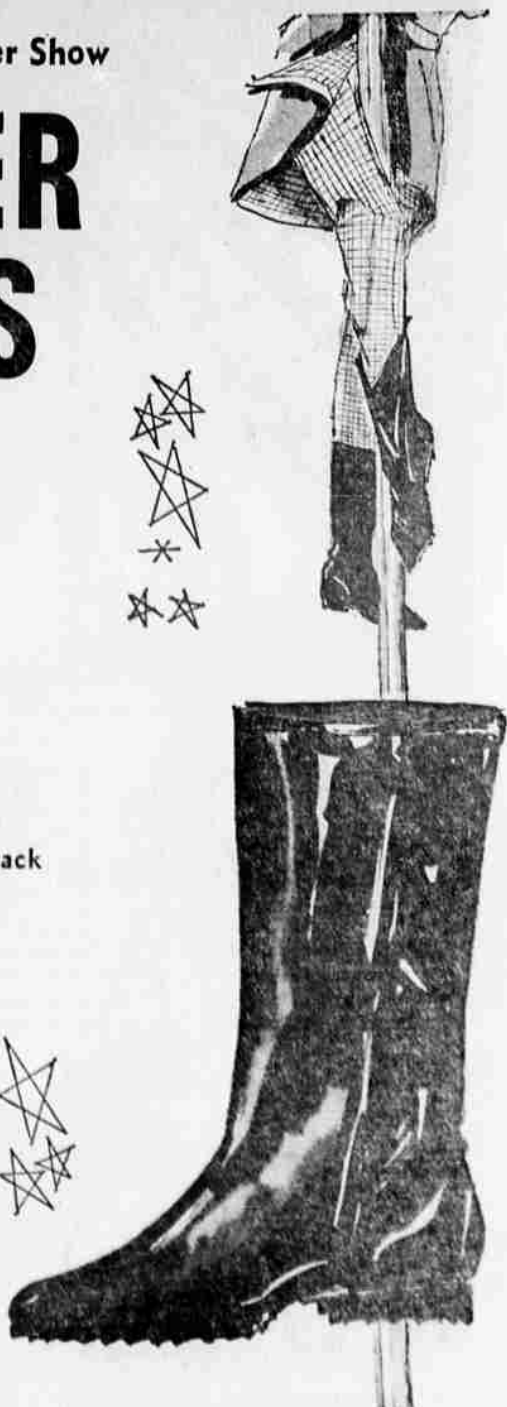
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
