Oxford, Miss.—Negro student James Meredith, disclosing how he was treated by police in his hometown of Kosciusko, Miss.:

Three Drivers Cited by Police After Accidents

Three drivers were cited by Medford city police following investigation of five vehicle accidents in the city Saturday and Sunday, according to reports. No injuries were reported.

Lyle Harrison Pickell, 74, of 823 Broad st., was cited

for disobeying a stop sign after the car which he was driving collided with a vehicle operated by Jon Gilbert Knips, 16, of 491 Oak Grove rd., about 2:45 p.m. Saturday at Fourth and Holly sts., police said.

As a result of a two-car collision about 11:30 p.m. Saturday at Merriman rd. and DeBarre ave., Larry Gail Sawyer, 23, of 2595 Merriman rd., was cited for failure to yield the right of way. Driver of the other vehicle involved was Bill Jack Reeves, 23, of 1119 East Jackson st., according to police reports.

Woman Files Suit Following Fall

A suit, filed recently in Jackson county circuit court, seeks \$15,235.55 from the Oregon Food Stores, Inc., 523 Central ave., for damages when a customer fell injuring herself.

According to the complaint, filed by Mildred C. Bingham, 1208 Murray ave., the plaintiff entered the store May 12, 1962, at about 5 p.m., carrying a glass milk jug in her left hand. She charges that she fell due to a slippery floor breaking the jug and seriously cutting her left wrist.

John Craig Rorex, 69, of 2353 West McAndrews rd., was cited by police for failure to yield the right of way after the car which he was driving collided with a vehicle operated by Warren Robert Jack, 26, Central Point, about 11:25 a.m. Saturday on West Jackson st. about 51 feet west of the Holly st. intersection.

Police are also investigating two hit-and-run accidents.

Robert James Summer, 19 Jeanette ave., reported to police that his car was struck by an unidentified vehicle about 7:37 p.m. Sunday while it was parked in front of his residence.

Hatfield Oregon Governor Longest Since Earl Snell

Salem—UPI—Today marks an anniversary for Gov. Mark Hatfield.

Hatfield has, as of today, served as governor for a longer period than any governor since Republican Earl Snell's term ended in 1947.

Until today, the post-Snell record was held by Douglas McKay, who was elected in 1948, reelected in 1950, then resigned Dec. 17, 1952, to accept appointment as secretary of the Interior of the United States.

Hatfield, elected in 1958, took office Jan. 12, 1959.

Governor Snell was sworn in on Jan. 11, 1943, and was reelected in 1946. He died in office in 1947.

Republican John H. Hall, who was speaker of the house, succeeded Snell.

McKay then succeeded Hall, and when McKay resigned the office was taken over by Republican Paul L. Patterson who was president of the Senate.

Patterson also died in office, and Republican Senate President Elmo Smith became governor.

Democrat Robert D. Holmes was elected in 1956 to succeed Smith, and served two years until Hatfield's election in 1958.

Sylvester Pennoyer of the Democrat People's party holds the record for length of service as a governor of Oregon. He was sworn in Jan. 12, 1887, and served to Jan. 14, 1895—a period of eight years.

Police Investigate Spraying of Paint

City police today are looking for vandals who sprayed gold and bronze paint on a number of cars in the city late Saturday or early Sunday.

The complaints came from persons living on J. Ivy, 12th, Monroe and Park sts.

The screen door of a residence on Park st. was also sprayed, police said.

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
