Feeding the Family

Chocolate-Fruit Squares

Here we combine the delights of chocolate, dates, raisins and coconut. Give them that certain distinction found only in pure vanilla extract. Recipe makes about one pound for holiday season enjoyment at home and for giving.

1/2 pound semi-sweet chocolate
 1/4 cup light corn syrup
 1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract
 1/2 cup finely chopped dates
 1/4 cup finely chopped seedless raisins
 1/2 cup shredded coconut
 Blanched toasted almonds or pecan halves (optional)

Place chocolate and corn syrup in the top part of a double boiler. Cook over hot water (not boiling) until chocolate melts. Add pure vanilla extract, fruit and coconut. Mix well. Let stand one hour. Turn out onto waxed paper and shape into a 6x8x1/2-inch square with the hands. Chill until firm enough to cut. If desired, top each with a blanched toasted almond or a pecan half.

Gingered Ham Slices

Colorful ham steaks with a zesty sauce sizzle on the grill, tempting any appetite. Old fashion ginger snaps crumbs make the sauce special.

1 1/2 cups pineapple juice
 1/2 cup vinegar
 1/4 cup salad oil
 1/2 cup honey
 1 clove garlic, minced
 3/4 cup old fashion ginger snaps crumbs, finely rolled (about 12)
 2 center cut ham steaks about 1-inch thick

Combine first five ingredients. Heat. Stir in old fashion ginger snaps crumbs. Place ham steaks on grill in broiler used for meats or cook on camp stove, placing a strip of aluminum foil under meat. Cook, basting frequently, for about 20 minutes. Use remaining sauce for serving with the ham slices. If desired, stir in one-half cup raisins. Makes six to eight servings.

Quickies for Busy Shoppers

Here are several quick but satisfying burger specialties that will please the family as much as though you had spent the day cooking up something. Main thing is to make them generous; stack them high.

Dinty Burgers

Break one can corned beef into pieces and heat with two cups sauerkraut, one-half cup finely chopped onion and one tablespoon horseradish. Pile corned beef onto bottom halves of 12 hard rolls, split and buttered, and top with the remaining halves. Wrap in aluminum foil and heat in oven, 350 degrees, for 10 minutes. Makes 12 sandwiches.

Vienna-Burgers

Melt two tablespoons butter or margarine in heavy fry pan. Add two cans drained Vienna sausage and brown lightly over low heat, turning occasionally. Place two halves of buns on each plate. On one half of the bun arrange three or four Vienna sausages. Spread other bun half with prepared mustard, catsup and pickle relish. Makes four servings.

Bermuda-Burgers

Cut contents of one can of corned beef hash into four

slices. Brown hash rounds with slices of Bermuda onion in butter or margarine. Place each hash round on a toasted bun half and top with an onion slice and remaining bun half. Makes four servings.

Spiced Tea

A tea party offering especially appropriate to the holiday season. Stud orange with 15 cloves and cut into quarters. In hot tea pot, measure three level tablespoons packed tea, four sticks cinnamon and orange with cloves. Pour in one quart boiling water and brew four minutes.

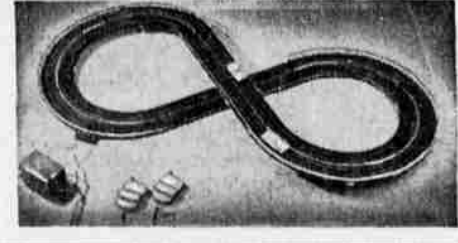

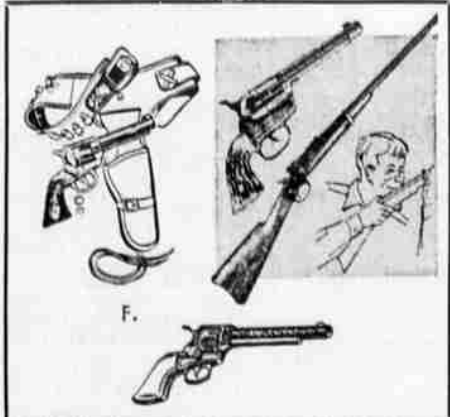
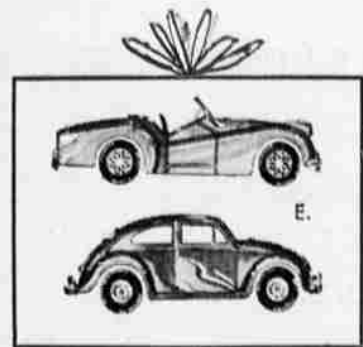
